

## State courts may provide taxpayers with climate accountability

The likelihood that oil and gas industry executives will have to testify in court about what they knew about climate change and when they knew it increased last week. A <u>federal judge for the District Court of Rhode Island joined colleagues</u> in Baltimore and Northern California in rejecting a plea by the industry to keep a state nuisance claim out of state court.

The decision to remand the case from federal to state court is a blow to oil companies, which are facing a growing wave of lawsuits that seek to recover costs for damages that internal documents reveal they knowingly caused. The oil companies believe that if they can get federal courts to "remove" cases from state courts, they have a better chance of

getting the cases dismissed.

A number of high profile cases against other businesses that marketed and sold harmful or deadly products – especially when the businesses knew their products would cause health and monetary damages – have succeed in state courts. Federal courts, in contrast, rarely hear these kinds of cases.

State courts paved the way for the record \$273 billion settlement with Big Tobacco. They secured the first major victory in the fight to hold opioid manufacturers accountable. And lead paint manufacturers have had to pay damages to clean up lead paint they sold despite knowing that lead is poisonous.

Those lawsuits, and the explosive internal documents they uncovered during litigation, bear a strong resemblance to what we are beginning to learn about what oil companies knew about climate change, when they knew it, and how they funded a multi-million dollar campaign to convince the American public that climate change isn't happening.

We now know that at the same time oil companies were funding the disinformation campaign, they spent millions of dollars protecting their own assets -- like oil platforms – from more powerful storms and sea level rise expected as temperatures increase.

Climate liability litigation, filed by governments around the country, raises a fundamental question: who should pay for the damages climate change is already causing, and will continue to cause well into the future as the federal government fails to come to grips with accelerating sea level rise, more intense flooding, larger wildfires, growing droughts and stronger hurricanes: taxpayers or the companies who products caused them?

Discovery – a court process that allows government plaintiffs to get company documents and interview oil company executives - will play a large role in answering that question. Discovery will add to growing evidence about the knowledge that oil and gas company executives had of the role their products played in causing climate change, and their role in the campaign to convince the public that climate change is not a threat. It was discovery that changed the course of tobacco litigation. And damning documents are imperiling opioid manufacturers in court.

Oil companies are doing everything they can to stop discovery. Shell, Exxon and other oil companies do not want their executives testifying under oath about why companies were upgrading their own facilities to prepare for climate change while publicly proclaiming climate change wasn't happening. If oil companies can get federal courts to keep cases away from state court and then dismiss the cases, they can avoid discovery. Last week's decision together with the two other federal court decisions refusing to keep the cases in federal court, throw a monkey wrench in the oil company strategy.

Not only is discovery at stake but, ultimately, so are billions of dollars. If local and state governments can get their cases to trial, they will seek the money necessary to fortify their communities against the ravages of climate change. Doing so carries a huge price tag. For example, a recent study by the <u>Center for Climate Integrity</u> found that coastal communities in the U.S. <u>must spend upwards of \$400 billion at a minimum</u> in the next five to 10 years alone to protect property from sea level rise.

If governments get to the discovery phase and ultimately to trial, juries will be the ones to decide whether oil companies will have to pay for the climate change damages they have caused. Otherwise, taxpayers will be on the hook.

Last week's court decision and the shifting momentum in favor of the plaintiffs have now upped the ante for oil companies. Expect them to increase pressure on Congress to block state and local access to the courts to recover the costs of oil industry damages, while they continue to fight tooth and nail against any form of accountability in cases around the country.


William Boyd, one of the nation's leading scholars of energy and environmental law, joins the UCLA faculty as both a member of the Emmett Institute and at the Institute of the Environment and Sustainability.

Boyd has written pathbreaking articles on public utilities; the history and role of risk regulation and analysis in American health, safety, and environmental law; the emergence of forestry resources in international climate policy; and the role of science and technology in environmental law. Two of his articles have been selected as among the top five environmental law articles for the year in which they were published. Boyd's book, *The Slain Wood: Papermaking and its Environmental Consequences in the American South*, received the 2016 Edelstein Prize from the Society for the History of Technology.


Boyd also serves as project lead for the <u>Governor's Climate and Forests Task Force</u>, a consortium of 38 subnational jurisdictions around the world to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from deforestation and land use. Boyd is teaching courses in energy and environmental law and policy for both law and undergraduate students at UCLA. Previously, Boyd was a professor at the University of Colorado School of Law.



**UCLA School of Law offers new specialization in environmental law.** The specialization rewards students with deep interest in environmental law, provides a structure for enhanced individual counseling of students, and helps graduates join the many UCLA Law alumni who have gone on to leadership roles in the profession. Students who fulfill the requirements receive notations on their diplomas and transcripts.



Julia Stein joins UCLA Law as clinical supervising attorney of the <a href="Frank G. Wells Environmental Law Clinic">Frank G. Wells Environmental Law Clinic</a> and project director for the Emmett Institute. Stein coteaches our clinic and augments our advocacy efforts through litigation, policy work and legislative advocacy. A graduate of Georgetown University Law Center, Stein has nearly a decade of experience in private practice, serves on the executive committee for the Environmental Section of the California Lawyers Association and is editor-in-chief of the Section's publication, <a href="Environmental Law News">Environmental Law News</a>.


