Dear UCLA Emmett Institute board --

Three quick items today:

**First,** we are looking forward to seeing you at the law school on **Monday, November 14 at 10:30am** for our next Board meeting. Please check your calendars and make sure they are marked! Details to follow.

**Second**, you may have heard news reports of the long-awaited court hearing in the DC Circuit Court of Appeals earlier this week, on the validity of the Clean Power Plan, EPA's rule for limiting carbon emissions from existing power plants. Though it's hard to predict outcomes from hearings, it looks like EPA had a good day in court.

The Emmett Institute submitted a brief in the case on behalf of electricity grid experts. Cara, Ann, our former Emmett/Frankel Fellow Megan Herzog, and our Shapiro Fellow Sarah Duffy authored that brief, along with Prof. William Boyd of the University of Colorado Law School.

Our recent fellow Megan Herzog was at the D.C. Circuit and sent us her impressions, which were very positive.

She also relayed generous praise she heard for our brief. In the brief, my colleagues worked to educate the court about grid operations in an effort to bolster EPA's reliance on generation-shifting to reduce emissions.

(See this blog post explaining the issue at the heart of our brief, and this one that goes into detail and includes a link to the brief.)

Apparently, the Emmett Institute's brief may end up being influential in the case; it was referred to several times by the judges and by counsel during key moments of the argument.

One lawyer for the State of California who was at the hearing reached out afterward and wrote, "I don't think I have ever heard of a more effective amicus brief."

Fingers crossed that all of this points to a good result.

**Third**, we'd like to invite you to attend an upcoming Emmett Institute event. 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She also relayed generous praise she heard for our brief. In the brief, my colleagues worked to educate the court about grid operations in an effort to bolster EPA's reliance on generation-shifting to reduce emissions.

(See this blog post explaining the issue at the heart of our brief, and this one that goes into detail and includes a link to the brief.)

Apparently, the Emmett Institute's brief may end up being influential in the case; it was referred to several times by the judges and by counsel during key moments of the argument.

One lawyer for the State of California who was at the hearing reached out afterward and wrote, "I don't think I have ever heard of a more effective amicus brief."

Fingers crossed that all of this points to a good result.

Dear Emmett Institute Advisory Board members:

In these difficult and uncertain times for our environment, we're working to contribute to thoughtful research, dialogue, and policy analysis on climate change and other environmental issues. Here in

California, and with the expertise that the Emmett Institute has developed, we're particularly well-situated to do this work right now. We thought it would be helpful to provide a quick update on what we've been doing recently, with the support of all of you.

First, some business: Our **next Emmett Institute board meeting** will be on **Monday May 1, 3pm-5pm, with dinner afterwards**. Please mark your calendars, and please let me or Cara know at your convenience whether you'll be able to attend the meeting and/or the dinner.

Second, I want to note that our program has once again **been ranked by U.S. News and World Report as fifth in the country among environmental law programs**. This year, we're alone in fifth place (last year we were tied). The first three schools are environmental specialty schools, leaving UC Berkeley and us to round out the top five. The solid #5 ranking reflects that we have continued to grow and to improve our depth and reach.

In the rest of this email, we'll highlight some of what we've been doing, in the areas of Research and Analysis, Public Education and Media, and Student Work and Activities. Later this spring we will send out a more complete email discussing our work more comprehensively.

I apologize for the length of this email, but as you will see, we've been doing a lot! We've included a lot of links in case you want to explore our work in depth.

#### Research, insight, and analysis

Our faculty have been very active in conducting research and contributing to public discourse on environmental policy issues through their writing and other work. While much of this work relates directly to the impact of the change in federal administration, we also continue forward with other efforts. Some examples follow:

- This <u>post on Legal Planet collects useful resources</u> on this week's executive order rolling back federal climate regulation. It will be helpful to anyone looking to learn more about what's going on.
- Ann Carlson posted <u>this insightful analysis</u> of the impact of the administration's policies on our Paris Agreement commitments, and

this earlier discussion of the administration's early actions rolling back the Clean Water Rule and climate actions.

- Ann is co-editing a forthcoming book with economist Dallas Burtraw called "The Future of Clean Energy Policy: Lessons from the Clean Air Act." She recently hosted an all day meeting with economists, policymakers, lawyers and political scientists at Resources for the Future in DC relating to that project.
- Tim Malloy just had a Policy Forum piece published in the highlyregarded scientific journal *Science* earlier this month. <u>Tim's essay</u>, coauthored with Dr. Andre Nel, makes recommendations for policy reforms to improve chemical safety testing.
- Jim Salzman has a <u>work in progress</u> on the impact of administrative agency budgets on agency output – a particularly salient issue right now.
- Last fall, Alex Wang and Ann posted <u>this much-cited piece</u> on how U/S/ backsliding on climate policy could position China as the world's leader.
- Our fellow Nick Bryner <u>analyzed some aspects of the climate change</u> <u>executive order</u> issued this week by the administration.
- <u>This essay</u> that I authored— to be published in Resource Management Bulletin explains how the administration's approach to the USEPA is at odds with the history, mission, and regulatory actions of the agency.

#### Public education and media

Our faculty have been frequent commenters, both on the Legal Planet blog and in print and radio media, on the evolving policies in the new administration, and on California environmental and climate policy. Our media appearances and quotations are collected on the <a href="Emmett Institute newsfeed page">Emmett Institute newsfeed page</a>. Here are some highlights:

Ann Carlson has been featured in print and broadcast coverage dozens
of times in recent months, commenting on federal and state climate
policy. Her commentary on federal and California climate policy has
been featuredon <u>Larry Mantle's AirTalk</u>, as well as the <u>San Francisco</u>
<u>Chronicle</u>, <u>Science Friday</u>, <u>the Atlantic</u>, and many other publications –
most recently, this <u>lengthy article in The American Prospect</u> about

California's leadership.

- Ted Parson has been continuing his crucial work on solar climate engineering governance – work that looks to be increasingly important in the coming years, as countries will look to a wide range of solutions if greenhouse gas reduction targets aren't met. This topic has hit the news in recent weeks. He was on NPR's Morning Edition this week discussing climate engineering, and has been featured in Yale Climate Connections and in other media such as Men's Journal.
- Alex Wang has been a frequent source for major media on issues
  relating to China and environmental law. He recently was quoted in
  the New York Times speaking about both <u>China's poor air quality</u> and
  how China may respond to the U.S.'s backing off on its climate
  commitments.
- Jim Salzman has been quoted by <u>CBS News about the role of the EPA</u>, and by <u>Scientific American in an in-depth report on drinking water</u>.
- Cara Horowitz has also made numerous media appearances. She has been quoted in the <u>Los Angeles Times</u>, <u>Wired</u>, and other print media about California and federal emissions standards and climate change, and has been featured many times on public radio, including interviews on KPCC about the <u>new executive order on climate policy</u>.
- Sean Hecht similarly has been featured in the Wall Street Journal and the Los Angeles Times about environmental laws and the proposed border wall, and on KCRW discussing the administration's budget and California's environment and the California vehicle emissions standards.

We've also been participating in policy and strategy work, including:

• High-level meetings with various stakeholders about how we can contribute, through research and service, to efforts to maintain environmental protections in the face of federal rollbacks. Our work will likely include providing research and support to address efforts to roll back mobile source emissions standards, as well as the Clean Power Plan and the companion New Source Performance Standards for fossil fuel electrical generating units. (We filed briefs in federal lawsuits defending both rules.)

• Working with California legislators and staff to support them with refining legislation to backstop our environmental policies in the event that Congress or federal agencies significantly weaken federal protections. Among these efforts is a collaboration between members of our faculty and Berkeley Law faculty to provide guidance to California state legislators about what they can do to regulate transportation emissions if the California waiver that allows our state to regulate mobile source emissions is withdrawn.

#### Student work and activities

Our students continue to do excellent work as well. Here are some examples.

- Our clinic this past fall helped to address air quality in southern California by assisting Earthjustice in its advocacy for a strong Air Quality Management Plan in the South Coast Air Quality Management District. Our work, involving the entire clinical class of 10 students, helped Earthjustice to make the case for changes to its proposed management plan, including arguing persuasively for the phase-out of the unsuccessful RECLAIM emissions-trading program. The AQMD governing board voted in favor of that phase-out earlier this year.
- Our students have also excelled in extracurricular pursuits under the guidance of faculty.
  - o Two student teams from UCLA Law participated in the California State Bar Environmental Law Section 2017 Student Negotiations Competition, held at Golden Gate University Law School. Crescent Cheng '18 and Ilan Isaacs '17 won second prize. Hallie Kutak '18 and Danika Desai '18 also competed well and fiercely. They honed their negotiation and arbitration skills through simulated settlement discussions based on realistic environmental law fact patterns.
  - o Our UCLA students were also strong competitors at the Jeffrey G. Miller Pace National Environmental Law Moot Court Competition this February. This competition attracts hundreds of competitors from many law schools across the country and tests skills in appellate brief writing and oral advocacy. Teams come

from all over the country and compete in a multi-day appellate moot centered on an environmental law problem (this year's involved the Endangered Species Act and takings law). Sean selected and coached our team, made up of Shannon Clark, Terra Laughton, and Lani Maher, all '17. They prepared well and achieved results to show for it: Both Shannon and Terra won Best Oralist awards (given to one student in each argument round), and the team advanced to the national quarter-finals.

 We have students serving as environmental externs during the school year in 2016-17 at these environmental placements: Communities for a Better Environment, Natural Resources Defense Council, NOAA Office of General Counsel, and the California Attorney General's Office.

As always, we really appreciate the advisory board's support and guidance on our work. We're energized to continue our efforts in the new year.

Dear Emmett Institute Advisory Board members:

In these difficult and uncertain times for our environment, we're working to contribute to thoughtful research, dialogue, and policy analysis on climate change and other environmental issues. Here in California, and with the expertise that the Emmett Institute has developed, we're particularly well-situated to do this work right now. We thought it would be helpful to provide a quick update on what we've been doing recently, with the support of all of you.

First, some business: Our **next Emmett Institute board meeting** will be on **Monday May 1, 3pm-5pm, with dinner afterwards**. Please mark your calendars, and please let me or Cara know at your convenience whether you'll be able to attend the meeting and/or the dinner. Second, I want to note that our program has once again **been ranked by U.S. News and World Report as fifth in the country among environmental law programs**. This year, we're alone in fifth place (last year we were tied). The first three schools are environmental specialty schools, leaving UC Berkeley and us to round out the top five. The solid #5 ranking reflects that we have continued to grow and to improve our depth and reach.

In the rest of this email, we'll highlight some of what we've been doing, in the areas of Research and Analysis, Public Education and Media, and Student Work and Activities. Later this spring we will send out a more complete email discussing our work more comprehensively.

I apologize for the length of this email, but as you will see, we've been doing a lot! We've included a lot of links in case you want to explore our work in depth.

# Research, insight, and analysis

Our faculty have been very active in conducting research and contributing to public discourse on environmental policy issues through their writing and other work. While much of this work relates directly to the impact of the change in federal administration, we also continue forward with other efforts. Some examples follow:

his <u>post on Legal Planet collects useful resources</u> on this week's executive order rolling back federal climate regulation. It will be helpful to anyone looking to learn more about what's going on.

nn Carlson posted <u>this insightful analysis</u> of the impact of the administration's policies on our Paris Agreement commitments, and <u>this earlier discussion</u> of the administration's early actions rolling back the Clean Water Rule and climate actions.

Inn is co-editing a forthcoming book with economist Dallas Burtraw called "The Future of Clean Energy Policy: Lessons from the Clean Air Act." She recently hosted an all day meeting with economists, policymakers, lawyers and political scientists at Resources for the Future in DC relating to that project.

im Malloy just had a Policy Forum piece published in the highly-regarded scientific journal *Science* earlier this month. <u>Tim's essay</u>, co-authored with Dr. Andre Nel, makes recommendations for policy reforms to improve chemical safety testing.

im Salzman has a <u>work in progress</u> on the impact of administrative agency budgets on agency output – a particularly salient issue right now.

ast fall, Alex Wang and Ann posted <u>this much-cited piece</u> on how U/S/ backsliding on climate policy could position China as the world's leader.

Our fellow Nick Bryner <u>analyzed some aspects of the climate change executive order</u> issued this week by the administration.

<u>his essay</u> that I authored—to be published in Resource Management Bulletin—explains how the administration's approach to the USEPA is at odds with the history, mission, and regulatory actions of the agency.

# Public education and media

Our faculty have been frequent commenters, both on the Legal Planet blog and in print and radio media, on the evolving policies in the new administration, and on California environmental and climate policy. Our media appearances and quotations are collected on the <a href="Emmett Institute newsfeed page">Emmett Institute newsfeed page</a>. Here are some highlights:

nn Carlson has been featured in print and broadcast coverage dozens of times in recent months, commenting on federal and state climate policy. Her commentary on federal and California climate policy has been featuredon <a href="Larry Mantle's AirTalk">Larry Mantle's AirTalk</a>, as well as the <a href="San Erancisco Chronicle">San Erancisco Chronicle</a>, <a href="Science Friday">Science Friday</a>, <a href="the Atlantic">the Atlantic</a>, and many other publications — most recently, this <a href="lengthy article">lengthy article</a> in The American Prospect about California's leadership.

ed Parson has been continuing his crucial work on solar climate engineering governance — work that looks to be increasingly important in the coming years, as countries will look to a wide range of solutions if greenhouse gas reduction targets aren't met. This topic has hit the news in recent weeks. He was on NPR's Morning Edition this week discussing climate engineering, and has been featured in Yale Climate Connections and in other media such as Men's Journal.

lex Wang has been a frequent source for major media on issues relating to China and environmental law. He recently was quoted in the New York Times speaking about both China's poor air quality and how China may respond to the U.S.'s backing off on its climate commitments.

im Salzman has been quoted by <u>CBS News about the role of the EPA</u>, and by <u>Scientific American</u> in an in-depth report on drinking water.

ara Horowitz has also made numerous media appearances. She has been quoted in the <u>Los</u> <u>Angeles Times</u>, <u>Wired</u>, and other print media about California and federal emissions standards and climate change, and has been featured many times on public radio, including interviews on KPCC about the <u>new executive order on climate policy</u>.

ean Hecht similarly has been featured in the Wall Street Journal and the <u>Los Angeles Times</u> about environmental laws and the proposed border wall, and on <u>KCRW discussing the</u> administration's budget and California's environment and the California vehicle emissions standards.

We've also been participating in policy and strategy work, including:

• High-level meetings with various stakeholders about how we can contribute, through research and service, to efforts to maintain environmental protections in the face of federal rollbacks. Our work will likely include providing research and support to address efforts to roll back mobile source emissions standards, as well as the Clean Power Plan and the companion New Source Performance Standards for fossil fuel electrical generating units. (We filed briefs in federal lawsuits defending both rules.)

Vorking with California legislators and staff to support them with refining legislation to backstop our environmental policies in the event that Congress or federal agencies significantly weaken federal protections. Among these efforts is a collaboration between members of our faculty and Berkeley Law faculty to provide guidance to California state legislators about what they can do to regulate transportation emissions if the California waiver that allows our state to

regulate mobile source emissions is withdrawn.

# Student work and activities

Our students continue to do excellent work as well. Here are some examples.

Our clinic this past fall helped to address air quality in southern California by assisting

Earthjustice in its advocacy for a strong Air Quality Management Plan in the South Coast Air

Quality Management District. Our work, involving the entire clinical class of 10 students,

helped Earthjustice to make the case for changes to its proposed management plan, including
arguing persuasively for the phase-out of the unsuccessful RECLAIM emissions-trading
program. The AQMD governing board voted in favor of that phase-out earlier this year.

Our students have also excelled in extracurricular pursuits under the guidance of faculty.

- o Two student teams from UCLA Law participated in the California State Bar Environmental Law Section 2017 Student Negotiations Competition, held at Golden Gate University Law School. **Crescent Cheng '18 and Ilan Isaacs '17 won second prize.** Hallie Kutak '18 and Danika Desai '18 also competed well and fiercely. They honed their negotiation and arbitration skills through simulated settlement discussions based on realistic environmental law fact patterns.
- o Our UCLA students were also strong competitors at the Jeffrey G. Miller Pace National Environmental Law Moot Court Competition this February. This competition attracts hundreds of competitors from many law schools across the country and tests skills in appellate brief writing and oral advocacy. Teams come from all over the country and compete in a multi-day appellate moot centered on an environmental law problem (this year's involved the Endangered Species Act and takings law). Sean selected and coached our team, made up of Shannon Clark, Terra Laughton, and Lani Maher, all '17. They prepared well and achieved results to show for it: Both Shannon and Terra won Best Oralist awards (given to one student in each argument round), and the team advanced to the national quarter-finals.

Ve have students serving as environmental externs during the school year in 2016-17 at these environmental placements: Communities for a Better Environment, Natural Resources Defense Council, NOAA Office of General Counsel, and the California Attorney General's Office.

As always, we really appreciate the advisory board's support and guidance on our work. We're energized to continue our efforts in the new year.

I am writing regarding my unanswered January 9, 2019 letter

(http://scientificintegrityinstitute.org/emmett010919.pdf) and our March 18, 2019 meeting in Beverly Hills. As you may recall, I am the UCLA scientist who met your childhood neighbor Dick Gould at Stanford University during the time I was earning my PhD in elementary particle physics from Nobel Laureate Melvin Schwartz. I have overwhelming evidence that you are associated with two of the most academically dishonest and anti-science environmental attorneys in the United States.

First, Wendy B. Jacobs, Esq., Emmett Clinical Professor of Environmental Law and Director, Emmett Environmental Law & Policy Clinic (EELPC), opposes transparency and reproducibility in her 40-page August 20, 2019 letter criticizing EPA's Proposed Rule "Strengthening Transparency in Regulatory Science" (<a href="https://yosemite.epa.gov/sab/sabproduct.nsf//MeetingCalBOARD/D2ABF27DBBCB6CF6852584420063E4367">https://yosemite.epa.gov/sab/sabproduct.nsf//MeetingCalBOARD/D2ABF27DBBCB6CF6852584420063E4367</a> OpenDocument). She certainly knows that transparency and reproducibility are fundamental aspects of the Scientific Method and that the EPA Transparency Rule is entirely justified.

Last week, our Frank G. Wells Environmental Law Clinic filed an <u>amicus (friend of the Court) brief</u> in the U.S. Supreme Court on behalf of a group of world-class scientists including <b>E.O. Wilson</b> , <b>Stuart Pimm</b> , and UCLA's own <b>Brad Shaffer</b> . Sean Hecht authored this brief with significant assistance from two of our clinic students, <b>Jen Garlock</b> and <b>Heejin Hwang</b> .
In the brief, Sean and the clinic students argue that the Court shouldn't gut the habitat protections of the Endangered Species Act, and instead should keep the longstanding, science-based interpretation of the Act's approach to designating critical habitat.

This case involves the Dusky Gopher Frog, an amphibian species that has had its habitat curtailed so much that it's at risk of extinction. As the Center for

Biological Diversity, the advocacy organization leading the charge on this case, has <u>noted</u>:

Once prevalent in Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama, dusky gopher frogs are nearly extinct. More than 98 percent of longleaf pine forests — upon which the frog and many other rare animals depend — have been destroyed. Fire suppression, drought, pesticides, urban sprawl, highway construction and the decline of gopher tortoises have made this frog so rare it now lives in only a few small Mississippi ponds, with only one pond showing consistent frog reproduction.

Weyerhaeuser Co. v. Fish and Wildlife Service will be the very <u>first case argued</u> in the Supreme Court this coming year, on Monday, October 1, 2018. Congratulations to Sean, Jen and Heejin for their contribution to arguments in this important case.

#### Hello, everyone;

I am writing to loop everyone in on a great opportunity we've been discussing. First of all, Dan, thank you so much for introducing us to Bonnie and her team - they've been just wonderful. As a matter of fact, Bonnie has offered to host a launch event at USC, and was thinking that it might be an interesting opportunity for the Emmett Center to get involved as well. Please let us know if you might be interested. Bonnie, Mebus and Conyers, thanks for taking time to brainstorm on Tuesday. I hope this note adequately expresses our conversation.

This email is meant to serve several purposes: 1) notes from Tuesday's call; 2) answers to some of the questions raised on the call (from Jim Morris, our managing editor for environment – who is heading up this initiative); and 3) prompt to further our planning for the event. It's a bit long, unfortunately.

#### Following are the broad strokes:

- We are looking to host an event to highlight the launch of Carbon Wars, which is targeted to take place the week of Sept 24. Carbon Wars is a multi-year investigation, that will include a series of stories about the fossil fuel industry. This will include some stories focused in CA and other areas, which will be released starting in September, as well as a 15-minute documentary being filmed by Weather Channel/Weather.com and some online tools. Our other major partner is USA Today/Gannett. More detail is attached and in notes from Jim, below.
- We are looking to come to LA for a film viewing and discussion in early October which is when we plan to release the CA stories. Based on our discussion this week, these are the dates that work for the team at the Schwarzenegger Institute. **Monday Oct 17 or Mon-Thu week of Oct 24.** Jim mentioned that he prefers 10/17 if at all possible.
- Dan, are you interested in participating, and if so, how is your availability during these dates? Bonnie suggests that a daytime event would be best, unless specific invited panelists/public officials would be more available in the evening.

#### INITIAL THOUGHTS ON THE EVENT:

• Tone and purpose of the event. Goal of event: highlighting report and its CA revelations, broadening our audience, engaging with people connected to the climate change movement in CA. Target audience/attendance: people who are influential in this space. Bonnie suggests to aim for 30-40 of the 'right people' rather

than try to fill a room with 100-200 people.

- Participants: Jim would be our "featured expert". I will check in with Peter Bale, our CEO, who returns from vacation on Monday re his availability. Jim thinks inviting one of our partners from the weather channel would be a good idea. Other suggestions include Names mentioned for local participants include Matt Rodriguez, CA Sec of EPA, BiPartisan Policy Center, Key state senators involved in climate change issues.
- **The Program:** show the film; presentation by CPI and possibly Weather Channel; potentially respondents (public officials); and roundtable discussion.

I also checked in with Jim, who is headed out for vacation until 8/22 with some of the questions that were raised on the call. He is happy to have a follow up discussion. In the meantime, I'm hoping we can nail down a date.

#### **NOTES FROM JIM:**

- Oct. 17 would be my preference for the event, whose main purpose, in my view, would be to announce CPI's long-term presence in California as an investigator and documenter of the fossil-fuel industry's influence and misdeeds
- I don't see press coming to the event; I see the audience more as decision-makers, subject-matter experts, advocates and potential funders. Frankly, I'm not sure I'd want press there given that we're going to be telegraphing some of our upcoming work and would prefer that outlets like the LA Times not know about it.
- The two California stories planned for the fall aren't track the oil
  industry's stunning string of political victories in the state over the
  past few years and show the public health impacts of regulatory
  capture in places like the LA Basin and Kern County. We'll be doing
  additional work in California next year.
- Among the groups we're talking to are the Sierra Club, the Natural Resources Defense Council, Earthjustice, Communities for a Better Environment and the Center for Biological Diversity.
- As for what we want the public to "do": We want them to pressure their state legislators to vote for public health and the climate rather than Big Oil; we want them to share our data and stories widely so elected officials and regular citizens become informed about issues like air pollution and fracking; and we want state and federal regulators to know they are being watched. We want to become the destination for investigative climate reporting in California, the U.S. and, eventually, other nations.

Happy to talk to Bonnie and her team when I return from vacation the week of Aug. 22.

- Bonnie and team, please let me know if this accurately reflects our call and the ideas we discussed.
- Dan, please let us know your interest and availability, either individually, or via the Emmett Center
- Finalizing dates leading with Monday, October 17, or the following

week as outlined above.

Yet, these student groups continue to flourish amidst the propaganda from Palestine and elsewhere.


Today's generations, never learned, or forgot or ignore world history.

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

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HIKING: Big Sur - Climate Ride - Emmett Institute & Friends Late March 2019 Itinerary – Proposed

### Day One – Arrival in Carmel

Late afternoon arrival in Carmel. Get ready to explore the epic Big Sur Coast. If desired, we can begin our explorations by taking a short walk through Carmel River State Beach, featuring white sands, booming surf and a rare salt marsh habitat.

Potential Accommodations: Carmel Mission Inn - https://www.carmelmissioninn.com/

### Day Two – Point Lobos State Reserve, Garrapata State Park

A short shuttle of Carmel brings us to Point Lobos State Reserve, which has been described as the "crown jewel of the California State Park system." We'll hike amidst jagged rocky headlands, pristine coves lined with kelp forests and groves of wind sculpted pines. Point Lobos has also been home to many varied peoples through the ages and we'll learn about it's colorful past as we listen for sea lions in the surf. Morning hiking length can vary from 5-7 miles. After a picnic lunch, we'll drive another short way south to Garrapata State Park for an afternoon hike filled with classic views of the Big Sur coast as well as meadows filled with wildflowers and a redwood canyon. Afternoon hiking length can vary from 2-5 miles. Other options include spending the entire day at Point Lobos (14 total miles of trail available) instead of going to Garrapata State Park in the afternoon.

### Day Three – Andrew Molera State Park, Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park

A scenic drive down the Big Sur coast brings us to Andrew Molera State Park, and our longest hike of the trip. Fording the Big Sur River (seasonal bridges will not have been put up yet) we'll have an amazing bit of the Big Sur coast virtually to ourselves. The Pfeiffer Ridge and Bluff Trail Loop offers 9 miles of diverse landscapes, from sycamore lined creeks to gravelly beaches, to long climbs through coastal scrub and a miles of unbroken coastal views. A shorter loop of 4-6 miles is possible as well. After taking all this in, we'll shuttle the short distance to Pfeiffer Big Sur State Park for a well-earned rest under the redwoods at the Big Sur Lodge. Optional short hikes into the redwoods round out the day. Another option is to visit historic Point Sur Lighthouse in the morning and take the tour there (3 hours) and then do the shorter loop at Andrew Molera in the afternoon.

### Day Four – Partington Cove – Lime Kiln State Park

In the morning we'll continue south on another scenic drive past such Big Sur landmarks as Nepenthe on the way to the short hike at Partington Cove, where we'll explore a hidden tunnel out to an historic boat landing while watching for gray whales as they migrate north. Keep your eyes peeled for the rare California Condor as they can sometimes be see above Partington Cove as well. Further south we'll picnic at Mill Creek as a cascading stream tumbles into the Pacific. After lunch, the magical redwood forest along the creeks at Lime Kiln State Park beckons. Our explorations there will yield the historical lime kilns tucked into hidden glade as well as one of the finest waterfalls in Big Sur.

I'm writing to see if you would be interested in participating and helping to think through a fundraising hike for the Emmett Institute sometime next summer or early fall. You might not be aware of the fact that next year will be the 10th anniversary of the Institute and we would like to commemorate our decade of work in various ways. The hike is one possibility.

Here is the general idea. We would work with the organizers of ClimateRide/Hike to put together an Emmett-only hike at an as yet to be determined venue. It could be at Glacier again or could be at Bryce/Zion or another national park. Is there an estimate for participation cost? 

Yes, this basically extends what has been going on the last five years—\$200,000 a year for current use, and \$300,000 a year in matching funds. If matching funds are raised the matching pledge will hopefully generate \$600,000 a year. From prior pledges the only thing that remains is \$500,000 in matching funds payable this June which includes the balance of matching funds due under the prior pledge plus \$125,000 to cover new pledge last year from Shapiros.

In terms of how the funds are used it is basically up to the Institute to make that determination but the general and specific categories should be articulated in the new pledge agreement of which I will do a first draft.

Let me know if any questions. I think the math is right but I did it quickly.

Thanks so much for sending this along, and for talking to us yesterday about the really incredible possibilities for Emmett over the next few years.

I'm working to interpret what you sent and make sure I understand what you're proposing. I am not sure that I am understanding it correctly, and if it would be easier to talk on the phone, that would be great too. It looks to me like perhaps you are replicating the gift you made last time -- is that correct? That was a \$1 million current use gift plus \$1.5 million to match. The previous gift was \$5 M,

mixed as part match, part direct gift.

As you know, we completed the most recent match in full and exceeded it and you agreed to match an additional amount up to \$1.67 million in all (a bit above your original \$1.5 million match). As I understand it, you paid the \$1 million in \$200,000 installments and have a balance of \$505,000 due by June 30, 2018 for the match.

It looks, if I am understanding this correctly, like you a proposing an additional \$1 million over the next five years? And I'm not altogether sure if you are proposing a new match or not?

We appreciate everything you have done and are doing to support our work. You have made this Institute possible, and we are flourishing – and making a difference – thanks to you. We are really hoping to have you make a gift that will allow us to grow Emmett in the directions we described in our proposal and at lunch yesterday. Your voicemail asks how we would spend support at a level of \$300k/\$500k (that is, a pledge of \$300k/year and the potential for an additional matching component of \$500k/year), which would give the Institute a total of \$6.5M in support, including matched funds, over five years.

Each of the scenarios in this memo contemplates a gift that goes entirely to current-use funding and includes a significant match component. The descriptions of what each gift level could accomplish assume that:

- (1) we will meet the matching challenge in full, and
- (2) the matched gifts will come entirely as current-use, unrestricted funds, or as funds dedicated to our very highest priorities.

Because we cannot entirely control the terms under which matches are donated, our ability to achieve the outcomes in each of these tiers may be reduced if matched gifts are not 100 percent aligned with our very top priorities, or if some portion of these matches is given in the form of endowment.

Under each scenario, the gift term is five years. We hope that these provide helpful illustrative scenarios that can offer some concrete descriptions of just how much we could accomplish with each successive gift tier. We have also included a budget summary for each of the key areas that your gift would support.

We would be happy to discuss our proposal in further detail or any answer any questions you may have after you have had an opportunity to review it.

As always, we are extremely grateful for your generosity and support. We would welcome the chance to discuss these opportunities for continued growth of the Emmett Institute and its work. Many, many thanks for all that you do.

# EMMETT INSTITUTE ON CLIMATE CHANGE AND THE ENVIRONMENT COSTS FOR PRIORITY AREAS

## **Continue Funding Most Current Operations**

\$4 million over 5 years

Includes staff, faculty and programming, including the co-executive directors, communications director, 3 fellows, clinical supervising attorney and program expenses. Excludes current scholarships & fellowship.

#### **New Institute Policy and Research Initiatives**

\$1.5 million per initiative over 5 years

Examples include Alex Wang's proposed US-Asia Center on Environmental Governance Innovation and Ted Parson's deep decarbonization project. Funding of \$300,000 per year would support a project director, one fellow and project expenses. Funding at higher levels would support multiple projects.

#### Post-graduate Public Interest Fellowships

\$50,000 per fellow

These one-year, post-graduate fellowships launch UCLA Law graduates into public interest environmental careers. We would like to support two fellows each year, at a cost of \$500,000 over five years.

## **Supplemental Scholarship Support**

\$750,000 over 5 years

This would allow the Institute to supplement existing student scholarships at meaningful levels, at about \$150,000 per year spread across multiple recipients, to recruit and develop extraordinary students.

#### **New Full-tuition Scholarships**

\$150,000 per award

With the creation of our soon-to-be Environmental Law specialization, these scholarships would be awarded to superb students who come to law school with significant environmental experience. If we could award these scholarships to ten students over five years, at a cost of \$1.5M, we believe we could recruit the top environmental candidates in the country.

## **High Value Target Opportunities**

\$750,000 over 5 years

Additional project funds would provide the flexibility to take on an unplanned but high-return project or to support one additional fellow for 5 years.

#### **Student Opportunity Funds**

\$200,000 over 5 years

These funds would support various opportunities that enhance the student training experience, including research stipends, travel for research projects or attending conferences.

#### **Full-time Fundraiser**

\$175,000 per year

A full time fundraiser (salary plus benefits) would focus on raising matching funds and also increase foundation and other support for the Institute. Most importantly, a full time fundraising professional could provide more certainty for the future in our ability to meet the growing needs of the Institute. We are optimistic that hiring a full-time fundraiser would generate new funding far in excess of the payroll costs of this position.

# **OPTION I: 200/300**

Pledge Request: \$2.5M

## **Total Support: \$4M (with matched and matching funds)**

\$200K annually in current use funding without match | \$300K per year in available matching funds

A gift of this size would provide critical and welcome support. At the same time, it would produce uncertainty about whether we can maintain our current level of programmatic activity and student support over the next five years. With a total of \$4 million invested, including securing all matching funds aligned with our highest priorities and in current-use form, the Institute would be able to maintain existing levels of staff, faculty, and programming for five years, including Cara, Sean, the communications director, up to 3 fellows, the clinical supervising attorney we are in the process of seeking, and providing funding for current program expenses. Support for current levels of scholarships and post-graduate fellowships for environmentally focused students would only be possible, however, if reductions were made to priority operational expenses, such as staffing. Therefore, at this level, we would have to make tradeoffs from within our current priorities and we would not be able to take on any significant new projects beyond what our current staff capacity can manage.

In addition, at this funding level, the ability to maintain the new clinical supervising attorney for a full five-year period will, at best, be contingent on the form and restrictions on incoming matched funds, which could affect our ability to recruit outstanding candidates. This level of gift will support current Institute research initiatives, but it would not permit us to launch new faculty initiatives, like Alex Wang's proposed US-Asia Center on Environmental Governance Innovation.

## OPTION II: 300/400 Pledge Request: \$3.5M

Total Support: \$5.5M (with matched and matching funds)

\$300K annually in current use funding without match | \$400K per year in available matching funds

With \$5.5 million in funding over five years, the Institute would have greater security about maintaining current operations noted above, at a cost of \$4M. The \$1.5M in additional total support could allow us, for example, to:

- Support five years of a new Institute-led policy and research initiative, like Alex Wang's proposed US-Asia Center on Environmental Governance Innovation, at \$300,000 per year; **OR**
- Invest in a mix of post-graduate public interest fellowships for students to launch them into environmental
  careers and scholarship support to attract students with a passion for environmental work. This level of
  funding could support 5 post-graduate fellowships over five years and about 8 full-tuition scholarships, for
  example, if we did not take on any new research or policy intiatives.

A gift of this size would allow us to expand our offerings to take advantage of high-value opportunities, such as by providing funding for a new Institute-led initiative, assuming we attain the full matching funds entirely as current use support. Support for students and recent graduates would also possible at a modest scale along with research support. Planning for the clinical supervising attorney, while an important priority, will also be contingent upon the incoming matching funds being unrestricted or targeted to the attorney funding.