#### **CUTTING-EDGE CLIMATE POLICIES**

In the last year, Emmett faculty made contributions to our home state's environmental policies, including work on cap-and-trade, governance of climate engineering, and increasing use of low-carbon fuels.

In March 2018, Ann Carlson was <u>appointed</u> by the California Assembly to the Independent Emissions Market Advisory Committee. Ann recently <u>testified</u> before California's Joint Legislative Committee on Climate Change Policies on how the state government should respond to a potential problem of overallocation of credits in its cap-and-trade program.

Working with Louise Bedworth, deputy director of Governor Brown's Office of Planning and Research, Ted Parson hosted a workshop at UCLA on governance of climate engineering research in California. More than 30 participants from state government, academia, non-profits, and the private sector joined the discussion, to chart a practical path forward on governance for proposed studies on solar geoengineering.

In a June 2018 Pritzker Brief, Emmett Institute researchers offered guidance for California policymakers to address challenges for the state's Low Carbon Fuel Standard, an innovative policy that has generated large expansions of alternative fuel supply and significant reductions in overall carbon intensity in California's fuel markets.



## TRAINING THE NEXT GENERATION OF ENVIRONMENTAL LEADERS

At the core of the Emmett Institute's mission is our work to prepare students for leadership in environmental law. This year we've added teaching capacity with William Boyd and Julia Stein. Our new environmental law specialization gives students recognition for their academic work. Outside the classroom, students are volunteering at non-profits, organizing talks, designing business models, and taking on externships that build skills and experience.


In the Frank G. Wells Environmental Law Clinic this past academic year, Sean Hecht and Meredith Hankins led 12 students on multiple projects, including a high-profile matter involving liability of fossil fuel companies for climate change-related harms, a U.S. Supreme Court amicus brief on behalf of prominent scientists in an important Endangered Species Act case, and a comment letter to the Department of Interior, on behalf of Oceana and other advocacy groups, opposing federal plans to increase offshore oil drilling. This year marks the 25<sup>th</sup> year that UCLA Law has offered this flagship course in our environmental law curriculum.






## DEFENDING FEDERAL ENVIRONMENTAL SAFEGUARDS

The Trump administration has attempted to curtail federal regulations protecting public health and the environment, with new proposals for rolling back rules on pollution from vehicles, power plants, oil and gas production, federal lands, and more. Emmett Institute faculty are opposing these regulatory retreats and are explaining their far-reaching implications.






On behalf of 68 environmental and administrative law professors, Julia Stein and Sean Hecht filed a <u>comment letter</u> urging EPA to withdraw the misleadingly-named "Strengthening Transparency in Science" proposed rule. Read Stein's <u>Legal Planet blog post</u>.




Emmett Institute faculty responded to the Trump administration's proposed replacement for the Clean Power Plan, which regulates greenhouse gas emissions from existing power plants.

The authors argue that the Clean Power Plan harnesses the unique features of the electric grid and is consistent with the twin aims of the grid: power reliability and affordability for all consumers.

In April 2018, Sean Hecht joined a group of environmental law professors in a comment letter noting major legal

problems with the Bureau of Land Management's proposal to revoke a rule restricting methane emissions from oil and gas development on federal lands. After Interior finalized the rule, Julia Stein wrote in <u>Legal Planet</u> about how the new regulation prioritizes industry interests over environmental protection.



Sean Hecht and Nick Bryner responded to President Trump's proclamations in December 2017 downsizing Bears Ears National Monument and Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument, writing in *The Conversation* that "the president's action is illegal and will likely be overturned in court." Bryner also penned *Legal Planet* posts to preview and analyze the proclamations.




# ADDRESSING NATIONAL CLIMATE AND ENVIRONMENTAL LAW ISSUES


Several important national issues have garnered engagement from Emmett Institute faculty this year, including a spate of lawsuits by cities and counties against oil companies for climate damages, a Supreme Court case on the Endangered Species Act, and lessons for the future of U.S. energy policy. Emmett Institute faculty have closely followed developments in new lawsuits in which cities and counties across the country have sued oil companies for climate damages.

At <u>an event</u> hosted by the Emmett Institute and Union of Concerned Scientists in January at UCLA Fowler Museum, more than 150 participants heard perspectives on the lawsuits from elected officials **Assemblywoman Cristina Garcia**, CA 58th Assembly District, and **Mayor Serge Dedina** of Imperial Beach, CA; author and environmentalist **Bill McKibben**; and a panel featuring experts from California Environmental Justice Alliance, UCLA and UCS. UCS president **Ken Kimmell '87** provided closing remarks.


Emmett Institute experts have provided insights on the climate liability cases in <u>Vox</u>, <u>Public Radio International</u>, <u>InsideClimate News</u>, and more. In a <u>San Francisco Chronicle op-ed</u>, **Ann Carlson** and **Peter Frumhoff** argued there's new evidence to support the cities' liability claims.