# **OPTION III: 400/600**

# Pledge Request: \$5M

## **Total Support: \$8M (with matched and matching funds)**

\$400K annually in current use funds without match | \$600K per year in available matching funds

This option would double your philanthropic investment from its current level and position us for meaningful growth. A gift of this size would be a very significant opportunity for the Institute. It will allow us to expand our offerings in important ways, growing both our research and policy engagements and our student support in ways consistent with our highest priorities and with the opportunities presented by the strengths and interests of our Institute-affiliated faculty. Additional student support will allow us to attract and train the most promising students and future leaders, and to support their placement in public interest settings after graduation. Support for new policy initiatives will allow us to take advantage of the tremendous expertise of core faculty (capitalizing, in particular, on Alex Wang's recent tenure and William Boyd's recruitment). Space constraints will remain a significant barrier to growth in the medium- and long-term, but could be alleviated at least for the short-term through on campus space rental, assuming appropriate space can be found.

We have described core priorities below; and the potential addition of a full time fundraiser dedicated to the Emmett Institute would provide the time and focus required to meet the inspirational matching challenge in full, as the scale of that challenge grows. Investing in dedicated fundraising support may also create the potential for building still more resources for the Institute.

With approximately \$8 million in funding (including matching funds) over five years, we could:

- Support existing levels of staff, faculty, and programming for five years, including Cara, Sean, a communications director, 3 fellows, clinical supervising attorney, and funding for current program expenses, not including scholarship or fellowship support (\$4M);
- Support five years of a new Institute-led policy and research initiative, like Alex Wang's proposed US-Asia Center on Environmental Governance Innovation. This would include one project director and one fellow to support the project, plus funding for project expenses (\$1.5M); and
- Have additional project funds potentially available for one additional fellow for two of the five years, or unexpected opportunity funds to support a target-of-opportunity project that offers high returns (\$300K).
- Provide supplemental scholarship support to recruit or develop extraordinary students and to enhance student training and experiential opportunities during law school (200K per year: up to 150K in scholarship support and 50K in student-focused opportunities for Emmett Institute students, for a total of \$1.0M); and
- Award a total of 10 post-graduate fellowships across the five years, placing recent graduates at work in public interest environmental settings (\$50K ea for total of \$500K).

## And either:

- Hire an Emmett Institute full-time fundraiser for four years (approximately \$175,000/year, including benefits) to assist us in raising matching funds and to increase foundation and other support (\$700K); OR
- With the creation of our soon-to-be Environmental Law specialization, offer a small number of full-tuition scholarships to superb students with a significant professional background relating to environmental policymaking (\$750K); OR
- Designate resources for one additional significant research or policy project, with one additional staffer and additional programming (\$750K).

# **OPTION IV: 600/800**

## Pledge Request: \$7M

## **Total Support: \$11M (with matched and matching funds)**

\$600K annually in current use funds without match \$800K per year in available matching funds

A gift of this size would position us for strong growth potential and would be a tremendous opportunity for us to both develop new core research and policy initiatives and grow our student support in line with our highest priorities and with the opportunities presented by the strengths and interests of our faculty. Space constraints will remain a significant barrier to growth in the medium- and long-term, but could be alleviated at least for the short-term through on-campus space rental, assuming appropriate space can be found. At this level, the matching opportunities are exciting, but we would benefit from some dedicated fundraising support to ensure that we are able to fulfill the inspiring match in full – and, we hope, raise additional funds for the Institute even beyond your generous donation and its match.

With \$11 million in funding (including matching funds) over five years, we could:

- Support existing levels of staff, faculty, and programming for five years, including Cara, Sean, a communications director, 3 fellows, clinical supervising attorney, and funding for current program expenses, not including scholarship or fellowship support (\$4M);
- More robustly support five years of several new faculty-led policy and research initiatives for the Emmett
  Institute, such as Alex Wang's proposed US-Asia Center on Environmental Governance Innovation and
  Ted Parson's deep decarbonization project. The Institute could invest in project directors and fellows to do
  critical, interdisciplinary policy work designed to make a difference (700k per year for a total of \$3.5M);
  and
- Have additional project funds potentially available for one additional fellow for three of the five years, and somewhat greater unexpected opportunity funds to support a target-of-opportunity project that offers high returns (\$500K).
- With the creation of our soon-to-be Environmental Law specialization, offer full-tuition scholarships to superb students with a significant professional background relating to environmental policy-making (150K per full-tuition award, for a total of \$1.5M to support awards to 10 students); AND
- Increase support of our student opportunities for Emmett Institute-focused students (approximately 40K per year, for a total of \$200k); AND
- Award a total of 10 post-graduate fellowships across the five years, placing recent graduates at work in public interest environmental settings (at \$50,000 each for a total of \$500K); AND
- Hire an Emmett Institute full-time fundraiser five years (approximately \$175,000/year, including benefits) to assist us in raising matching funds and to increase foundation and other support (\$875K).

## CHARITABLE PLEDGE AGREEMENT

This CHARITABLE PLEDGE AGREEMENT (the "<u>Agreement</u>") is entered into as of \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, 2018, between the Emmett Foundation, Inc. (the "<u>Emmett Foundation</u>") and The UCLA Foundation, a California nonprofit corporation ("The <u>UCLA Foundation</u>"), acting for the benefit of the Emmett Institute on Climate Change and the Environment at the UCLA School of Law (the "Institute") in reference to the following facts:

WHEREAS, the Emmett Foundation wishes to continue to support operations and initiatives of the Institute (which are generally delineated in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated herein).

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises of the parties as set forth herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Previous Pledges.</u> All previous pledges of the Emmett Foundation to the UCLA Foundation have been paid as of the date except for Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) in matching funds payable on or before June 30, 2018 for use by the Institute as set forth in the Charitable Pledge Agreement dated December 20,2013, as amended.
- 2. New Pledge. The Emmett Foundation hereby pledges to donate up to Four Million Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,300,000) to The UCLA Foundation ("Pledge") to support operations and initiatives of the Institute as delineated in Exhibit "A" attached hereto comprised of the following:
  - a. \$1,800,000 Current Use Funds. The sum of \$1,800,000, payable in six (6) installments in the amounts and on the dates as set forth below, to be allocated to priorities identified by the Emmett Institute Executive Director:

June 30, 2018:	\$300,000
June 30, 2019:	\$300,000
June 30, 2020:	\$300,000
June 30, 2021:	\$300,000
June 30, 2022:	\$300,000
June 30, 2023	\$300,000
Total:	\$1,800,000

b. \$2,500,000 Opportunity for Matching Funds. It is the Emmett Foundation's explicit desire that the Law School use \$2,500,000 of the Pledge to leverage additional private resources to enhance the Institute. Toward that end, and to motivate donors to support the Institute, the Emmett Foundation agrees to match on a one-to-one basis, any gift from any other donor (herein referred to as "Third Party Donor") pledged and made after the date hereof that expressly supports the purposes of the Institute, as set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto, up to Two Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000), payable on each of the following dates (or on the next succeeding date or dates below to the extent third party gifts that qualify for the match are not received by the date(s)), as set below:

June 30, 2019	\$500,000
June 30, 2020	\$500,000

June 30, 2021	\$500,000
June 30, 2022	\$500,000
June 30, 2023	\$500,000
Total:	\$2,500,000

For purposes of clarification, if, for example, \$400,000 in third party gifts is received by June 30, 2019, the Emmett Foundation will match such \$400,000 and the remaining \$100,000 commitment will carry forward, leaving additional potential matches of \$2,100,000, due \$500,000 on June 30, 2020 and \$500,000 on each of the following three due dates. If in this example \$700,000 in third party gifts is subsequently received after June 30, 2019 and on or before June 30, 2020, the Emmett Foundation will match \$600,000 on June 30, 2020, consisting of the \$100,000 carry forward and an additional \$500,000. The excess gift of \$100,000 will be carried forward and eligible for the June 30, 2021 match. Any carry forward amount of the pledge under this Agreement not matched by June 30, 2023 will lapse, except as follows: If on June 30, 2023 there are qualifying match pledges for third party gifts with payments payable after June 30, 2023 but before June 20, 2025, then any unpaid amount of the challenge of Emmett Foundation as of June 30, 2023 will carry forward annually for up to two years.

## It is further understood that:

- Each Third Party Donor and the Emmett Foundation will be notified by The UCLA Foundation in writing and in advance of any third party gift considered for matching criteria.
- ii. Should the Third Party Donor desire to fund an Institute use not set forth within Exhibit "A", the Emmett Foundation and the Institute may together agree to approve in writing the qualification of the third party gift for the match. Without such written approval such third party gift shall not qualify for a match hereunder.
- iii. Priorities acceptable to qualify for the match different or apart from those set forth in Exhibit "A" may be mutually agreed upon in writing by the Third Party Donor, the Institute, and Emmett Foundation.
- 3. Payment of New Pledge. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, any payment of the Pledge may be made in whole or in part by Dan Emmett or Rae Emmett individually or by trusts established for their benefit (collectively, "the Emmetts"). Any amount paid to the UCLA Foundation by the Emmetts specifying that such payment is being made pursuant to this Agreement, and shall reduce the amount payable by the Emmett Foundation by a like amount. For the avoidance of doubt, the obligation to pay the Pledge under this Agreement is and shall remain the sole obligation of the Emmett Foundation. If the Emmetts make any payment that reduces the Emmett Foundation's obligations under this Agreement, the Emmetts shall not become obligated in any manner with respect to fulfilling the Emmett Foundation's obligations hereunder.
- 4. <u>Use of Securities</u>. If any amount of the Pledge is paid in marketable securities, the value thereof shall be determined on the date of the transfer of said securities, and Emmett

Foundation shall not be responsible for or receive credit for any changes in value between the date of such transfer and the date or dates on which such marketable securities are sold.

- 5. Representations and Warranties of Recipient. Recipient represents and warrants as follows:
  - a. <u>Authority</u>. Prior to signing this Agreement, The UCLA Foundation and the UCLA School of Law shall have obtained all required authority from its respective governing body to enter into this Agreement and the officers and representatives of The UCLA Foundation and the UCLA School of Law executing this Agreement on behalf of such entities shall be duly empowered and authorized to do so.
  - b. No Violation. The execution, delivery and performance by The UCLA Foundation of this Agreement will not violate The UCLA Foundation's organizational and governing documents or the terms of any provision of any agreement or instrument which is binding upon The UCLA Foundation or any law to which The UCLA Foundation is subject. The execution, delivery and performance by the UCLA School of Law of this Agreement will not violate the UCLA School of Law's organizational and governing documents or the terms of any provision of any agreement or instrument which is binding upon the UCLA School of Law or any law to which the UCLA School of Law is subject.
  - c. <u>Public Announcements</u>. The timing and content of any announcement of the Pledge shall not be made without the prior written approval of the Emmett Foundation, which approval may be withheld in its sole discretion. The terms of this Agreement and the identity of the Emmett Foundation will not be disclosed publicly prior to the announcement. The Emmett Foundation will have prior approval rights as to any and all references to the Emmett Foundation in connection with the Pledge.
  - d. <u>Reports</u>. The UCLA Foundation and the UCLA School of Law will provide the Emmett Foundation written reports at least annually on the Match and the use of the gifts.
  - e. <u>Indemnification</u>. The UCLA Foundation shall indemnify and hold harmless the Emmett Foundation and its heirs, beneficiaries, successors, assigns, and representatives from and against any and all losses, claims, demands, costs, damages, liabilities, expenses of any nature (including sales and use taxes, if any, and reasonable attorneys' fees and disbursements), judgments, fines, settlements and other amounts arising from any and all claims, demands, actions, suits or proceedings, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative, that may arise or which relate to or arise from the breach of any of The UCLA Foundation's representations, warranties or covenants set forth in this Agreement.

## 6. Miscellaneous.

- a. Entire Agreement. Except as otherwise set forth herein, this Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the parties and supersedes all prior and contemporaneous agreements, representations and understandings, both written and oral. No other agreements that have been entered into between the parties shall, in any way, affect or alter this Agreement.
- b. <u>Disputes.</u> The parties expressly acknowledge that the Emmett Foundation has standing to enforce this Agreement. Such arbitration shall take place in Los Angeles, California. All parties shall have the right to discovery and the arbitrators shall be selected pursuant to the rules of the American Arbitration Association. Arbitration fees shall be shared equally. This Agreement and all acts and transactions hereunder and all rights and obligations of The UCLA Foundation and the Emmett Foundation and their successors will be governed, construed and interpreted in accordance with the internal laws of the State of California. If any legal action or other proceeding is brought for the enforcement of this Agreement, including, but not limited to, the enforcement of the Pledge, or because of an alleged dispute, breach, default or misrepresentation in connection with any of the provisions of this Agreement, the successful or prevailing party will be entitled to recover reasonable attorneys' fees and other costs incurred in that action or proceeding, in addition to any other relief to which it may be entitled.
- c. <u>Amendment</u>. The terms and provisions of this Agreement may not be waived, altered, modified or amended except in a writing executed by (or on behalf of) the parties hereto.
- d. <u>Section Headings</u>. Section headings are used herein for convenience only, and shall not be used in any manner to interpret any provision hereof.
- e. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties' respective legal heirs, successors and assigns.
- f. <u>Counterparts/Electronic Execution</u>. This Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original, but all of which taken together shall constitute one and the same instrument. An electronic or facsimile copy of this Agreement shall be as valid as an original.
- g. <u>Waiver</u>. None of the provisions, warranties, terms or conditions of this Agreement shall be deemed to have been waived except in a writing signed by the party against whom waiver is claimed.
- h. <u>Notices</u>. All notices to be given hereunder will be in writing and will be effective when they are served either personally or by depositing the same in the United States mail, first class postage prepaid, by registered or certified mail addressed as follows:





It's turning into a no good, very bad week for the "clean coal" technology that Energy Secretary Rick Perry has made a point of emphasis during the White House's "Energy Week."

One of the country's most highly touted "clean coal" projects announced Wednesday that it will no longer burn coal. After years of cost overruns and delays, Southern Co. pulled the plug on a once-promising carbon capture and coal gasification project at a power plant in Mississippi's Kemper County. The project was meant to showcase carbon capture and storage, a process by which carbon dioxide emissions from the burning of fossil fuels

are collected and stored, usually underground, instead of being sent into the atmosphere.

The company decided it could not surmount the technical challenge of making equipment designed to cool synthetic gas before carbon dioxide is stripped out work. The Post's Stephen Mufson explains more on what happened:

The plant was once held up as an example of promising technologies that could help fight climate change.

In 2014, then-Energy Secretary Ernest Moniz flew to see the plant and declared, "I consider seeing this plant a look at the future." Instead, Kemper has imposed financial burdens on tax payers and local households.

Thanks to legislation passed by the Mississippi legislature, Southern has been able to pass along about \$800 million of those costs to ratepayers, the company said.

Perry sung a decidedly different tune on carbon capture and storage during Tuesday's White House press briefing, praising the progress being made on the technology. Instead of

highlighting the Kemper plant, Perry praised a much less problem-plagued showcase in his home state that he visited in April.

"We've already seen the fruits of innovative, clean technology, like CCUS -- carbon capture, utilization and sequestration," Perry said Tuesday. "The Petra Nova plant, just on the outskirts of Houston, Texas, uses a process to remove 90 percent of the carbon dioxide after coal is burned to generate energy in a clean way."


At first glance, the comments may be a bit baffling, if you've followed Perry up to this point. Perry said "no" when asked on CNBC last week if the compound captured in CCS -- carbon dioxide -- was "the primary control knob for the temperature of the Earth and for climate."

The comment set off a new firestorm of criticism as it appears Perry is increasingly bending into the mold of White House chief strategist Stephen K.

Bannon and Environmental Protection Agency

Administrator Scott Pruitt in their adamancy with which they have dismissed climate-change science.

So it raises the question: Why should the Energy Department highlight the technology when its secretary isn't convinced carbon dioxide is that primary control knob in warming



One reason is that captured carbon dioxide has an industrial use. It can be pumped back underground in order to not just store it but to boost the recovery of oil from otherwise difficult-to-reach pockets. With most of the easy-to-get oil, lifted to the surface by its own internal pressure or by water pumped underground, already been recovered, oil companies will have to increasingly rely on so-called enhanced oil recovery in order to keep their reserves stable.

But Perry faces an even bigger incongruity between


his rhetoric and actions on carbon capture and storage. The Energy Department budget the Trump administration proposed and Perry defended in Congress would cut funding from the Office of Fossil Energy, the office spearheading CCS research, from \$631 million in 2017 to \$280 million in 2018 -- a 56 percent cut.

Why praise handiwork of researchers and businesses trying to make carbon capture and storage happen while simultaneously threatening to chop off the head of the office pushing that technology?

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-- As President Trump and members of his administration tout American "energy dominance" during this themed "Energy Week," analysts have pointed out that some of the White House's claims don't add up, write The Post's Steven Mufson and Chris Mooney. Here are a just a few of the disputed claims from Trump's "energy week":

**Claim 1:** The White House said the United States has 20 percent more oil reserves than Saudi Arabia.

**Fact**: The Energy Information Administration reports that the United States had 32.3 billion barrels as of the end of last year, Mufson and Mooney write, just a small fraction of Saudi Arabia's 268 billion barrels.

A senior fellow at the Center for Strategic and International Studies said the White House is "building a narrative on false premises. I'm disappointed that messaging has overtaken substance here."

Claim 2: Perry, EPA head Scott Pruitt and Interior Secretary Zinke wrote an op-ed asserting that energy dominance is "about becoming an energy exporter."

**Fact**: That could be a ways away. Mufson and Mooney write: "The U.S. Energy Information Administration forecast that the United States will become a net energy exporter by 2026 — although it could be earlier if oil prices rise, and later if oil prices fall."

**Claim 3**: The White House said the Keystone XL pipeline would "support" more than 42,000 jobs.


**Fact**: The State Department reports only 4,000 construction jobs would be created on a temporary basis. Fewer than 100 jobs would be created permanently.

-- Yucca moves forward. Despite some waffling from the Trump administration, the House of Representatives is forging ahead with a bill to finally open Yucca Mountain nuclear waste repository. House Energy and Commerce Committee voted 49-4 to send a bill reviving the long-dormant nuclear waste site to the full House

Sen. Catherine Cortez Masto (D-Nev.) issued a blistering statement following the vote. "It is unjust and unfair to force Nevadans to live next to a nuclear waste dump that could harm both their health and livelihood" she said. "This bill ignores the detrimental impacts to Nevada's communities and economy if Yucca Mountain moves forward." Her Republican counterpart representing Nevada in the Senate, Dean Heller, opposes the project as well.

After emphasizing the necessity of finishing the Yucca Mountain project in Senate testimony last week, Perry backed down slightly in a White House news conference on Tuesday. "We've made no decisions at

DOE," Perry said when asked about Yucca. As one of the most vulnerable Republicans up for reelection in 2018, Heller may be able to get Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) to stymie the Yucca proposal at the behest of the blue-state **GOP** senator."



Despite high-profile protests from Native Americans against the Dakota Access pipeline over the last year, the Trump administration has decided to make developing fossil fuel resources on reservations a cornerstone of his "energy dominance" agenda. Indeed, there are several tribes with leaders eager to mine coal or pump oil on their lands, including Crow Nation in Montana and Navajo Nation in New Mexico and Arizona, who sent representatives to the White House on Wednesday.

"I'm proud to have such a large gathering of tribal leaders here at the White House," Trump said. "I look forward to more government-to-government consultations with tribal leaders about the issues important to Indian Country. We love Indian Country, right?"

--The House Energy and Commerce committee approved a bill that would decrease the frequency of ozone regulation. The panel voted 29-24 to approve the bill, The Hill reported, which would require the EPA to update ozone limits every decade rather than the current timeline of every five years. The bill first passed in the House under the previous administration but did not make it to the Senate floor.

--Massive melting and general warming in

Antarctica may allow for new habitats to emerge
for wildlife, according to a report from Chelsea

Harvey for The Post.

More ice-free space will allow previously isolated species to live alongside others, which could lead to a evolutionary battle as some organisms die off as others prove dominant, Harvey reports, citing a study in the journal Nature.

Harvey writes: "Secluded as they may be in some cases, these areas can be home to various species of vegetation, microbes, worms or insects and other

small organisms, and may also serve as breeding grounds for animals like seals and seabirds. These species tend to be highly specialized for the extreme conditions in which they live, said Peter Convey, a terrestrial ecologist with the British Antarctic Survey, who was not involved with the new study. Some of them may be dormant throughout much of the year. Others may have developed specific adaptations that allow them to survive in conditions with high winds, little water or extreme low temperatures."

The new study shows that there's been a sparse amount of research until now on how climate change will affect Antarctica's biodiversity. But researchers found that "the Antarctic Peninsula — one of the most rapidly warming areas on the continent, where large levels of glacial ice loss are already occurring — will likely suffer the most extreme changes through the rest of this century."

-- Waiting to Larsen C what happens: A massive crack in Antarctica's largest floating ice platform is "hours, days, or weeks" away from breaking away, according to researchers, creating an iceberg the size of Delaware.

The outer end "is moving at the highest speed ever recorded on this ice shelf," said Adrian Luckman of Project MIDAS, the British Antarctic research project

monitoring the shelf, USA Today reported.


"In another sign that the iceberg calving is imminent, the soon-to-be-iceberg part of Larsen C Ice Shelf has tripled in speed to more than 10 meters per day between June 24th and June 27th," Luckman said.

Luckman added that once it separates from the shelf, the iceberg will "fundamentally change the landscape of the Antarctic Peninsula."

The Post's Chris Mooney wrote more about this last month.

--Talk about a deadline. A group of experts is warning that there is just three years left for the world to set carbon dioxide emissions on a downward path if we are to hold the rise in planetary temperatures between 1.5 to 2 degrees Celsius, The Post's Chris Mooney reports. In a new commentary published in the journal Nature, the authors, led by former United Nations climate chief Christiana Figures, urge that if carbon emissions can begin declining by 2020, there may be some hope to avoid the worst consequences of climate change that the Paris accord sought to address.



President Trump is moving forward with a campaign promise to reopen federal waters in the Atlantic, Pacific and Arctic oceans for oil and gas drilling.

But he and his administration still haven't fully answered the question: How much interest is there, really, in opening these waters to fossil fuel exploration and exploitation?

On Monday, the Interior Department published notice in the Federal Register that it is seeking public comment on the effects offshore drilling would have on 26 areas in U.S. waters in the Gulf of Mexico, North Atlantic Ocean, Arctic Ocean and

Pacific Ocean both off the coast of Alaska and the lower 48 states.

The "request for information" is the first step in formally unwinding the five-year plan for oil and gas drilling President Obama put in place when he left office, which kept 90 percent of the outer continental shelf off limits as his administration sought to mitigate human impact on ocean life and reduce the emissions of planet-warming gases.

Last week, Vincent DeVito, Interior's counselor for energy policy, countered that the Trump administration simply couldn't leave creating potentially 300,000 jobs off the table.

The history: Although drilling rigs stood shoulder-to-shoulder along the beaches of southern
California about a century ago, drilling on both the
Atlantic and Pacific coasts has been suspended for
more than three decades. The halt in drilling on
those coasts is a result of the 1969 Santa Barbara
oil spill, which soaked the coast and killed
innumerable birds. The spill was a key catalyst for
the modern environmental movement.

Congress in 1982 started inserting a moratorium on Pacific and Atlantic drilling every year in the appropriations bill. In 1990, President George H.W. Bush a presidential directive banning offshore

drilling outside the Gulf of Mexico and parts of Alaska.

But President George W. Bush threatened to veto the appropriations bill in 2008 and the item was dropped. He rescinded his father's directive and scheduled drilling off both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts in his final five-year drilling plan. President Obama overturned that, however. He added new lease sales in federal waters of the Gulf of Mexico and allowed seismic work off parts of the Atlantic coast for possible leasing at a future date.

Efforts to drill in the Arctic Ocean, greenlighted by both the Bush and Obama administrations over the last two decades, were less successful. Two years ago, Royal Dutch Shell abandoned an effort to develop offshore leases in the Chukchi Sea after failing to turn up enough oil to justify the cost of drilling in the frigid and difficult-to-manage Arctic waters

**The present:** Currently there are two hurdles facing the president in his push for more offshore drilling — one political, the other economic.

1) Bipartisan opposition to more offshore oil and gas drilling. A handful of politicians in Trump's party, including Reps. Mark Sanford (R-S.C.), Frank

LoBiondo (R-N.J.) and Vern Buchanan (R-Fla.), have voiced support for or sponsored legislation, locking Obama-era offshore policy in place. These Republicans don't want to see oil rigs in their constituents' backyards, and risk backlash from any future spill due to a leasing push they backed. Plus, a local say in how nearby ocean waters are leased for exploration squares with the GOP ideology of states' rights.

"Clearly, the coastal governors will have different views about where they want to see offshore development," Katharine MacGregor, acting assistant secretary for lands and minerals management at the Interior Department, told a conference of offshore executives in May, according to the Houston Chronicle.

But she indicated her boss, Interior Secretary
Ryan Zinke, may focus political fire at California,
whose Democratic governor, Jerry Brown, also
opposes drilling off his state's shores. "The
secretary has had quite a few questions about
California, and other areas that seem to come up
every time you talk about a five-year
plan," MacGregor said.

2) The price of oil. Due to strong natural gas production onshore in the United States (among other reasons), a barrel of oil is currently selling for less than \$50, despite recent gains. The same supply-and-demand forces that kept gasoline prices low even during peak driving times over the Fourth of July weekend are giving oil and gas companies less motivation to build expensive offshore rigs with cheaper-to-extract natural gas available onshore.

Or as The Post's Darryl Fears reported last week, "many oil companies balk at the massive investment in equipment needed to drill offshore when the price is lower than \$85, analysts say."


The price of petroleum, historically very volatile, could always rebound to the point of making offshore development economically viable. But so far, it doesn't appear that the Trump administration has offered an expected future price spike as justification for the current "drill, baby, drill" push.

-- This could be big: On Monday, a federal appeals court rejected the Trump administration's delay of an Obama-era rule to limit methane pollution in oil and natural gas drilling.

The court sided with environmental groups, ruling that while the Environmental Protection Agency could reconsider the rule, it did not have the authority to implement the 90-day delay while it looked to rewrite it, The Post's Juliet Eilperin and Steven Mufson reported.

The court will separately decide on the agency's

proposal to extend the rule delay to two years, but the EPA will have to immediately begin enforcing the rule, which the Obama administration established in 2016 to prevent leaks of climate-warming methane from oil and gas operations.

Why it matters: The court decision only undoes a 90-day delay. But a judicial ruling reinstating one of his predecessor's policy could spell trouble for Trump as he pursues his agenda of revoking a large swath of Obama-era rules.


Eilperin and Mufson write: "The ruling could affect myriad agencies that have delayed the Obama administration's regulations, some for long periods. And it underscores the extent to which activists are turning to the courts to block President Trump's most ambitious policy shifts."

-- **Shhhh:** The Pentagon will now keep secret once public assessments of the safety and security of nuclear weapons operations, the Associated Press reported.

Before, details from inspection reports, including a base's "pass/fail" grade, were available to the public. But the Trump administration decided that was too much information to reveal to potential adversaries abroad.

The counter-argument: "I think the new policy fails to

distinguish between protecting valid secrets and shielding incompetence," Steven Aftergood, a government secrecy expert with the Federation of American Scientists, told the AP. "Clearly, nuclear weapons technology secrets should be protected. But negligence or misconduct in handling nuclear weapons should not be insulated from public accountability."





-- That damn dam: The Conowingo Dam on the Susquehanna River in Maryland may derail the \$19 billion plan to clean up the Chesapeake Bay, The Post's Darryl Fears reports.

New technology shows that the reservoir will fill 15 years ahead of schedule. A report from the scientists on the EPA program managing bay cleanup found that the reservoir behind the dam has filled with sediment a lot quicker than predicted. The reservoir was meant to hit capacity between 2030 and 2035 but is already 95 percent full and could stop blocking sediment from the bay in the next three years.

Sediment has always flowed naturally down the Susquehanna and other rivers since time began, "but human development altered the landscape and caused more," Johns Hopkins University professor William P. Ball said. Too much sediment buries grasses that protect juvenile fish, crabs and other marine animals on the bay floor.

Now the burden of what to do without the help of reservoir falls to the six states in the Chesapeake Bay region, already in a multimillion dollar hole from the cleanup plan.



-- Totally new natural gas deal: Total signed an agreement with Iran to pump natural gas in the Persian Gulf. Working in partnership with government-owned oil and gas companies in Iran and China, the French major will invest \$1 billion in developing part of the South Pars gas field.

But the big risk to the project sits more than 6,000 miles away in the Oval Office.

The New York Times reports: "The decision has farreaching implications, not least setting a path that
other Western energy companies could soon follow,
and possibly giving Total an inside track for future
contracts in Iran. But it also exposes the company to
risk if Mr. Trump reneges on the Iran nuclear deal, or if
the United States imposes further sanctions against
Tehran."

-- Next weekend's beach read: Journalist Eliza
Griswold has an article in the latest issue of The New
Yorker profiling Veronica Coptis, an environmental
activist married to a coal worker, and, more broadly,
the rural southwestern Pennsylvania coal country
where she was raised and works

The best line: For as much talk as there is about how jobs in the solar industry outnumber those in coal by more than two to one, those gigs often just don't have the same appeal to Greene County, Pa. residents —

with some justification. "No job making solar panels was going to pay someone without a college education a six-figure salary," Griswold writes.



-- Nixing nuclear in South Korea: There's another nuclear issue brewing on the Korean Peninsula beside Kim Jong Un's missile tests. South Korea's new president, Moon Jae-in, promised to scrap plans for building any new nuclear power plants in South Korea after taking office in May. Now a group of about two dozen prominent scientists and conservationists are urging Jae-in to reconsider.

What they're saying: "Instead of phasing out nuclear, we encourage you to lead an effort to both make nuclear even safer and more cost-economical than it already is through the development and demonstration of accident-tolerant fuels and new plant designs," the group wrote in their letter. They said that it is hard to see South Korea meeting its Paris agreement goals without more nuclear energy.


Why it matters: South Korea has made nuclear energy work better than any other nation. As the letter writers note, South Korea is the only country where the cost of nuclear plants have declined. The South Koreans have become so good at building these plants that the United Arab Emirates hired the nation's major state-controlled electric utility, KEPCO, to build four reactors there. Jae-in's rollback threatens any future KEPCO contracts abroad.



-- Heavy stuff: The Post's Jenna Gallegos wrote a good explainer on "weight restriction days" for commercial jets, and why you may be seeing more of them as heat waves proliferate.

The science: When it's hot enough at high elevations, the air will become too thin for laden airlines to take off (since planes achieve flight by pushing off of the air molecules around it). Days when extra precautions are taken are deemed "weight restriction days." Last month, for example, nearly 60 American Airlines flights were canceled in Phoenix over the course of three scorching days.

What this means: There could be four times as many weight restriction days by 2050 for the most "at-risk" airports, according to a 2015 study. Airliners "lose weight" by leaving behind passengers, fuel or cargo. So for long flights on hot days, that could mean more passengers or more luggage left behind. Last year, the International Civil Aviation Organization, the U.N. agency that oversees aviation, said increase temperatures was one of its main climate-related concerns.

-- Do as the Romans do: The vast sea walls created by ancient Roman builders may help scientists create modern concrete walls to protect shoreline environments from rising sea levels.

Marie Jackson, an expert in ancient Roman concrete at the University of Utah, is "attempting to recreate this durable concrete using San Francisco seawater and more abundant volcanic rocks. She has several samples sitting in ovens and jars in her lab, which she will test for evidence of similar chemical reactions," The Post's Ben Guarino reported.

"If her effort is successful, the concrete could yet have a role to play in human history — 'if one was indeed interested in making sea walls" and "forced to protect shoreline environments,' Jackson said. (In one 2014 study, a team of European climate scientists predicted that, if the next 90 years follow the trend of the past 30, the cost of constructing barriers to hold back the sea might rise to as high as \$71 billion per year. It's turning into a no good, very bad week for the "clean coal" technology that Energy Secretary Rick Perry has made a point of emphasis during the White House's "Energy Week."

One of the country's most highly touted "clean coal" projects announced Wednesday that it will no longer burn coal. After years of cost overruns and delays, Southern Co. pulled the plug on a once-promising carbon capture and coal gasification project at a power plant in Mississippi's Kemper County. The project was meant to showcase carbon capture and storage, a process by which carbon dioxide emissions from the burning of fossil fuels

are collected and stored, usually underground, instead of being sent into the atmosphere.

The company decided it could not surmount the technical challenge of making equipment designed to cool synthetic gas before carbon dioxide is stripped out work. The Post's Stephen Mufson explains more on what happened:

The plant was once held up as an example of promising technologies that could help fight climate change.

In 2014, then-Energy Secretary Ernest Moniz flew to see the plant and declared, "I consider seeing this plant a look at the future." Instead, Kemper has imposed financial burdens on tax payers and local households.

Thanks to legislation passed by the Mississippi legislature, Southern has been able to pass along about \$800 million of those costs to ratepayers, the company said.

Perry sung a decidedly different tune on carbon capture and storage during Tuesday's White House press briefing, praising the progress being made on the technology. Instead of

highlighting the Kemper plant, Perry praised a much less problem-plagued showcase in his home state that he visited in April.

"We've already seen the fruits of innovative, clean technology, like CCUS -- carbon capture, utilization and sequestration," Perry said Tuesday. "The Petra Nova plant, just on the outskirts of Houston, Texas, uses a process to remove 90 percent of the carbon dioxide after coal is burned to generate energy in a clean way."


At first glance, the comments may be a bit baffling, if you've followed Perry up to this point. Perry said "no" when asked on CNBC last week if the compound captured in CCS -- carbon dioxide -- was "the primary control knob for the temperature of the Earth and for climate."

The comment set off a new firestorm of criticism as it appears Perry is increasingly bending into the mold of White House chief strategist Stephen K.

Bannon and Environmental Protection Agency

Administrator Scott Pruitt in their adamancy with which they have dismissed climate-change science.

So it raises the question: Why should the Energy Department highlight the technology when its secretary isn't convinced carbon dioxide is that primary control knob in warming



One reason is that captured carbon dioxide has an industrial use. It can be pumped back underground in order to not just store it but to boost the recovery of oil from otherwise difficult-to-reach pockets. With most of the easy-to-get oil, lifted to the surface by its own internal pressure or by water pumped underground, already been recovered, oil companies will have to increasingly rely on so-called enhanced oil recovery in order to keep their reserves stable.

But Perry faces an even bigger incongruity between


his rhetoric and actions on carbon capture and storage. The Energy Department budget the Trump administration proposed and Perry defended in Congress would cut funding from the Office of Fossil Energy, the office spearheading CCS research, from \$631 million in 2017 to \$280 million in 2018 -- a 56 percent cut.