Our environmental law clinic filed an <u>amicus brief</u> in the U.S. Supreme Court on behalf of a group of world-class scientists including E.O. Wilson, Stuart Pimm, and UCLA's Brad Shaffer. Sean Hecht authored the brief with significant assistance from two clinic students, Jen Garlock '19 and Heejin Hwang '19. In the brief, Hecht and the clinic students argue the Court should not gut the habitat protections of the Endangered Species Act. On October 1, Hecht attended oral arguments and spoke on <u>a post-argument panel at Georgetown Law</u>.



James Salzman addressed our relationship and consumption of water in a second edition of his book, <u>Drinking Water: A History</u> and several speaking events this year. Salzman delivered the <u>William O. Douglas Lecture</u> at Whitman College and the <u>Goldring Family Lecture</u> at the University of Michigan, in addition to the keynote address at the Colorado Water Congress.



In coordination with the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, Ann Carlson and Dallas Burtraw of Resources for the Future convened a workshop at UCLA Law to address lessons from the Clean Air Act for the future of U.S. energy policy. More than 30 participants from government, academia, the private sector, and NGOs held a robust conversation about next steps in energy policy. Mary Nichols (pictured), chair of California Air Resources Board and Emmett Institute board member, provided a keynote address and William Boyd also presented. Carlson serves on an AAAS panel studying the future of America's energy systems and with Burtraw is co-authoring a book, <u>Lessons from the Clean Air Act</u>, including a chapter from Boyd.




Fifteen environmental law professors from around the country joined the Early Stages Environmental Law Workshop in Santa Barbara this August. The workshop has been hosted at the University of Colorado for the last decade. This year James Salzman hosted the meeting at the Bren School of the Environment at UC Santa Barbara, with junior and senior scholars presenting early works in progress.



## LEADING THE WAY TO CARBON NEUTRALITY AT THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA

The University of California faces substantial challenges to reach its ambitious target to reach net zero carbon emissions from the system's 10 campuses by 2025. With new research, committee work and public events, Emmett faculty and fellows have been among the leaders of this initiative.

In 2016, UC President Napolitano asked Ann Carlson to chair a new task force, the Carbon Neutrality Finance and Management Task Force, to examine and make recommendations on strategies to hit the system's carbon neutrality target. The task force issued a report in August 2017.



In an April 2018 <u>Pritzker Brief</u>, Julia Forgie and Ann Carlson argue that for UC to achieve its climate goal, campus leaders will need to focus on organizational behavior, communications strategy and operations management.




In September at UC Berkeley, Ann Carlson welcomed more than 80 guests for an affiliate event of the Global Climate Action Summit to discuss how the UC system and other large organizations' are working towards their carbon neutrality targets. Berkeley Chancellor Carol Christ gave opening remarks and panel speakers included Carlson and representatives from Kaiser Permanente, Microsoft, UC Berkeley, UC Global Climate Leadership Council, and UC Office of the President.




## SUPPORTING ACTION ON LOS ANGELES CLIMATE AND AIR POLLUTION GOALS

Los Angeles faces significant challenges to achieve long-term sustainability in water, energy, and biodiversity. Emmett Institute faculty are collaborating with local officials, community advocates, and businesses to help chart a path for LA to reach its climate and environment goals.

A <u>UCLA Law/Berkeley Law conference</u> in June 2018 addressed questions around zero-emission freight at Southern California's ports. More than 150 participants joined the event to hear from keynote speaker **Mary Nichols** and representatives from government, industry and community advocacy groups. Read <u>a report</u> from **Ethan Elkind** and **Nat Logar**.



In September, the Emmett Institute hosted an event on sustainability in Los Angeles and other global megacities as part of the Global Climate Action Summit in San Francisco. More than 50 guests gathered at the offices of Paul Hastings for the discussion. State Sen. Ben Allen, whose 26th Senate district includes Westwood, Santa Monica and the South Bay, provided opening remarks and joined a panel moderated by Cara Horowitz with experts from Los Angeles Department of Water and Power, the University of Canberra, and UCLA. Anna Fero '17 arranged the venue.



Emmett Institute faculty are on a team of researchers assisting Los Angeles County with its first sustainability plan. Nat Logar, Harjot Kaur, and Sean Hecht are contributing research to this initiative, which will deliver a final plan in 2019 to address water and energy use, equity, transportation, housing, biodiversity and more.




### **ENGAGING ON ISSUES IN INTERNATIONAL LAW**

The latest IPCC report has renewed attention and a sense of urgency this year for advancing climate and environment solutions in all jurisdictions. This year, Emmett Institute faculty studied and engaged on international environmental issues including climate engineering


governance, water governance, land management, multilateral agreements, Chinese environmental policy, and more.

In September, William Boyd organized a two-day meeting of the <u>Governors'</u> <u>Climate and Forests Task Force</u> (GCF), a collaboration of 38 states and provinces from several countries seeking to protect tropical forests. During the meeting in San Francisco, GCF members representing millions of indigenous peoples across Peru, Colombia, Ecuador, Indonesia, and Brazil voted in unanimous approval of <u>principles</u> recognizing the role of indigenous peoples and local communities in conserving forests and managing land to meet climate goals. Boyd is project lead for the task force.




In May 2017, the Emmett Institute announced a new project to study the governance of climate engineering technologies. Ted Parson is directing the three-year project, funded by a grant from the Open Philanthropy Project, with research into law and policy issues around climate engineering, including risks posed by small-scale research, interactions between climate engineering and other parts of climate policy, and capabilities needed for peaceful, competent, and prudent control of future proposals for climate engineering deployment. This summer, Jesse Reynolds joined us as an Emmett/Frankel Fellow to help address these issues. Reynolds was previously an assistant professor at the Utrecht Center for Water, Oceans and Sustainability Law, Utrecht University and a lecturer at Tilburg University, both in The Netherlands.


Cara Horowitz and UCLA Law students traveled to Bonn, Germany, in December 2017 for the 23rd UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) Conference of the Parties. At the COP, Sunjana Supekar '19, Eric Sezgen '19, and Alexandra Gay '19 worked with Islands First, an organization dedicated to advancing the interests of small island developing states in climate negotiations.



Alex Wang published new analysis this spring assessing China's environmental laws. In <u>Ecology Law Quarterly</u>, Wang explains why the Chinese government has opened data on pollution to the public and what this means for officials on the ground. In <u>Environmental Law</u>, Wang argues that China's reform process - including environmental reforms - influence public views of state legitimacy. In February, Wang <u>spoke</u> about China's pollution controls at the Center for Strategic and International Studies in Washington, D.C.



A March 2018 paper in *Nature Sustainability* from James Salzman is the first global survey of payments for ecoystem services programs, in which people pay landholders to support natural systems that provide benefits like flood protection, biodiversity and carbon storage. With co-authors from Ecosystem Marketplace, Salzman finds more than 550 payments for ecosystem services programs active worldwide with more than \$36 billion in annual transactions.



Ann Carlson and Alex Wang, fellows Harjot Kaur and Garrett Lenahan, and Alexandra Gay '19 participated in the Global Climate Action Summit in San Francisco this September, joining more than 4,000 delegates for plenary sessions. Ann Carlson appeared on stage representing the University of California as part of the We Are Still In coalition. Wang engaged with delegates from China at the China Pavilion, co-sponsored by China's Ministry of Ecology & Environmental Protection.




Cara Horowitz and Ann Carlson Hike Glacier National Park to Raise Money for the Emmett Institute

Sean Hecht is the Co-Executive Director of the Emmett Institute and Evan Frankel Professor of Policy and Practice. A past chair of the California State Bar Environmental Law Section, Sean is an expert on environmental impact analysis under the California Environmental Quality Act and other laws.

Cara Horowitz is the Andrew Sabin Family Foundation Co-Executive Director of the Emmett Institute. An environmental litigator with the Natural Resources Defense Council before joining UCLA, Cara focuses her work and teaching on climate change policy questions.

Timothy Malloy is Faculty Director of the interdisciplinary UCLA Sustainable Technology and Policy Program. His research interests focus on environmental, chemical and nanotechnology policy, regulatory policy, and organizational theory, with particular emphasis on the relationship between regulatory design and implementation and the structure of business organizations.

Ted Parson is the Dan and Rae Emmett Professor of Environmental Law and Faculty Co-Director of the Emmett Institute. ### Other Faculty News

Ann Carlson continues to work as a co-principal investigator on a Sloan Grant leading an American Academy Arts and Sciences research team studying Durability and Flexibility in Energy Policy using the Clean Air Act as a case study, and to serve on the Global Climate Leadership Taskforce, appointed by President Napolitano to help the UC system achieve carbon neutrality by 2025. She served as a moderator for a talk at UC-Irvine in May 2015 about The Water-Energy Nexus. In August 2015, she participated in University of Colorado and Duke University School of Law's Climate Change, Energy and Natural Resources Law Works in Progress Symposium. <u>Cara Horowitz</u> was recently named to the California State Bar Environmental Law Section executive committee for a three-year term of service, and to the Steering Committee of the UCLA Sustainable Los Angeles Grand Challenge. She will speak this month on climate change regulation at the California State Bar annual conference in Anaheim and at the bar's Environmental Law Conference at Yosemite. She published opeds in *Talking Points Memo* and *The Conversation* regarding potential legal challenges to President Obama's recently released Clean Power Plan. On August 3, she was interviewed on KPCC's *Take Two* about Obama's climate change plan as well.

<u>Sean Hecht</u> and <u>Megan Herzog</u> continue their work to develop model regulatory language that addresses the unique legal complexity of planning coastal land use. Sean and Megan are working with the City of Oxnard and Sonoma County as "test jurisdictions." They conducted a webinar on September 16th about the legal issues involved in sea-level rise adaptation as part of the USC Sea Grant's <u>Regional Adaptla</u> <u>Webinar Series</u>.