Why praise handiwork of researchers and businesses trying to make carbon capture and storage happen while simultaneously threatening to chop off the head of the office pushing that technology?

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-- As President Trump and members of his administration tout American "energy dominance" during this themed "Energy Week," analysts have pointed out that some of the White House's claims don't add up, write The Post's Steven Mufson and Chris Mooney. Here are a just a few of the disputed claims from Trump's "energy week":

**Claim 1:** The White House said the United States has 20 percent more oil reserves than Saudi Arabia.

**Fact**: The Energy Information Administration reports that the United States had 32.3 billion barrels as of the end of last year, Mufson and Mooney write, just a small fraction of Saudi Arabia's 268 billion barrels.

A senior fellow at the Center for Strategic and International Studies said the White House is "building a narrative on false premises. I'm disappointed that messaging has overtaken substance here."

Claim 2: Perry, EPA head Scott Pruitt and Interior Secretary Zinke wrote an op-ed asserting that energy dominance is "about becoming an energy exporter."

**Fact**: That could be a ways away. Mufson and Mooney write: "The U.S. Energy Information Administration forecast that the United States will become a net energy exporter by 2026 — although it could be earlier if oil prices rise, and later if oil prices fall."

**Claim 3**: The White House said the Keystone XL pipeline would "support" more than 42,000 jobs.


**Fact**: The State Department reports only 4,000 construction jobs would be created on a temporary basis. Fewer than 100 jobs would be created permanently.

-- Yucca moves forward. Despite some waffling from the Trump administration, the House of Representatives is forging ahead with a bill to finally open Yucca Mountain nuclear waste repository. House Energy and Commerce Committee voted 49-4 to send a bill reviving the long-dormant nuclear waste site to the full House

Sen. Catherine Cortez Masto (D-Nev.) issued a blistering statement following the vote. "It is unjust and unfair to force Nevadans to live next to a nuclear waste dump that could harm both their health and livelihood" she said. "This bill ignores the detrimental impacts to Nevada's communities and economy if Yucca Mountain moves forward." Her Republican counterpart representing Nevada in the Senate, Dean Heller, opposes the project as well.

After emphasizing the necessity of finishing the Yucca Mountain project in Senate testimony last week, Perry backed down slightly in a White House news conference on Tuesday. "We've made no decisions at

DOE," Perry said when asked about Yucca. As one of the most vulnerable Republicans up for reelection in 2018, Heller may be able to get Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) to stymie the Yucca proposal at the behest of the blue-state **GOP** senator."



Despite high-profile protests from Native Americans against the Dakota Access pipeline over the last year, the Trump administration has decided to make developing fossil fuel resources on reservations a cornerstone of his "energy dominance" agenda. Indeed, there are several tribes with leaders eager to mine coal or pump oil on their lands, including Crow Nation in Montana and Navajo Nation in New Mexico and Arizona, who sent representatives to the White House on Wednesday.

"I'm proud to have such a large gathering of tribal leaders here at the White House," Trump said. "I look forward to more government-to-government consultations with tribal leaders about the issues important to Indian Country. We love Indian Country, right?"

--The House Energy and Commerce committee approved a bill that would decrease the frequency of ozone regulation. The panel voted 29-24 to approve the bill, The Hill reported, which would require the EPA to update ozone limits every decade rather than the current timeline of every five years. The bill first passed in the House under the previous administration but did not make it to the Senate floor.

--Massive melting and general warming in

Antarctica may allow for new habitats to emerge
for wildlife, according to a report from Chelsea

Harvey for The Post.

More ice-free space will allow previously isolated species to live alongside others, which could lead to a evolutionary battle as some organisms die off as others prove dominant, Harvey reports, citing a study in the journal Nature.

Harvey writes: "Secluded as they may be in some cases, these areas can be home to various species of vegetation, microbes, worms or insects and other

small organisms, and may also serve as breeding grounds for animals like seals and seabirds. These species tend to be highly specialized for the extreme conditions in which they live, said Peter Convey, a terrestrial ecologist with the British Antarctic Survey, who was not involved with the new study. Some of them may be dormant throughout much of the year. Others may have developed specific adaptations that allow them to survive in conditions with high winds, little water or extreme low temperatures."

The new study shows that there's been a sparse amount of research until now on how climate change will affect Antarctica's biodiversity. But researchers found that "the Antarctic Peninsula — one of the most rapidly warming areas on the continent, where large levels of glacial ice loss are already occurring — will likely suffer the most extreme changes through the rest of this century."

-- Waiting to Larsen C what happens: A massive crack in Antarctica's largest floating ice platform is "hours, days, or weeks" away from breaking away, according to researchers, creating an iceberg the size of Delaware.

The outer end "is moving at the highest speed ever recorded on this ice shelf," said Adrian Luckman of Project MIDAS, the British Antarctic research project

monitoring the shelf, USA Today reported.


"In another sign that the iceberg calving is imminent, the soon-to-be-iceberg part of Larsen C Ice Shelf has tripled in speed to more than 10 meters per day between June 24th and June 27th," Luckman said.

Luckman added that once it separates from the shelf, the iceberg will "fundamentally change the landscape of the Antarctic Peninsula."

The Post's Chris Mooney wrote more about this last month.

--Talk about a deadline. A group of experts is warning that there is just three years left for the world to set carbon dioxide emissions on a downward path if we are to hold the rise in planetary temperatures between 1.5 to 2 degrees Celsius, The Post's Chris Mooney reports. In a new commentary published in the journal Nature, the authors, led by former United Nations climate chief Christiana Figures, urge that if carbon emissions can begin declining by 2020, there may be some hope to avoid the worst consequences of climate change that the Paris accord sought to address.

President Trump is moving forward with a campaign promise to reopen federal waters in the Atlantic, Pacific and Arctic oceans for oil and gas drilling.

But he and his administration still haven't fully answered the question: How much interest is there, really, in opening these waters to fossil fuel exploration and exploitation?

On Monday, the Interior Department published notice in the Federal Register that it is seeking public comment on the effects offshore drilling would have on 26 areas in U.S. waters in the Gulf of Mexico, North Atlantic Ocean, Arctic Ocean and

Pacific Ocean both off the coast of Alaska and the lower 48 states.

The "request for information" is the first step in formally unwinding the five-year plan for oil and gas drilling President Obama put in place when he left office, which kept 90 percent of the outer continental shelf off limits as his administration sought to mitigate human impact on ocean life and reduce the emissions of planet-warming gases.

Last week, Vincent DeVito, Interior's counselor for energy policy, countered that the Trump administration simply couldn't leave creating potentially 300,000 jobs off the table.

The history: Although drilling rigs stood shoulder-to-shoulder along the beaches of southern
California about a century ago, drilling on both the
Atlantic and Pacific coasts has been suspended for
more than three decades. The halt in drilling on
those coasts is a result of the 1969 Santa Barbara
oil spill, which soaked the coast and killed
innumerable birds. The spill was a key catalyst for
the modern environmental movement.

Congress in 1982 started inserting a moratorium on Pacific and Atlantic drilling every year in the appropriations bill. In 1990, President George H.W. Bush a presidential directive banning offshore

drilling outside the Gulf of Mexico and parts of Alaska.

But President George W. Bush threatened to veto the appropriations bill in 2008 and the item was dropped. He rescinded his father's directive and scheduled drilling off both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts in his final five-year drilling plan. President Obama overturned that, however. He added new lease sales in federal waters of the Gulf of Mexico and allowed seismic work off parts of the Atlantic coast for possible leasing at a future date.

Efforts to drill in the Arctic Ocean, greenlighted by both the Bush and Obama administrations over the last two decades, were less successful. Two years ago, Royal Dutch Shell abandoned an effort to develop offshore leases in the Chukchi Sea after failing to turn up enough oil to justify the cost of drilling in the frigid and difficult-to-manage Arctic waters

**The present:** Currently there are two hurdles facing the president in his push for more offshore drilling — one political, the other economic.

1) Bipartisan opposition to more offshore oil and gas drilling. A handful of politicians in Trump's party, including Reps. Mark Sanford (R-S.C.), Frank

LoBiondo (R-N.J.) and Vern Buchanan (R-Fla.), have voiced support for or sponsored legislation, locking Obama-era offshore policy in place. These Republicans don't want to see oil rigs in their constituents' backyards, and risk backlash from any future spill due to a leasing push they backed. Plus, a local say in how nearby ocean waters are leased for exploration squares with the GOP ideology of states' rights.

"Clearly, the coastal governors will have different views about where they want to see offshore development," Katharine MacGregor, acting assistant secretary for lands and minerals management at the Interior Department, told a conference of offshore executives in May, according to the Houston Chronicle.

But she indicated her boss, Interior Secretary
Ryan Zinke, may focus political fire at California,
whose Democratic governor, Jerry Brown, also
opposes drilling off his state's shores. "The
secretary has had quite a few questions about
California, and other areas that seem to come up
every time you talk about a five-year
plan," MacGregor said.

2) The price of oil. Due to strong natural gas production onshore in the United States (among other reasons), a barrel of oil is currently selling for less than \$50, despite recent gains. The same supply-and-demand forces that kept gasoline prices low even during peak driving times over the Fourth of July weekend are giving oil and gas companies less motivation to build expensive offshore rigs with cheaper-to-extract natural gas available onshore.

Or as The Post's Darryl Fears reported last week, "many oil companies balk at the massive investment in equipment needed to drill offshore when the price is lower than \$85, analysts say."


The price of petroleum, historically very volatile, could always rebound to the point of making offshore development economically viable. But so far, it doesn't appear that the Trump administration has offered an expected future price spike as justification for the current "drill, baby, drill" push.

-- This could be big: On Monday, a federal appeals court rejected the Trump administration's delay of an Obama-era rule to limit methane pollution in oil and natural gas drilling.

The court sided with environmental groups, ruling that while the Environmental Protection Agency could reconsider the rule, it did not have the authority to implement the 90-day delay while it looked to rewrite it, The Post's Juliet Eilperin and Steven Mufson reported.

The court will separately decide on the agency's

proposal to extend the rule delay to two years, but the EPA will have to immediately begin enforcing the rule, which the Obama administration established in 2016 to prevent leaks of climate-warming methane from oil and gas operations.

Why it matters: The court decision only undoes a 90-day delay. But a judicial ruling reinstating one of his predecessor's policy could spell trouble for Trump as he pursues his agenda of revoking a large swath of Obama-era rules.


Eilperin and Mufson write: "The ruling could affect myriad agencies that have delayed the Obama administration's regulations, some for long periods. And it underscores the extent to which activists are turning to the courts to block President Trump's most ambitious policy shifts."

-- **Shhhh:** The Pentagon will now keep secret once public assessments of the safety and security of nuclear weapons operations, the Associated Press reported.

Before, details from inspection reports, including a base's "pass/fail" grade, were available to the public. But the Trump administration decided that was too much information to reveal to potential adversaries abroad.

The counter-argument: "I think the new policy fails to

distinguish between protecting valid secrets and shielding incompetence," Steven Aftergood, a government secrecy expert with the Federation of American Scientists, told the AP. "Clearly, nuclear weapons technology secrets should be protected. But negligence or misconduct in handling nuclear weapons should not be insulated from public accountability."




The Conowingo Dam, on the Susquehanna River in Darlington, MD. (Photo by Bill O'Leary/The Washington Post)

-- That damn dam: The Conowingo Dam on the Susquehanna River in Maryland may derail the \$19 billion plan to clean up the Chesapeake Bay, The Post's Darryl Fears reports.

New technology shows that the reservoir will fill 15 years ahead of schedule. A report from the scientists on the EPA program managing bay cleanup found that the reservoir behind the dam has filled with sediment a lot quicker than predicted. The reservoir was meant to hit capacity between 2030 and 2035 but is already 95 percent full and could stop blocking sediment from the bay in the next three years.

Sediment has always flowed naturally down the Susquehanna and other rivers since time began, "but human development altered the landscape and caused more," Johns Hopkins University professor William P. Ball said. Too much sediment buries grasses that protect juvenile fish, crabs and other marine animals on the bay floor.

Now the burden of what to do without the help of reservoir falls to the six states in the Chesapeake Bay region, already in a multimillion dollar hole from the cleanup plan.



-- Totally new natural gas deal: Total signed an agreement with Iran to pump natural gas in the Persian Gulf. Working in partnership with government-owned oil and gas companies in Iran and China, the French major will invest \$1 billion in developing part of the South Pars gas field.

But the big risk to the project sits more than 6,000 miles away in the Oval Office.

The New York Times reports: "The decision has farreaching implications, not least setting a path that
other Western energy companies could soon follow,
and possibly giving Total an inside track for future
contracts in Iran. But it also exposes the company to
risk if Mr. Trump reneges on the Iran nuclear deal, or if
the United States imposes further sanctions against
Tehran."

-- Next weekend's beach read: Journalist Eliza
Griswold has an article in the latest issue of The New
Yorker profiling Veronica Coptis, an environmental
activist married to a coal worker, and, more broadly,
the rural southwestern Pennsylvania coal country
where she was raised and works

The best line: For as much talk as there is about how jobs in the solar industry outnumber those in coal by more than two to one, those gigs often just don't have the same appeal to Greene County, Pa. residents —

with some justification. "No job making solar panels was going to pay someone without a college education a six-figure salary," Griswold writes.



-- Nixing nuclear in South Korea: There's another nuclear issue brewing on the Korean Peninsula beside Kim Jong Un's missile tests. South Korea's new president, Moon Jae-in, promised to scrap plans for building any new nuclear power plants in South Korea after taking office in May. Now a group of about two dozen prominent scientists and conservationists are urging Jae-in to reconsider.

What they're saying: "Instead of phasing out nuclear, we encourage you to lead an effort to both make nuclear even safer and more cost-economical than it already is through the development and demonstration of accident-tolerant fuels and new plant designs," the group wrote in their letter. They said that it is hard to see South Korea meeting its Paris agreement goals without more nuclear energy.


Why it matters: South Korea has made nuclear energy work better than any other nation. As the letter writers note, South Korea is the only country where the cost of nuclear plants have declined. The South Koreans have become so good at building these plants that the United Arab Emirates hired the nation's major state-controlled electric utility, KEPCO, to build four reactors there. Jae-in's rollback threatens any future KEPCO contracts abroad.



-- Heavy stuff: The Post's Jenna Gallegos wrote a good explainer on "weight restriction days" for commercial jets, and why you may be seeing more of them as heat waves proliferate.

The science: When it's hot enough at high elevations, the air will become too thin for laden airlines to take off (since planes achieve flight by pushing off of the air molecules around it). Days when extra precautions are taken are deemed "weight restriction days." Last month, for example, nearly 60 American Airlines flights were canceled in Phoenix over the course of three scorching days.

What this means: There could be four times as many weight restriction days by 2050 for the most "at-risk" airports, according to a 2015 study. Airliners "lose weight" by leaving behind passengers, fuel or cargo. So for long flights on hot days, that could mean more passengers or more luggage left behind. Last year, the International Civil Aviation Organization, the U.N. agency that oversees aviation, said increase temperatures was one of its main climate-related concerns.

-- Do as the Romans do: The vast sea walls created by ancient Roman builders may help scientists create modern concrete walls to protect shoreline environments from rising sea levels.

Marie Jackson, an expert in ancient Roman concrete at the University of Utah, is "attempting to recreate this durable concrete using San Francisco seawater and more abundant volcanic rocks. She has several samples sitting in ovens and jars in her lab, which she will test for evidence of similar chemical reactions," The Post's Ben Guarino reported.

"If her effort is successful, the concrete could yet have a role to play in human history — 'if one was indeed interested in making sea walls" and "forced to protect shoreline environments,' Jackson said. (In one 2014 study, a team of European climate scientists predicted that, if the next 90 years follow the trend of the past 30, the cost of constructing barriers to hold back the sea might rise to as high as \$71 billion per year. The alternative, coastal flooding, could do trillions of dollars in damage annually.)"







# The New Endangered Species Act Rules, Explained

Earlier this week, the Departments of the Interior and Commerce announced new rules concerning implementation of the Endangered Species Act Much of the media coverage has been over-the-top, posing questions like whether the new rules "gutted" the act, are a giveaway to big oil, and "Why does Trump hate polar bears and kids?" This isn't

unusual; most every proposed change under the law has evoked such responses,

even when proposed under presidents generally viewed favorably by environmentalists

The new rules do a wide variety of things, including codifying longstanding policies, making minor technical tweaks, and implementing more

significant, substantive changes to how the law is implemented. So what do these new rules really mean for endangered and threatened species?

### **Economic Impacts in Listing Decisions**

The Endangered Species Act <u>requires</u> Interior and Commerce to determine whether or not a species warrants an endangered or threatened listing based solely on the science, without consideration of economic impacts Previously, agency regulations also required such decisions to be made "without reference to possible economic or other impacts of such determination" One of the new rules <u>deletes</u> this requirement

This rule-change does not allow economic impacts to affect whether a species is listed as endangered or threatened Indeed, the rule explicitly "acknowledge[s] that the statute and its legislative history are clear that listing determinations must be made solely on the basis of the best scientific and commercial data available" according to five statutory factors. Thus, the rule gives the agency no authority to decline to list a species based on the economic impacts of such decision. If the agency attempted to do so, it would violate the statute and the rule

Although this change has no effect on listings, it may have political significance. In fact, the agencies justify the rule on transparency grounds, explaining that they intend to report these economic impacts to better inform the public. If the costs are extraordinarily high, some fear this may create political momentum for Congress to amend the Endangered Species Act

But this risk seems remote Economic impacts are considered and reported under several other parts of the act. For instance, critical habitat can only be designated "after taking into consideration the economic impact". The economic impacts reported under this provision can be exceedingly high. Critical habitat for the green sturgeon, for instance, was estimated to cost up to \$600 million per year. Many other species have estimated impacts exceeding \$100 million and the cumulative impacts are well into the billions. Yet protecting species remains extremely popular.