Megan Herzog served as a panelist at the UCI Newkirk Center's workshop Fostering Climate Resilient Coastal Communities in Newport Beach, CA in July.

Ethan Elkind's comments on transportation and land use policy have appeared on KPCC-FM's "AirTalk with Larry Mantle," KCBS-FM, KPCC-FM's "Morning Edition," and KQED-FM He also traveled to Washington, D.C. and New York City to discuss his recent book, Railtown, at the Action Committee on Transit in June and Columbia University's Graduate School of Architecture, Planning and Preservation in September, respectively.

<u>Virginia Zaunbrecher</u> spoke on how to assess the credibility of scientific toxicological studies at the ShiftCon Eco-Blogging Conference in September.

### **Engaging with Local Governments**





Since 2012, Emmett/Frankel Fellow Megan Herzog and Emmett Institute Co-Executive Director Sean Hecht have been working to provide legal and policy guidance to local governments engaged in planning for sea-level rise and climate-related coastal hazards. The legal context for coastal land use regulation is complex. Local adaptation plans and policies must comply with various federal and state coastal and floodplain management requirements, and must be designed to work with preexisting local land-use laws. Yet, local governments often have limited staff, expertise, and funding to devote to adaptation.

Megan and Sean's prior research has explored the interplay among various legal regimes in the context of coastal adaptation. With funding from the NOAA/USC Sea Grant Program, they are currently working to develop model regulatory language specifically tailored to the needs of California coastal jurisdictions. Model legal provisions will be accompanied by notes and a narrative report that provide contextual information and assist in implementation. Megan and Sean are working closely with the City of Oxnard and

Sonoma County as "test jurisdictions" to assess effectiveness and identify barriers to implementation.

With legal guidance and helpful tools like the Emmett Institute's Model Ordinance for Sea-Level Rise Adaptation, California's coastal regulators will be better equipped to take action to enhance the resilience of our coastal communities.

# Emmett Institute Hosts Major Sustainability Event

State Senator Fran Pavley and California Air Resources Board Chairman Mary Nichols, both Emmett Institute Advisory Board members, discussed California's innovative climate change regulatory programs. Many advocates, business people, and state and local policymakers offered thoughts on California's future energy, transportation, and land use challenges and

## Environmental Law in the Classroom

The fall semester seminar Climate Change Law and Policy is being co-taught by Emmett Institute Co-Executive Director Cara Horowitz and new part-time faculty member Henry Stern. Stern serves as a senior advisor to State Sen. Fran Pavley on energy and environmental issues. Stern has also worked in the private sector and for Congressman Waxman in DC, where he helped develop the American Clean Energy Security Act. The class explores cutting-edge policy and legal responses to climate change, with an emphasis on California's progress.

#### Emmett Institute Welcomes Two New Fellows

The Emmett Institute welcomed two new fellows this year: Julia Forgie, an Emmett/Frankel Fellow in Environmental Law and Policy, and Sarah Duffy, the Shapiro Fellow in Environmental Law and Policy. Both fellowships are two-year positions.

Julia Forgie returns to California after clerking for the Honorable Richard Clifton on the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit in Honolulu, Hawaii. Ms. Forgie graduated from Stanford Law School and also earned an M.S. from Stanford's Emmett Interdisciplinary Program in Environment and Resources. Her research interests include climate change mitigation and adaptation, food security, California water rights, land use, and the intersection of climate science and policy.

Sarah Duffy received her JD from the University of Michigan Law School in December, after which she worked for the World Resources Institute in Mexico City for four months on a Bates Fellowship from Michigan Law School. Her research interests include U.S. and international climate policy, transportation and urban planning, water conservation, and energy policy.

## **Emmett Institute in the Courts**

The Environmental Law Clinic filed two amicus briefs in high-profile California cases. We represented a group of prominent California climate scientists in a brief to the California Supreme Court outlining climate risks to the state, in a case related to long-term transportation planning. And for the environmental nonprofit The Nature Conservancy, we filed a brief helping defend California's cap-and-trade regulation from charges that it is an illegal tax. The Clinic also was on the team representing the plaintiffs in the case Center for Biological Diversity v. Department of Fish and Wildlife, which was argued in September in front of the California Supreme Court, and addresses issues relating to the adequacy of environmental review supporting approval of the Newhall Ranch development project north of Los Angeles. Finally, Sean Hecht, along with faculty from UC Hastings, UC Berkeley, and UC Irvine, filed an amicus brief in the California Supreme Court supporting the State's authority to regulate suction-dredge mining on federal lands in California.

### Student News

#### Students Around the State and the Globe

This October, over a dozen UCLA law students will be attending the annual Environmental Law Conference at Yosemite, the flagship conference of the State Bar of California Environmental Law Section. They will join Emmett Institute faculty and alumni for the three-day event.

Seven students and five Emmett Institute faculty members will participate in the U.N. climate change conference in Paris in December, helping to support the work of the nonprofit Islands First and meeting with leaders from around the globe. Our delegation will build on work done by UCLA Law in Lima, Peru; Durban, South Africa; and Copenhagen, Denmark in prior years. The negotiations in Paris are widely expected to yield an broad-based international agreement that will serve as the successor to the Kyoto Protocol.

#### **Emmett Institute Provides Financial Support to Students**

The Emmett Institute awarded its second post-graduate fellowship this year. Cameron Goodman, class of 2015, is working at the Environmental Defense Center in Santa Barbara where he will pursue his passion for coastal protection and other environmental challenges.

The Emmett Institute provided tuition scholarships to five incoming students who show great promise to contribute to and advance the field of environmental law.

The Emmett Institute was also able to offer financial support to six students working in public interest environmental law this past summer. Placements included a wide range of offices, such as the California Attorney General's Office, the California Coastal Commission, Earthjustice, and the U.S. Department of Justice.

# Sustainable Technology and Policy Program News

STPP recently completed a report for the California Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) detailing and prioritizing research and knowledge gaps that should be addressed to advance implementation of the <u>California Safer Consumer Products Program</u>. STPP Faculty Director Timothy F. Malloy and Program & Outreach Director Virginia Zaunbrecher are also participating in a national effort to develop a research agenda to advance alternatives analysis (AA)-a method to select safer alternatives to harmful chemicals and processes. Prof. Malloy is leading the AA Community of Practice Decision Analysis group, and Ms. Zaunbrecher is participating in the Hazard Assessment group.

STPP is also expanding its work on assessment of health impacts of the built environment. STPP Program Manager Christina Batteate continues to lead a team of researchers assessing the impact of <a href="CicLAvia">CicLAvia</a>, most recently at the August 9<sup>th</sup> event. She is also participating in an assessment of the proposed California high speed rail line and presented on the panel "Why Evaluate Open Streets" at the <a href="National Open Streets">National Open Streets</a>
<a href="Summit">Summit</a> 2015 from September 25-27<sup>th</sup> in Atlanta, Georgia.

Behind those headlines, observers willing to dig a bit deeper quickly discovered the fingerprints of prominent <a href="UCLA Law scholars">UCLA Law scholars</a>, whose research and amicus briefs were cited in some of the year's most important decisions.

# Gift Establishes Chair in Legal Ethics

Professor Scott Cummings Named Inaugural Robert Henigson Professor of Legal Ethics

UCLA School of Law has received a \$2 million gift from Meyer Luskin, a UCLA alumnus and the chairman, president and CEO of Scope Industries, to establish the Robert Henigson Endowed Chair in Legal Ethics. Luskin made the gift to commemorate his longstanding relationship with his friend and attorney, Robert Henigson, a prominent lawyer and philanthropist. Professor Scott Cummings, a distinguished member of the faculty since 2002, has been named the inaugural Robert Henigson professor of legal ethics in recognition of his contributions to our understanding of legal ethics and the legal profession.

# Professor Kang Appointed UCLA's Inaugural Vice Chancellor for Equity, Diversity and Inclusion

Professor <u>Jerry Kang</u> was <u>appointed</u> as UCLA's inaugural vice chancellor for equity, diversity and inclusion, and he assumed the position on July 1. In this capacity, he will serve as the senior campus official responsible for promoting equity and fundamental fairness at UCLA, leading and coordinating efforts to create a diverse, inclusive and welcoming environment for all students, staff, faculty, alumni and community partners.

A renowned scholar and a member of the UCLA Law faculty since 1995, Professor Kang has published influential research in numerous fields and is a leading scholar on implicit bias. He helped to establish the law school's Critical Race Studies Program and served as its founding co-director. He has advised multiple campus affinity organizations and journals, has served on numerous diversity task forces and contributes to various community and research-based advocacy efforts.

# Professor Eagly's Research Expands Understanding of Immigrant Representation

Professor Ingrid Eagly, the newly-appointed faculty director of the David J. Epstein Program in Public Interest Law and Policy, has authored two groundbreaking forthcoming articles based on new data related to immigration courts and the representation of immigrants. In the first national study of access to counsel in immigration courts, "A National Study of Access to Counsel in Immigration Court," 165 University of Pennsylvania Law Review (forthcoming, 2015), Professor Eagly and Steven Shafer '15 analyzed more than 1.2 million immigration cases decided between 2007 and 2012. They found that only 37% of all immigrants, and a mere 14% of detained immigrants, were represented by counsel. Moreover, having an attorney made a difference—for example, immigrants in detention won their cases at a rate 10.5 times greater than those who proceeded pro se. In addition, Professor Eagly's article "Remote Adjudication in Immigration," 109 Northwestern University Law Review (forthcoming, 2015), is the first empirical study of the use of televideo technology to adjudicate immigration court cases over a television screen, rather than in a traditional, in-person courtroom.