### Consideration of Climate Change Impacts

The Endangered Species Act <u>distinguishes</u> between "endangered" species (those at risk of extinction today) and "threatened species" (those likely to become endangered "within the foreseeable future") The new rules <u>define</u>the "foreseeable future" as "extend[ing] only so far into the future as the Services can reasonably determine that both the future threats and the species' responses to those threats are likely "

Some have suggested this rule will make it harder for the agencies to list species threatened by climate change. However, the rule merely codifies the policy the agencies have followed since 2009. Since that time, numerous species have been designated based on climate change impacts. In 2012, for instance, the Department of Commerce designated several populations of bearded seal as threatened by climate change and the loss of sea ice, relying on IPCC modeling. In doing so, the agency explicitly followed the 2009 policy.

To be sure, others have argued that climate science is too speculative to affect listing decisions. And they will likely continue to do so. But the new rule doesn't make it harder for the agencies to rely on climate science. Instead, it merely makes public and binding the policy that has governed listing decisions during the George W. Bush, Obama, and Trump administrations

# Threatened Species

One of the new rules restores the Endangered Species Act's distinction between the regulation of endangered and threatened species. When Congress enacted the law in 1973, it reserved the "take" prohibition—which forbids activities that affect any member of a species or its habitat—for endangered species. The prohibition could be extended to threatened species too, but only if the agencies deemed it "necessarily and advisable" for the conservation of the species.

In 1975, the Interior Department issued a <u>blanket rule</u> extending this prohibition to all threatened species, unless it adopted a special rule relaxing the prohibition for a particular species. In essence, the blanket rule provided <u>no meaningful distinction</u> between regulations for species that are listed as threatened or endangered

One of the new rules issued this week repeals the blanket rule—thus restoring Congress' original distinction between threatened and endangered species. This move aligns Interior's practice with that of the Commerce Department, which has never had a blanket rule (The Commerce Department manages marine species, like whales and most fish) This new rule only applies prospectively. So the blanket rule continues to cover species previously listed as threatened, meaning no species lose any protection because of the change.

This change has been described as "weakening" protections for threatened species. But that doesn't necessarily mean that species will fare worse under the new rule than they did under the old one. In *The Road to Recovery*, I've argued that restoring regulatory distinctions between endangered and threatened species will better align the incentives of landowners with the interests of rare species. Under the new rule, burdens imposed on landowners will increase if species decline and relax as they recover, giving landowners a significant stake in a species' status

In fact, the rule change formalizes a shift begun under the Obama administration <u>According to a Defenders of Wildlife</u> report, the Obama administration's Interior Department relied less frequently on the blanket rule than nearly any other administration, opting instead to relax "take" prohibitions using the same type of "species-specific" rules that will now be more common under the new rules for threatened species moving forward Indeed, the new rule adopts the same policy the Commerce Department has followed for decades, without any evidence that it has undermined the protection of species under its authority

Of course, the way agencies implement this change going forward <u>matters a great deal</u> But the new rule holds <u>significant promise</u> for boosting the rate at which we recover endangered species (which is currently under 3 percent)

### Critical Habitat

The Endangered Species Act directs that land essential to the conservation of endangered and threatened species be designated as critical habitat. This can include lands occupied by the species or unoccupied lands. The effect on property owners of such designations may include additional permitting or mitigation requirements for any use of the land that requires a federal permit.

The new rules require all occupied areas to be designated as critical habitat before unoccupied areas can be considered. This restores a rule that was in place until 2016. It likely means that unoccupied areas will continue to be a small percentage of designated critical habitat. Since 2007, for instance, roughly 97 percent of critical habitat was occupied at the time of listing

Although unoccupied areas are rarely designated, they are an outsized source of controversy. In 2011, Interior designated 1,500 acres as critical habitat for the dusky gopher frog on private lands in Louisiana, despite the fact that none had been seen there in 50 years and the land

would require extensive restoration work to become suitable for the species again. Despite the lack of benefit to the species, the designation could have cost the landowner up to \$34 million in lost development value. A challenge to that designation ultimately reached the U.S. Supreme Court last fall, which held in a unanimous decision that only habitable land could be designated as critical habitat.

The new rules aim to reduce the number of such conflicts and address (in part) the effects of the Supreme Court's decision. They require any unoccupied lands designated as critical habitat to "contain one or more of the physical or biological features essential to the species' conservation" and a "reasonable certainty" that the land "will contribute to the conservation of the species."

These changes will likely discourage marginally the designation of unoccupied land. But, given the limited historical reliance on such lands, the need to conform agency practice to the Supreme Court's decision, and the fact that conflicts over these lands benefit neither property owners nor species, the effect of the change will be modest

### Delisting Species

Finally, the new rules also <u>provide</u> that "[t]he standard for a decision to delist a species is the same as the standard for a decision not to list it in the first instance" In other words, there is no higher standard for delisting species than applies to the initial decision to list it. This is consistent with the <u>Endangered Species Act's text</u>, which addresses both listing and delisting decisions under the same provision and with the same five-factor test.

Some have argued that the bar for delisting a species should be much higher than the bar to list a species, reflecting a more cautious approach And some courts seem to have erected such barriers. For instance, asserting that the standard should be higher "when a species is already listed," a federal court recently struck down the delisting of the Yellowstone grizzly bear, despite extensive, bipartisan recovery efforts that enabled the species to exceed its recovery goal (and likely its ecosystem's carrying capacity)

But a heavy thumb on the scale against delisting may not be in the long-term interests of endangered species. One of the <u>primary incentives</u> for recovery efforts is the promise that, if the efforts succeed, the species will be delisted and federal regulations will be lifted. Making delisting too difficult may have the unfortunate consequence of <u>discouraging efforts to recover species</u>

### Interagency Cooperation

The Endangered Species Act also <u>requires</u> agencies to consult with the Interior and Commerce Departments if the activities they undertake, approve, or fund may affect listed species If any activity will jeopardize a species' survival or adversely modify its habitat, it is prohibited But determining whether these standards are met can be a <u>drawn out and expensive process</u> One of the new rules <u>adopts</u> several changes to this interagency process, although most are of a technical variety

These changes include focusing on those effects that are most certain to occur, establishing a baseline against which to compare these effects, clarifying the information required, setting deadlines for reviews, and the standards that apply to these reviews Of all the rules, this is the one that depends most on how agencies implement it (which is perhaps unsurprising for a largely procedural rule) To fully diagnose the rule, we'll have to wait and see how it works in practice

But it's important to bear in mind how infrequently these interagency reviews result in findings that projects will jeopardize a species or adversely modify its habitat According to a Defenders of Wildlife study, none of the more than 100,000 projects that underwent this review from 2008 to 2015 led to a jeopardy or adverse-modification determination. This is likely because agencies have gotten pretty good over the last 45-plus years in adjusting projects to avoid or mitigate impacts to endangered species prior to submitting them for review, in the hopes of streamlining the review process. That knowledge won't go away

# Murkowski manages to keep lands bill 'clean' — so far (E&E)

A plurality of senators yesterday voted to kill two amendments to a broad public lands package that would have threatened the overall legislation's survival.

The Senate adjourned for the week before it could finish work on <u>S. 47</u>, the "Natural Resources Management Act," and will next vote Monday evening on the package of more than 100 land and water bills.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) filed a motion to end debate on the legislation last night.

Earlier in the day, Sen. Mike Lee (R-Utah) offered a measure that would have gutted the centerpiece of S. 47 — permanent reauthorization of the Land and Water Conservation Fund.

In a 68-30 vote, 29 Republicans joined Democrats in voting to table, or kill, Lee's amendment to temporarily reauthorize LWCF through Sept. 30, 2023.

Senate Energy and Natural Resources Chairwoman Lisa Murkowski (R-Alaska) encouraged members to table the measure, which she and panel ranking member Joe Manchin (D-W.Va.) feared would jeopardize the carefully crafted, bipartisan package.

Referring to the legislation's permanent reauthorization of LWCF as well as reforms to the program, the Alaska Republican said, "What we have collaborated to build at this point in time is a necessary fix to address the continuation of the LWCF, and I would ask for members' support."

Manchin also urged his colleagues to keep the public lands package "clean" and the negotiated agreement intact so it can pass the House after it leaves the Senate.

Lee, who objected to bringing the lands package to the floor late last year, called LWCF a "broken program" that has been used primarily "for more federal acquisition" while the government fails to properly care for the land it already manages.

A permanent renewal of LWCF would deny lawmakers "any leverage, any real opportunity regularly to reform the program in the future," the Utah Republican said.

Senators also shot down 66-33 an LWCF-related amendment from Oklahoma Republican Sens. James Lankford and Jim Inhofe, as well as Sen. John Cornyn (R-Texas), which would have required 5 percent of LWCF funds used for federal land acquisition to go toward the deferred maintenance backlog on federal lands.

The federal government "should actually take care of deferred maintenance when we buy it, so we're not adding property with deferred maintenance on it on day one," Lankford said in floor remarks.

Murkowski said she "reluctantly opposed" the Lankford amendment because it would be "detrimental" to the package's survival. But she said she appreciated the Oklahoman's effort to address the multibillion-dollar maintenance backlog on public lands and wanted to "make sure that we all take this on as an issue to address in a way that is rational, sound and reasonable going forward into the future."

Manchin sympathized with Lankford but said the timing wasn't right for his amendment. The LWCF language in the bill "has been carefully negotiated, not only in the Senate but between the House also," the Democrat said.

"Only in Washington, D.C., and in the federal government would we say, 'We want to do something but we can't do something, my hope is we will do something," Lankford said. "This is one of these dialogues that we've had for a long time — how can we deal with deferred maintenance that is \$16 billion and growing, and there is no plan to shrink it?"

S. 47 already contains language that speaks to some of the concerns from Lee and Lankford. The legislation would reform LWCF's funding allocation levels: It would allocate 40 percent of money to the fund's stateside program, 40 percent to the federal government and 20 percent for other necessary activities, which could include deferred maintenance needs.

Utah Rep. Rob Bishop, the top Republican on the House Natural Resources Committee, pushed hard to include those changes during last year's negotiations on the package.

During the votes yesterday, Lee and Murkowski were huddled for a long time talking at the front desk in the chamber. Manchin popped over briefly, and Sen. Maria Cantwell (D-Wash.), one of the package's four main negotiators in the previous Congress, watched closely nearby.

In addition to the cloture vote on S. 47, senators on Monday might also consider another Lee amendment that would add language to the Antiquities Act requiring congressional approval of new national monument designations or expansions in Utah.

Lee tried unsuccessfully last year to include similar language into the public lands package (*E&E Daily*, Dec. 20, 2018).

American Access to Wild Salmon on the Line as Risky Mining Project in Bristol Bay Advances through Federal Permitting

Businesses including Whole Foods, PCC Community Markets, Seattle Restaurant Alliance, Coastal Transportation, Patagonia, Orvis, Leader Creek Fisheries and more than 200 others urge U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to reject proposed Pebble Mine

Seattle, WA: Business leaders from Seattle and beyond released a letter today calling on the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to suspend its federal permitting process for the controversial Pebble Mine project and to protect Bristol Bay's salmon fishery - the largest and most valuable in the world. The letter states:

"Given the ecological sensitivity of the Bristol Bay watershed, it deserves the most rigorous, science-based environmental impact assessment possible. Anything less jeopardizes the economic stability of our industries and bottom lines... The [National Environmental Policy Act] process was created to ensure transparency and protection of the American public, especially in places like Bristol Bay that provide irreplaceable public goods and benefits. The undersigned businesses ask that the Army Corps restart its review of the Pebble Partnership's permit application and hold this project to the highest bar."

Far Bank Enterprises, whose subsidiaries operate under the brand names Sage, Redington, RIO Products, and Fly Water Travel, have long been advocates for protecting Bristol Bay. "Our brands and the fly fishing industry at large have been involved in the efforts to protect Bristol Bay from the Pebble Mine for well over a decade. It's one of the major conservation battles for recreational fishing, and the Bristol Bay fishery supports not only lodges and outfitters in Alaska but also manufacturers, retailers, and travel agencies across the nation. Until we see Bristol Bay protected, we will not relent. The process must be science-based, rigorous, and transparent. # Wheeler and Wehrum tout long-term regulatory success

Acting EPA chief Andrew Wheeler, who once represented a coal company that bitterly complained about the burden of Clean Air Act regulations, today hailed the agency's long-term success in improving air quality as the economy grew robustly.

From 1970 through last year, the combined emissions of six common pollutants fell by almost three-quarters while the economy expanded by more than 260 percent, Wheeler said in a conference call with reporters tied to the release of EPA's latest annual air trends **report**.

"These are remarkable achievements that should be recognized, celebrated and replicated around the world," Wheeler said.

When President Trump sounded him out roughly a month ago about taking his current job, Wheeler said, he was asked to keep cleaning up the nation's air and water while continuing deregulation to spur economic growth.

"The data that we're releasing today shows we can do all three," he said.

Echoing the theme was EPA air chief Bill Wehrum: "The long-term trends are substantial, and we've continued to make progress in recent years."

The report focuses on sulfur dioxide, particulate matter and four other "criteria" pollutants that EPA is required to regulate under regularly updated standards. From 1990 through 2017, for example, SO2 releases plunged by 88 percent, while direct emissions of fine particulates fell by 29 percent from 2000 through last year.

Although the number of unhealthy air quality days ticked up last year — from 701 to 729 — the total was still far below the approximately 1,800 days in that category recorded in 2007.

As Wehrum later tacitly acknowledged in response to a reporter's question, much of the improvement came under the Obama administration, which tightened the standards for most of those six pollutants during its eight-year tenure.

"It's been observed that implementation of the Clean Air Act is like a relay race," Wehrum said. From administration to administration, he added, "all of the elements continue to be implemented very aggressively and continue to contribute to durable and consistent downward trends."

But before rejoining EPA last year, Wheeler and Wehrum represented businesses or trade groups that battled a number of Obama-era air rules. Wheeler lobbied for Murray Energy Corp., the Ohiobased coal company that remains the lead plaintiff in litigation challenging EPA's 2015 ground-level ozone standard (*E&E News PM*, Oct. 26, 2015).

As a lawyer in private practice, Wehrum represented the Brick Industry Association, which unsuccessfully fought an air toxics rule for makers of brick and tile products.

Both Murray and the Brick Industry Association charged that those regulations would be damaging to their respective industries. Asked whether such concerns were overblown, Wehrum, citing client confidentiality, declined to comment specifically, and Wheeler had left the call by that point. But although it's "absolutely" possible to have strong air quality control programs, Wehrum said, "it's vitally important that we do that in the most efficient and the smartest way possible."

Wehrum singled out a favorite illustration: EPA's New Source Review program, which requires power plants and other big sources of air pollution to get pre-construction permits before building new plants or making significant expansions of exiting facilities.

But while previous administrations have sought to have the most stringent possible requirements on the books, he said, "I think that's totally wrong."

Those kinds of strict rules discourage companies from undertaking energy efficiency and other environmentally protective projects for fear of triggering New Source Review requirements, Wehrum said.

By structuring the program to hit a "sweet spot" between needed emission reductions and overregulation, he said, "you're producing a much better overall result, and that's what we're all about in this administration."

On his watch, EPA has already made several significant administrative changes to the New Source Review program. Environmental groups have been strongly opposed.

In May, for example, the Environmental Defense Fund and two other organizations filed suit over a decision to compress the process for predicting the potential rise in emissions expected from a plant expansion or other significant modification to a major industrial pollution source (*Greenwire*, June 5). The suit, brought before the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit, is pending.

EPA acting Administrator Andrew Wheeler met on Wednesday with Republican donor and conservationist Andy Sabin, the latest sign the new EPA chief is making his office more accessible than Scott Pruitt had.

"I told him, 'You have an obligation to protect the public's health," Sabin, who runs Sabin Metals and has made almost \$1 million in hard money donations to Republicans over the last two election cycles, told POLITICO. "It should be smart deregulation. Anything that affects the public health should not be deregulated."

In his first days as head of EPA, Wheeler has met with a more diverse set of visitors than the conservatives and business interests that gathered with Pruitt. According to his calendar, Wheeler has met with environmental groups like the National Wildlife Federation and pro-biofuels groups like Fuels America.

Wheeler's meeting with Sabin was arranged by Sabin's lawyer, Brent Fewell, a founder at the Earth & Water Law Group and a former Bush Administration EPA official. Sabin traveled to Washington to meet with senators to advocate for conservation bills, including National Park Restoration Act, S. 2509 (115), and a measure to make permanent the Land and Water Conservation Fund, S. 896 (115).

Sabin said he did not bring up climate change, though he has been an advocate for climate action.

Sabin says Wheeler mostly listened during the meeting, though he told Sabin that streamlining permitting would be a priority. Sabin said a meeting schedule for 15 minutes ended up running 35 minutes.

"I found that extremely encouraging," Sabin said. "It made me feel very good about the guy."





So far, many Senate Republicans have steered clear of criticizing Environmental Protection Agency chief Scott Pruitt over his controversial spending and management decisions.

But now the top Republican on the committee overseeing the EPA is taking a tougher line on the embattled administrator.

Senate Environment and Public Works Committee
Chairman John Barrasso (R-Wyo.) sent a barbed letter
to Pruitt questioning whether he is complying with

public records requests -- given that the EPA chief has maintained four different email addresses during his tenure.

"During your confirmation hearing, I specifically asked you from 'refrain from taking any action -- that makes it difficult or impossible for the public to access your official written communications under the Freedom of Information Act," Barrasso wrote Pruitt in a letter Friday, The Post's Juliet Eilperin reports this morning. "You agreed to my request."

As The Washington Post first reported last week, three of Pruitt's four emails do not follow EPA's conventional format. Agency lawyers have raised concerns that not all of them are being searched during Freedom of Information Act requests. "Can you affirm that the EPA does in fact search all your official email accounts when responding to FOIA requests?" Barrasso said in the letter.

Barasso's move to join Democratic Sens. Jeff Merkley (Ore.) and Tom Carper (Del.), in scrutinizing Pruitt may give other Republicans cover to criticize the EPA chief more openly.

Until this week, Barrasso held back from criticizing any of Pruitt's actions while in office, choosing instead to praise his efforts to roll back regulations he considers harmful to businesses. Just last month, Pruitt had toured a coal min in Wyoming with Barrasso.

While the EPA insisted that the agency searches all accounts in response to public records requests,

Barrasso's letter is a sign he may rev up congressional oversight.

After all, the emails are not the only issue on Barrasso's radar. On Monday, he also raised concern the Government Accountability Office's finding that the EPA violated federal spending laws by failing to notify Congress before installing a private phone booth in Pruiit's office last year at a cost of \$43,000.

The law caps redecoration, furnishing or other improvements to Pruitt's office at \$5,000. While the EPA argued the booth should not be subject to the cap, the GAO did not buy those arguments. The GAO also found the agency violated the federal Antideficiency Act.

"It is critical that EPA and all federal agencies comply with notification requirements to Congress before spending tax payer dollars," Barrasso said in a statement. "EPA must give a full public accounting of this expenditure and explain why the agency thinks it was complying with the law."

As more government watchdogs come out with reports about Pruitt's behavior, the pressure on Republicans to take a stand will only intensify.

On Monday, the EPA's inspector general released an interim report that found the EPA gave raises to three of Pruitt's aides sing an obscure provision of the Safe Drinking

Water Act — one more pay bump than what was originally made public.

Pruitt's chief of staff signed off on controversial raises for three top political staffers, Bloomberg reports.

The report said Ryan Jackson, Pruitt's chief of staff, authorized the pay raises worth tens of thousands of dollars — a funding that initially seems to support Pruitt's insistence he did not know about the raises. Documents show Jackson signed off on the salary hikes under "action requested by Ryan T. Jackson, chief of staff" and "action authorized by E. Scott Pruitt, administrator," in one place signing as "Ryan Jackson for Scott Pruitt."

The two federal reports published Monday gave Pruitt critics "fresh ammunition," as Politico reports. Following the reports, the Post's editorial board piles on by writing "it becomes ever more astonishing that an administrator so clearly unfit for service continues to lead a crucial federal agency."

to give a speech to the Golden Knights, an NHL team owned by one of Zinke's former campaign donors, The Post's Darryl Fears reports.

Ethics officials were also not made aware of Zinke's ties to the host of the speech. "[H]ad ethics officials been made aware that the Golden Knights' owner had been a donor to Zinke's congressional campaign, it might have prompted further review and discussion," it noted.

— "Did [Obama] say he was a foreigner?" In 2013, Zinke invited a self-described "birther" on his radio show and questioned the college records of then-President Barack Obama, CNN reports. Speaking with political activist and fellow former Navy SEAL Larry Bailey, Zinke mused: "And the college records, you know, why not release them? I'm interested. Did [Obama] say he was a foreigner and did he get a scholarship? Did he apply and receive a grant? That's what I hear. I don't know."


In a statement, Interior spokeswoman Heather Swift said: "As a radio host, (Zinke) had many guests on his program who expressed a variety of views and opinions. Mr. Zinke would always challenge his guests to defend their opinions regardless of the topic and no matter how controversial."





January is one of the coldest, darkest months of the year in the United States — especially this January, with the eastern half of the country gripped by frigid Arctic air and awaiting something being called a "bomb cyclone."

But in Washington this month, things may get really gloomy for the U.S. solar industry.

The federal government faces two deadlines in January that could have far-reaching ramifications on the U.S. solar industry if they do not go industry's way.

By the first of the two deadlines, an independent agency needs to decide whether to accept a Trump administration proposal designed to boost coal and nuclear power plants. By the second deadline, President Trump himself will have to choose whether to slap rival nations with a set of tariffs the domestic solar industry largely opposes.

"Bad decisions in either case would have negative impacts on the U.S. solar industry," said Abigail Ross Hopper, president and chief executive of the Solar Energy Industries Association (SEIA).

The decisions come just as the United States is poised to capitalize on several years of growth in renewable energy sources. Wind and solar sources provided 7 percent of electricity generated in the country in 2016, up from less than a percentage point a decade ago.

First up: the Federal Energy Regulatory

Commission (FERC) has until Jan. 10 to decide
whether to finalize an electric grid plan that
would reward facilities capable of keeping 90day fuel supplies on hand — effectively, those
plants powered by coal or uranium.

The plan emerged from the Energy Department after its contested study examining whether the grid could withstand the retirement of aging coal-fired

and nuclear power plants.

As those old plants are replaced by renewable sources like solar, which produces energy only intermittently, Energy Secretary Rick Perry and some independent experts are concerned the grid may someday no longer be able to provide power at peak hours — for instance, when the sun goes down and consumers turn on the lights at home.

But studies — including the Energy Department's own — found the loss of traditional power sources has not yet diminished the grid's reliability. Critics blasted the 90-day rule as a ham-handed attempt by Perry to play favorites with coal and nuclear — one that flies in the face of FERC policy since the 1990s to make electricity markets more competitive. Clean energy lobbyists worry the implementation of such a rule will make renewables less competitive.

"It's an extremely cruel, blunt tool," said Rob Gramlich, who works for renewable energy clients through his consulting firm Grid Strategies LLC.

After initially giving the independent agency only 45 days to rule, Perry begrudgingly extended the deadline to mid-January at the request of FERC's new chairman, Kevin McIntyre, writing that the

"better course of action" would be for FERC to act sooner rather than later.

But the entire energy industry, save coal and nuclear, thought the Trump administration was asking the regulatory agency to decide too hastily, given the viability of electricity markets hung in the balance. A coalition of strange bedfellows, including the top lobbyists for the oil, solar and wind industries, insisted FERC give itself more time to reply.

In the meantime, a key Republican member of the commission, Robert Powelson, publicly praised competitive markets in an October speech. "The moment we put our thumbs on the scale," he said, "is the moment we bastardize the process."

Given that, renewable advocates are optimistic the five-member commission, with three Republicans and two Democrats, will not rubber-stamp Energy's proposal.

"Without his vote," said Gramlich, "I don't imagine the two Democrats, Cheryl LaFleur and Richard Glick, approving it."

Meanwhile, coal boosters seem to be preparing for the plan to fail. The U.S. Chamber of Commerce, which initially funded a study cited by Energy when it proposed the rule, wrote in a FERC filing that the study sponsorship "should not be interpreted as support for the market interventions." And after photos emerged of coal executive Robert E. Murray giving Perry a coal "Action Plan" outlining plant payments similar to what his department ultimately proposed, Murray claimed he "never proffered" the idea

Still, the grid resiliency issue is unlikely to go away even if FERC rejects Perry's specific proposal.

Energy observers expect the commission to try to develop a more sophisticated market for compensating electricity generators for being able to produce power reliably.

The second deadline faces the president himself
— and, because of that, worries some solar
lobbyists more.

In October, the U.S. International Trade
Commission (ITC) voted to support tariffs and other
import restrictions to protect domestic solar
companies from an influx of cheap solar panels
produced overseas.

While two U.S.-based solar-panel makers, Suniva and SolarWorld Americas, brought the original case to the commission, the broader U.S. solar industry opposes any tariff that could drive up the low price of panels, a key advantage powering the

industry's growth over more costly coal and nuclear plants.

The ITC's decision provides Trump with a much-sought opportunity to levy a tax on China and other solar exporters. In 2017, Trump slowly edged closer to a trade war with China, one of his favorite rhetorical targets on the campaign trail. Over the summer, the Commerce Department decided to tax aluminum foil coming from the country. A decision in the solar case is expected by Jan. 26.

Solar lobbyists spent the latter part of last year meeting with Trump administration officials to make their case that the United States will miss out on a multitrillion-dollar market globally with an ill-paced tariff on the industry in its early days.

"We have had several encouraging conversations with Secretary Perry and his staff," said Hopper from SEIA," and believe that they understand the vital role solar plays, and will increasingly play, in our nation's electricity mix."

Greg Wetstone, president of the American Council
On Renewable Energy, which represents solar
investors, also has had a few meetings with
administration officials in the administration,
including one in December, he said.

"There are senior officials there who understand the importance of the renewable sector, solar in particular, as a national economic driver," Wetstone said.

But unlike the FERC decision, the choice to punish solar panel exporters will be Trump's and Trump's alone — for whom what Wetstone called "an instinctive political tendency toward a tariff" may come into play.


While he calls the proposal in front of FERC "very serious," Wetstone said "most immediately, the tariff is the more serious concern."




There are already extremely cold temperatures nationwide. On Tuesday, the National Weather Service issued wind-chill advisories and frost warnings from South Texas to Canada and from Montana to New England, the Associated Press reports. Warming shelters were opened across the southern United States as hard-freeze warnings were put in place for Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama. Extreme cold has been blamed for at least nine deaths in the last week, per the AP.

-- Study says climate accord could prevent
widespread drought: A new study warns more than a
quarter of people around the world could live in

drought conditions by 2050 if the standards set by the Paris climate agreement are not met. The study is one of the most detailed assessments of future aridity to date, The Guardian reports. "Our research predicts that aridification would emerge over about 20 to 30% of the world's land surface by the time the global mean temperature change reaches 2C," said Manoj Joshi, the study's lead researcher said. "But two-thirds of the affected regions could avoid significant aridification if warming is limited to 1.5C."

-- Mushrooms could be the answer to more energy-efficient laundry detergent. Yep: Two scientists at a Danish biotechnology company are studying fungi outside Copenhagen as they look for a more environmentally friendly way to clean clothes.

The New York Times's Stanley Reed reports that scientists are specifically looking for mushrooms to study enzymes that speed up chemical reactions and processes like decay. "Their work is helping the company develop enzymes for laundry and dishwasher detergents that would require less water, or that would work just as effectively at lower temperatures. The energy savings could be significant. Washing machines, for instance, account for over 6 percent of household electricity use in the European Union," Reed reports.

A bipartisan coalition of 44 House lawmakers is pushing for forthcoming tax extenders legislation to include Rep. Mike Conaway's bill (H.R. 3761) to extend and expand the Section 45Q tax incentive for projects (such as NetPower) that capture and store carbon from fossil fuel power plants and other facilities.

Carbon capture technologies "are a testament to America's strong innovative spirit, inventiveness, and, with our proposed modifications, will continue to play a vital role in our nation's energy portfolio," the lawmakers wrote House caucus and Ways and Means Committee leaders.





Energy Department Under Secretary for Science Paul Dabbar told House Science Chairman Lamar Smith at a Jan. 30 hearing that major aspects of Smith's House-approved bill (H.R. 589), such as prioritizing advanced nuclear instructure and making national lab facilities more accessible to the private sector, could be enacted by the Energy Department regardless of whether it becomes law. "We certainly support the points that are raised [and] we actually have quite a bit of flexibility" to enact them, Dabbar said at the Jan. 30 hearing.

Dabbar also stressed that his office was working directly with more than 85 companies – including United Technologies, Dow, General Motors and Johnson Controls – to develop battery storage technologies. "These are real companies who want to make real money, who are taking our technologies and are moving them forward," Dabbar said. "It is a high priority of the department."

There is "only upside" to the future of battery storage technology, added Under Secretary of Energy Mark Menezes. There are a variety of different options, both those nearing the market and those subject to basic research at the department.



### OMNIBUS SPENDING DEAL BOOSTS CLEAN, RELIABLE ENERGY

Congress approved an FY18 omnibus spending bill that boosts clean and reliable energy funding across the board.

Among the highlights:

### ADVANCED NUCLEAR

- Department of Energy's Office of Nuclear Energy gets a 19 percent boost, to roughly \$1.2 billion, including more money for research and development.
- Funding to begin design of a Versatile Fast Test Reactor critical to advanced reactor development.
- Removal of a prohibition on directed funding for small modular reactor efforts and support for SMR R&D.
- \$10million for the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to help license advanced reactors
- Large increase in Nuclear Energy Enabling Technologies, including advanced modeling and simulation and crosscutting technologies.

• DOE is instructed to provide Congress with recommendations to set "aggressive, but achievable goals to demonstrate a variety of private-sector advanced reactor designs and fuel types by the late 2020s." This partially addresses bipartisan efforts from Sens. Jeff Flake and Martin Heinrich and Rep. Clay Higgins.

#### INNOVATION

- ARPA-E gets a big bump to \$353 million
- DOE's energy innovation loan program office preserved and directed to process incoming applications
- \$41 million (\$10 million increase) for energy storage efforts at DOE's Office of Electricity
- DOE energy innovation hubs fully funded
- 32% increase in funding (from \$53 million to \$70 million) for the R&D
  account that could lead to breakthroughs in perovskite solar, a new material
  that could make printable or paintable solar that is potentially thinner and
  more efficient than today's panels

### CARBON CAPTURE, STORAGE, UTILIZATION


- Directs support for DOE's National Carbon Capture Center, which helps bridge the gap between laboratory research and large-scale demonstrations
- Funds research to improve production from enhanced oil recovery and unconventional reservoirs
- Authorizes \$2 billion in loan guarantees for electric cooperatives to build carbon sequestration at power plants

#### **HYDROPOWFR**

\$35 million for conventional hydropower and pumped storage and \$10 milion in competitive funding opportunity "to test the commercial viability of new use cases for pumped storage hydropower at locations to enhance grid reliability and manage variability."

### WHAT'S STILL MISSING?

- A more fuel-neutral approach to carbon capture, storage and utilization research and funding to incentivize pre-commercial projects
- Lack of goals at DOE for energy storage, similar to those being drafted for advanced nuclear and also called for in bipartisan legislation led by Sens.
   Jeff Flake and Cory Booker




## BARRASSO, WHITEHOUSE INTRO CO2 CAPTURE, PIPELINE BILL

Senate Environment and Public Works Chairman John Barrasso and Sen. Sheldon Whitehouse Thursday introduced the bipartisan Utilizing Significant Emissions with Innovative Technologies (USE IT) Act, which directs EPA to support efforts that reduce and utilize carbon emissions and direct air capture research. It also aims to improve permitting and deployment of carbon capture, utilization and sequestration facilities and the pipelines that would carry the CO2 to be used for enhanced oil recovery, storage, to be developed into products and for other purposes.

The bill is also cosponsored by Sens. Shelley Moore Capito and Heidi Heitkamp as a follow-up to the FUTURE Act which extended and expanded the Section 45Q tax credit. (more on that below!)

The USE IT Act narrowly amends the Clean Air Act to direct EPA to use existing authority to support carbon utilization and direct air capture research, clarifies that carbon capture projects and CO2 pipelines are eligible for expedited permitting reviews, directs the White House Council on Environmental Quality to



## WHY 45Q MATTERS - AND WHY IT'S NOT ENOUGH

The four USE IT Act sponsors were among those also leading the way when Congress fixed the Section 45Q carbon capture tax credit as part of a broader budget deal signed into law in February. It was a big, big deal. This incentive would accelerate technologies that capture, store and utilize carbon emissions from existing and new coal and natural gas plants, as well as industrial facilities that produce a range of U.S. products.

But the new Barrasso-Whitehouse bill also illustrates how the promise of carbon capture technology can't rest on the 45Q fix alone. ClearPath Executive Director Rich Powell and our in-house clean fossil fuel expert Justin Ong explain in a new blog that an ambitious package of steady DOE dollars, private activity bonds, streamlined permitting and other regulatory fixes are still needed.

### **NEWS NUGGETS**

Don't miss Sen. John Hoeven's new op-ed in Roll Call, explaining how the U.S. can lead on carbon capture and more broadly on global fossil energy innovation. "You can't find a better example of how public-private partnerships can spur innovation than Project Tundra," a joint effort to retrofit a North Dakota lignite coal power plant with carbon capture technology that DOE recently awarded \$6 million.

Ahead of the omnibus rollout, Energy Secretary Rick Perry this week offered support for ARPA-E before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee. "I have found some very, very positive things that have come out of it," he said. If Congress funds it, "it will be operated in a way that you will be most pleased with," he added.

NRC Chairwoman Kristine Svinicki told the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee that pre-licensing conversations with NuScale and Oklo on their advanced nuclear designs "continues to be very active." While NuScale has submitted their small modular reactor design, Oklo appears "to be moving out of the pack with some serious intent there to submit a design in the coming years" that will be even more advanced. Svinicki said.