Professor Eagly also recently accompanied students Rocío Sánchez '16, Sonia Gutiérrez '16 and Jana Whalley '17 on a week-long trip to Dilley, Texas, to provide volunteer legal assistance to female asylum seekers and their children incarcerated in the South Texas Family Residential Center—the nation's largest immigrant detention facility. Working as part of the CARA Family Detention Pro Bono Project (CARA), they assisted women and children fleeing violence and persecution in Central America and Mexico in their credible-fear asylum interviews and bond hearings.

# International Human Rights Clinic Students Document Human Rights Violations in Los Angeles County Jails

Clinic students also work to improve access to information for Syrian refugees

Students in UCLA School of Law's International Human Rights Clinic drafted a report that documents human rights violations resulting from medical neglect of women of color incarcerated in the Los Angeles County jail system. On behalf of Dignity & Power Now, the students conducted research, developed an interview protocol and surveyed ex-inmates to document access to health care, including mental health care, in the jails, as well as the consequences inmates faced when treatment and medicine were not made available. The report, "Breaking the Silence: Civil and Human Rights Violations Resulting from Medical Neglect and Abuse of Women of Color in Los Angeles County Jails," released in August, details how Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Deputies and other personnel regularly denied the women interviewed vital mental and physical health care services. It underscores that the medical neglect violates domestic civil rights law, regional human rights law and international human rights law. Assistant Professor Tendayi Achiume, who leads the clinic, supervised the students' research

and edited the report.

On behalf of the Syrian League for Citizenship (a Syrian-led non-governmental organization in Lebanon), students in the clinic also worked to improve Syrian refugee access to legal and other services. The students created a guide detailing information dissemination strategies that have been successful in improving access to vital information during refugee crises. The guide will be translated into Arabic by the Syrian League for Citizenship, and distributed widely to refugees and their advocates in Lebanon.

# Williams Institute Research Impacts Marriage Equality

Williams Institute Research Director Gary Gates was cited in the U.S. Supreme Court's historic decision legalizing marriage equality nationwide.

In June, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the Constitution requires marriage equality, extending "equal dignity" to one million same-sex couples nationwide. The historic decision cited an amicus brief by Blachford-Cooper Distinguished Scholar and Research Director <u>Gary Gates</u> and his research on the families of same-sex couples. The Williams Institute's <u>research</u> was cited in more than half of the briefs filed in the Supreme Court case. The decision legalized marriage equality in the last 13 states that still banned it, states in which same-sex couples are more likely to have children, to earn less and to be racial or ethnic minorities, according to Williams Institute analyses. Approximately 70,000 same-sex couples are expected to marry in these states in the next three years.

# J.D. Specialization in International and Comparative Law Launches

In the spring, UCLA Law's <u>International and Comparative Law Program</u> launched a <u>specialization</u> in International and Comparative Law for J.D. students. The specialization is designed for students pursuing advanced study in international and comparative law, including international human rights law, and for those who intend to practice in those fields. More than 40 2L and 3L students are enrolled for the 2015-16 academic year. Students in the specialization can choose to structure their own curriculum to focus on any number of priorities, such as public international law, comparative constitutional law, international human rights law, international criminal law, international trade law and international intellectual property law, among others. The law school also offers a <u>specialization</u> for LL.M. students.

# U.S. Supreme Court Grants Petition in UCLA Law Supreme Court Clinic Case

The U.S. Supreme Court recently granted the petition for certiorari filed by Professor Stuart Banner and UCLA Law's Supreme Court Clinic on behalf of Jorge Torres in the case Torres v. Lynch. Professor Banner and students in the clinic drafted and filed the petition in March and a reply brief in the case in May. The case addresses whether the conviction of a crime of arson under state law is an "aggravated felony" that can lead to deportation of a lawful permanent resident in the United States. Professor Banner, who leads the clinic, is working with students in preparation for the oral argument, which is scheduled for Tuesday, November 3, 2015.

# Shapiro Family Charitable Foundation Gift Supports the Emmett Institute

The Shapiro Family Charitable Foundation has made a gift of \$500,000 to establish the Ann Carlson

Discretionary Fund, which will be used to support the <u>Emmett Institute on Climate Change and the Environment</u>. The fund will be used for a wide variety of needs and opportunities, including graduate and undergraduate scholarships, fellowships, faculty projects and research. The gift will be matched through the Dan and Rae Emmett Matching Gift Challenge, doubling its impact.

Ralph '58 and Shirley Shapiro have deep and lasting ties to UCLA and a long history of philanthropic support to UCLA Law. They have endowed four chairs at UCLA Law, including the Shirley Shapiro Chair in Environmental Law. A long-time member of the UCLA Foundation Board of Directors, Ralph Shapiro has served as president of the UCLA School of Law Alumni Association and as a member of the law school's board of advisors. Shirley Shapiro is a member of the Emmett Institute advisory board.

# Lowell Milken Institute Explores Diverging Points of View on Activist Funds

In March, the Lowell Milken Institute for Business Law and Policy issued the "2015 Private Fund Report: The Role of Activist Funds" and held the second annual Private Funds Conference. This year's conference focused on the current role of activist funds, which have taken the lead in challenging corporate management to deliver value to company shareholders. The 2015 conference attracted more than 80 attendees, including fund managers, investors, financial advisors, lawyers, academics, students and members of the public. It featured leading participants in the world of activist funds, including keynote speaker Anne Sheehan, director of corporate governance at CalSTRS, who explained why CalSTRS invests in activist funds.

# Inaugural UCLA-Harvard Food Law and Policy Conference Focuses on Transparency in the Food System

In October 2014, the Resnick Program for Food Law and Policy and the Food Law Lab at Harvard Law School hosted the first annual UCLA-Harvard Food Law and Policy Conference, "Transparency in the Global Food System: What Information and to What Ends?" The sold-out conference brought together notable academics and practitioners for a discussion of the issue of transparency in the food system. Panel topics addressed the meaning of transparency, the role of the consumer in driving changes in the food system and whether transparency can help address problems in the food industry. Dr. David A. Kessler, former commissioner of the United States Food and Drug Administration and current professor at the University of California, San Francisco Medical School, delivered the keynote presentation on "The End of Overeating."

## Susan Akens Named Executive Director of Entertainment, Media, and Intellectual Property Law Program

<u>Susan Akens</u>, previously executive vice president, business affairs, at CBS Studios International, has been <u>appointed</u> executive director of UCLA School of Law's Entertainment, Media, and Intellectual Property Law Program. She joined the law school in July, replacing David R. Ginsburg who retired in June.

Akens was named executive vice president, business affairs, at Paramount Pictures International Television in 2003, a division that was merged into CBS Studios International in 2006. In this position, she oversaw all international business and legal affairs, set strategy for the division and led a team based in the United States and Europe. She previously served as special counsel for the entertainment department of O'Melveny & Myers LLP, representing clients in a broad variety of entertainment and multimedia transactions.

# Seventh Critical Race Studies Symposium Celebrates the Work of Professor Cheryl Harris

In October 2014, nearly 400 scholars, advocates and activists from around the globe came together for the Seventh Annual Critical Race Studies Symposium, "Whiteness as Property: A Twenty-Year Appraisal." The two-day event celebrated one of the seminal texts of Critical Race Theory, "Whiteness as Property," which was written by UCLA Law Professor Cheryl Harris, Rosalinde and Arthur Gilbert professor in civil rights and civil liberties, and published in 1993 in the Harvard Law Review. The participants reflected on the political, legal and intellectual context out of which "Whiteness as Property" emerged, explored the article's impact, and considered how its theoretical arguments have shaped contemporary civil rights debates, pedagogy, legal practice and social movement organizing. Professor Harris delivered the event's keynote address, discussing the personal and political genealogy of the article.

# UCLA Law Inaugurates Transnational Program on Criminal Justice

The 2014-15 academic year marked the inauguration of the law school's <u>Transnational Program on Criminal Justice (TPCJ)</u>. Led by Professor <u>Máximo Langer</u>, the program fosters research and discussion on issues of international criminal justice systems and sponsors events to engage students and the criminal justice and comparative and international law scholarly community.

In February, the program hosted the Latin American Criminal Justice in Action workshop, bringing together leading researchers working on Latin American criminal justice systems. TPCJ also launched the UCLA Criminal Justice Faculty Workshop, convening faculty members and doctoral students throughout UCLA whose work is focused on criminal justice issues. In the coming year, the program is planning an international, cross-disciplinary conference on the relationship between prosecutors and democracy in multiple countries and from different theoretical positions.

# Environmental Law Clinic Students Participate in UN Climate Talks in Peru

Students in the Frank G. Wells Environmental Law Clinic received hands-on experience advising on climate change issues as delegates at the 20th annual Conference of Parties (COP20) to the United Nations' Framework Convention on Climate Change. The students traveled to Lima, Peru, in December with Cara Horowitz, Andrew Sabin Family Foundation co-executive director of the Emmett Institute on Climate Change and the Environment and co-director of the clinic. In Peru, they acted as legal advisors, attending negotiation sessions and providing legal analyses and other support to clinic client Islands First, which assists small, developing island nations in international negotiations. This is the third time that UCLA Law students have participated in the climate talks; students attended the UN climate conferences in Copenhagen, Denmark, in 2009 and Durban, South Africa, in 2011. A group of students is scheduled to participate in the upcoming climate change conference in Paris, France, in November and December 2015.

## UCLA Law Launches Initiatives to Connect Alumni

UCLA Law recently launched new initiatives to help alumni connect and foster networking and mentoring opportunities. In January, the law school hosted an intimate discussion with Senator Kirsten Gillibrand '91 to mark the official launch of <u>UCLA Law Women LEAD</u>, an intergenerational network of distinguished alumnae aimed at empowering and supporting them in their careers. In March, the law

school celebrated the launch of UCLA Law Unite, an initiative to connect alumni of all backgrounds with students from many of the organizations and journals focused on the diverse student community for mentoring, professional development and other engagement opportunities. <u>UCLA Law Connect</u>, a digital networking platform exclusive to UCLA Law alumni, was also created to provide a meaningful, seamless way for alumni to stay in touch with the law school and with each other.