Congress should ease restrictions on purchase power agreements between federal agencies and electric utilities, instruct DOE to relax certain export control regulations that have become unnecessarily cumbersome and order NRC to create a new regulatory regime for future nuclear reactors that is better able to assess risks, according to a set of recommendations by R Street Institute.

FERC has granted an additional 30 days, until May 9, for public comments regarding an analysis by regional grid operators about the resilience of the nation's power grid. FERC has directed regional transmission operators to report on grid resilience.



Trump expected to sign bill calling climate change a "direct threat." Really.



#### THE LIGHTBULB



Since taking office, President Trump has failed to make good on some high-profile campaign promises, such as appointing a special prosecutor to investigate Hillary Clinton and banning all Muslims from entering the country (not from lack of trying, however).

But one area in which Trump has achieved tangible success is slashing energy and environmental regulations. Trump said he would withdraw the United States from the Paris climate agreement, and he began doing so. He said he would undo the Clean Power Plan and other Obama administration rules,

and he began doing that, too.

So it may come as a surprise to hear that before the end of the year, Trump is expected to sign a bill saying that "climate change is a direct threat to the national security of the United States."

That's how one provision of the National Defense
Authorization Act reads. For years, the Defense
Department quietly studied how to adapt its facilities
susceptible to climate change. One 2016 study, for
example, found that a 3-foot rise in the sea level
could submerge 128 military installations.

In addition to declaring a "sense of Congress" that global warming is a national security threat, the defense reauthorization bill would also require the Defense Department to assess the vulnerabilities of the 10 bases most threatened by climate change in each service.

It was never a sure thing that a bill with such language would ever land on the desk of a president who once said he is "not a big believer in man-made climate change."

The climate-change provision was inserted by Rhode Island Rep. Jim Langevin, a Democrat on the House Armed Services Committee, and survived an effort in a 185-to-234 vote led by Rep. Scott Perry (R-Pa.) on the House floor to strip it out.

Shortly before the Thanksgiving break, both the Senate and the House passed a \$700 billion deal on

defense struck by negotiators. The climate provision emerged from that haggling "completely intact," according to Langevin's office.

"It's a signal that Congress is willing to be practical on the issue," said Sharon Burke, a senior adviser at the liberal-leaning think tank New America and former assistant secretary of defense for operational energy under President Barack Obama. In conference, the House also rebuffed a Senateled effort that could have had the effect of eliminating Senate-confirmed assistant secretary positions in each branch of the military meant to handle energy and environmental work at military facilities.

"These are important jobs," said John Conger, who as a former principal deputy undersecretary in the Defense Department's comptroller's office and in other positions there oversaw the energy and environmental policy at bases. "They have sprawling portfolios," he said, adding the Pentagon controls about 25 million acres of land.

The climate provision is one small part of a massive reauthorization bill for the U.S. military worldwide, and the White House has not signaled it will veto the legislation.

But the GOP-led Congress has passed several pieces of legislation reversing environmental rules enacted under Obama. And the Environmental

Protection Agency and Interior Department under Trump have been even more ambitious in rolling back Obama-era rules.

The Pentagon says it continues to take climate change seriously, even under Trump. ""I agree that the effects of a changing climate — such as increased maritime access to the Arctic, rising sea levels, desertification, among others — impact our security situation," Defense Secretary Jim Mattis told the Senate in written testimony this year. By keeping intact the climate language, lawmakers from both parties may be responding to the competing desires of Trump Cabinet officials. Mattis has said he thinks that climate change poses a real threat to national security, while EPA chief Scott Pruitt has questioned the scientific conclusion of his own agency, as well as that of the broader scientific community, that carbon dioxide emissions are creating that global warming threat.

The Pentagon retains a "pragmatic and apolitical approach to climate change," Conger said, "and Congress respects that."

He added the passage of the global warming provision in the NDAA "reflects that the center has moved" leftward in debate on climate change — at least when it comes to addressing the consequences rather than the causes.

"It is a different thing to let someone deal with the

effects of climate change," Conger said, "verses reducing emissions."


supporters and opponents of the Clean Power Plan will air their differences at a two-day hearing in the state's capital hosted by the EPA. Given the choice of venue for the public hearing in the heart of coal country, expect to see EPA head Pruitt and other CPP opponents, such as representatives from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and Arch Coal who are expected to speak, emphasize the detrimental effects Obama-era pollution controls would have had on the coal sector.

And of course, expect to see environmentalists and Democrats show up, including representatives from the New York attorney general's office, the Clean Air Task Force and the NAACP, to make their case on the detrimental effects of coal-fired power pollution.

-- **FEMA in control:** Puerto Rico Gov. Ricardo Rosselló said the island has handed over the Federal Emergency Management Agency authority over disaster-relief spending. The governor said the agency would be able to pre-approve the use of any federal funds and noted the unprecedented move is aimed at increasing transparency in the massive recovery efforts (think Whitefish).

"We want to embark in the most transparent, effective, and efficient recovery process in the history of our nation," he said, per Bloomberg News. "We want to create a certain set of controls that have been unprecedented, robust in nature and that work in




-- Monument in Montana: After recommending last summer that the Badger-Two Medicine area in Montana become a new national monument, Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke hasn't said anything else on the subject. The land is sacred to the Blackfeet Nation tribe in Montana, Zinke's home state, and sits just a couple hours from Whitefish, Mont., where Zinke grew up, according to a report from NPR. A monument designation would protect the area from any oil and gas development. Trump is expected to announce next month his decision on which national monuments to shrink, following earlier recommendations from Zinke. Blackfeet tribal chairman Harry Barnes told NPR that

the proposed designation may be related to Zinke's connection with his home state. And Land Tawney, president of the Montana-based sportsmen's group Backcountry Hunters and Anglers, suggested that Zinke's recommendation may stem from broader political goals.

"I think the people of Montana hold our special places very near and dear," he told NPR. "If you do not protect those places, I think it's a political nightmare for you in this state."

-- Former Zinke backers dismayed: When Trump announced the nomination of Zinke to run Interior, hunters and anglers generally cheered the choice of someone who supports keeping public lands public. "But nine months into the job," writes E&E News in a good one-year-later overview, "many of those who initially supported Zinke say they are surprised by his actions in office. They express dismay over Zinke's review of national monuments, his decision to reopen debate over Obama-era greater sage grouse conservation plans, and the targeting of dozens of policies as 'burdensome' to oil and gas development." Among the rattled are Land Tawney, president of Backcountry Hunters & Anglers, whom The Energy 202 profiled last month.



Keystone pipeline has had more spills occur more frequently than the company initially indicated to regulators in risk assessments before operation began in 2010, according to Reuters. The report follows the latest leak of about 210,000 gallons of oil in Amherst, S.D., which led to a shutdown of the pipeline.

Before construction of the line began, the company's risk assessment said the chance of a spill of more than 50 barrels of oil would occur "not more than once every seven to 11 years over the entire length of the pipeline in the United States," per the operating permit, according to Reuters.

More specifically in South Dakota, the assessment said there would be leaks "no more than once every 41 years." The line has had leaks in South Dakota twice, one time in 2016. There have been three major leaks in total, with another in North Dakota in 2011.

As of Monday, the company had excavated the section of pipeline involved with the spill in Amherst, per Reuters. Brian Walsh, environmental scientist manager with the South Dakota Department of Environment and Natural Resources, said the cleanup was "going as fast as we would hope; they are working 24 hours a day." The pipeline will resume operation today, TransCanada announced, per the Hill. But it will operate at a reduced pressure "to ensure a safe and gradual increase in the volume of crude oil moving through the system."

-- More on TransCanada: The Canada-based company has now asked the Nebraska Public Service Commission to reconsider its approval of a sister pipeline, the Keystone XL, per Reuters. Rather than approving the company's preferred route, the commission approved an order for a pricier alternative that would add five miles of pipeline.


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

-- Our personalities are shaped by the climate we grew up in, a new study says. We know anecdotally that weather affects our mood, writes The Post's Angela Fritz. But a new study published in the journal Nature

finds the climate one grows up in can affect one's entire personality, too.

"Specifically, people who grew up in regions with average temperatures close to 72 degrees tend to be more agreeable, conscientiousness, emotionally stable, extroverted and open", Fritz writes. While describing the results as "fascinating," Antonio Terracciano, a professor of geriatrics at Florida State University, notes Canadians, despite the colder climate, "generally are not less 'nice' than Americans."





-- **Texas**: A reclaimed golf course in the Houston area will drain up to half a billion gallons of storm water when its completed in 2021 and will save up to 3,000 homes, Dylan Baddour writes for The Washington Post. The effort passed a first trial with Hurricane Harvey, during which the Exploration Green project saved about 150 homes from severe flood damage.

"Flood control experts say the project sets an example for Houston as it grapples with improving its flood control and drainage systems after Harvey," Baddour writes. "Space for needed projects may come from scooped-out city parks or bought-out neighborhoods."

-- Michigan: Gov. Rick Snyder (R) and Canadian

company Enbridge Inc. have reached a deal to increase safety precautions for a pair of 64-year-old pipelines that travel beneath the waterway where Lakes Huron and Michigan meet.

"Business as usual by Enbridge is not acceptable and we are going to ensure the highest level of environmental safety standards are implemented to protect one of Michigan's most valuable natural resources," Snyder said Monday, per the Associated Press.

Safety procedures in the agreement include replacing one section of the line with new pipe and temporarily halting the oil flow during storms producing waves at least 8 feet high for more than an hour. The company will also evaluate options including rerouting parts of the line, per the AP.

Lisa Wozniak, executive director of the Michigan
League of Conservation Voters, criticized the
agreement. "Instead of shutting down this dangerous
pipeline, our state leaders continue to place an
enormous amount of trust in Enbridge to operate it
responsibly — even while the company continues to
repeatedly break that trust," she said.

The political exercise to question whether climate change threatens national security could backfire, according to experts. It would confront reams of scientific studies suggesting that rising temperatures stand to stress military missions like responding to humanitarian crises, achieving Arctic security and maintaining coastal bases.

Attempts to erode those findings could flounder, potentially weakening efforts by the administration to roll back rules limiting greenhouse gases at power plants and in cars, said George David Banks, a former climate and international energy adviser to President Trump.

In the early days of the administration, Banks participated in talks at the White House about reviewing climate science. Political officials decided it was a losing situation, he said. The newest effort to perform an "adversarial" review of climate science and its application to national security appears to be in the early stages, Banks said.

"One of the reasons we dismissed this idea is because it was a no-win situation for the administration at that time, and I would argue at this time, as well," he said. "It has the potential to undermine either the regulatory reform agenda or put the president in a box and reduce his flexibility."

That assessment follows revelations that William Happer, an adviser on the White House National Security Council, proposed an executive order to create a group that would question the way that climate science is used in national security documents. Happer, an emeritus physics professor with Princeton University, promotes the benefits of rising carbon dioxide levels in the atmosphere. He has described advocates of climate action as a "cult."

There is a White House recruitment effort underway to form the group, whether or not Trump signs the executive order. Those leading it have reached out to the handful of researchers who question climate science.

Meanwhile, the evidence that climate change threatens national security continues to grow. This week, a military leader said Russia has moved into the thawing Arctic and is bringing in weaponry (Climatewire, March 6).

That's in addition to the damages already being experienced by Americans from more extreme precipitation events, drought, heat waves and wildfires.

The White House effort may be more precarious than Trump assumes, Banks said. There is little chance that Happer and others who reject the science will "win" a hostile review of mainstream research, he said. In the last two years, the administration has targeted many of the rules prioritized by the Obama administration to reduce emissions. Most of those rollbacks are being challenged in court.

"Either the mainstream science wins totally or in part, and if they win even in part, then that is a challenge for the administration," Banks said. "And if there is an acknowledgment that climate change is a national security risk, which any objective analysis would bring you to that conclusion, then the question is what is the response? How does this relate to the president's announcement that we're dropping the Paris Agreement, how does this relate to other domestic policies or the regulatory rollback agenda?"

Others see significant reason for public concern in the White House review because it has been set up to provide political cover for the president's energy agenda.

Such a review could have lasting effects on national security, said Andrew Holland, chief operating officer of the American Security Project. The president could stop public planning for climate change, he said. The review, even if it's scientifically dubious, provides a series of talking points that the president could use to dismiss climate policy.

"It's all for an audience of one, and the president still retains real power and can do real things if he gets the justification to do so," Holland said. "It could be discredited in public and before everybody, but in a lot of things the president is the commander in chief, and when he gives an order, the chain of command has to follow that."

In theory, an adversarial review could strengthen the field of climate science, said Joseph Majkut, head of climate policy at the Niskanen Center, a conservative think tank that advocates for a carbon tax. Majkut said he supported the administration's earlier efforts to conduct a "red team" review of the science, as long as it was conducted properly. It had the potential to strengthen the public's perception of what is known about climate change and shift the opinions of some Republicans who are skeptical of scientists, he said.

But an adversarial review could be detrimental if it's designed to be a partisan exercise.

"It's plausible for adversarial reviews as a tool to help improve the scientific process, to help understand weak points in arguments," Majkut said. "But adversarial reviews are also by their nature quite sensitive and have to be done very well, and they have to be done with buy-in of the community that is being assessed. It has to be done with enough experts that it's meaningful, and they have to be willing to come to conclusions that are not predetermined."

The new effort doesn't reflect that, he said. Happer is not known for having an open mind about climate research.

"This is the last gasp of institutional climate skepticism," Majkut said. "Maybe there is a plan, maybe there is a legitimate critique, but I haven't seen any evidence of that."

To be successful, the White House effort should have a diverse composition of

participants who aren't in agreement, said Micah Zenko, author of the book "Red Team: How to Succeed by Thinking Like the Enemy." The exercise should have the necessary resources, personnel and access to achieve its objective, he said. The administration must also be willing to "fully digest, accept and act upon the results," otherwise it's not a genuine effort to improve understanding, he said.

"Participants should not have a vested interest in that outcome, nor be unduly anchored in preconceived notions regarding the topic," Zenko wrote in response to questions. "If they do, then it's merely a check-the-box activity to validate or invalidate a generally accepted proposition or thesis."

There are areas of climate science where a closer look would be warranted, because the research is still so uncertain, said Robert Kopp, director of the Rutgers University Institute of Earth, Ocean and Atmospheric Sciences and coauthor of the National Climate Assessment. He said there are plenty of areas of rigorous debate in climate science that could use scrutiny. That could improve scientists' understanding of how the Earth is changing, including the extent of sealevel rise, detection and attribution of climate change in extreme weather events, and the economic effects of rising temperatures.

Instead, the White House review will examine science that has been tested and upheld for years, he said.

"These people just want to go around and re-examine things that have been examined for decades as opposed to examining new areas where there are lots of scientists willing to chip in and be critical, because that's where the interesting science is," Kopp said. "Nothing will be put to rest. There have been lots of opportunities and lots of critiques through the decades, but none of them matter to these people."

Interpreting or bending Congress' intent or 'letter of the law' varies from administration to administration and court to court.

Brent and others...can the quantitative value of benefits include subjective measures? How valuable is one life? If you could spend all the money in the world to prevent your child's premature death from the impacts of mercury entering her/his body, would you spend that much? The CDC reported, several years ago, that up to 600,000 infants were born annually in the US with unsafe levels of mercury already in their bodies. (Intuitively, that number, today, must be far less as we've transitioned to cleaner tech.) We know the impacts of mercury on human bodies range from impaired cognitive development to physical impairment like asthma and autism. What is the cumulative cost of additional education and health care investments for wave after wave of hundreds of thousands of Americans born with unsafe levels of mercury in their systems?

The over-arching question is, is the greater good served by permitting some level of toxins entering our environment? The answer has always been, "yes" because coal-fired energy permitted a standard of living that helped life flourish--more lives saved/lived better than lost due to pollution. In developed nations, that answer may need to be revisited as clean tech becomes more ubiquitous. As to the rest of the world, with 5,000 coal plants today and another 1,500 coming soon, the answer will remain "yes" for some time.

Just so folks are aware of what EPA is proposing, below are some bullets from the agency's fact sheet. The central argument and disagreement between this and the last administration is the nature and scope of cost/benefit analysis for the 2012 MATS rule, and whether it was legally appropriate for the agency to consider ancillary co-pollutant benefits v. considering solely HAPs under CAA 112. So this is mostly about how cost/benefit assessment is used to justify regulations. The costs are fairly well defined, but it's the benefits that are difficult to fully quantify. For purposes of the MATS rule, the agency acknowledges the universally agreed negative impacts of mercury on human health and the environment in the attached memo, but concludes the estimated value could not be quantified under the MATS rule. Also, recall that the Supreme Court in 2015 in Michigan v. EPA held the agency must consider costs and that EPA interpreted the CAA unreasonably when it determined that it did not need to consider costs when it issued a "finding" that it was "necessary and appropriate" to regulate. The comment period is open for 60 days (through end of Feb.), so it will be important for opponents of the proposal to submit comments. Ultimately, the agency will need to be persuaded that it is appropriate for it to consider co-pollutant benefits, but given the agency's leadership on the legal issues, I'm doubtful that they will reconsider their position. So the courts will be asked to decide this one.

#### **FACT SHEET**

Mercury and Air Toxics Standards: Proposed Revised Supplemental Finding and Results of the Residual Risk and Technology Review

#### **OVERVIEW**

- On December 27, 2018, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) proposed to revise the Supplemental Cost Finding for the Mercury and Air Toxics Standards (the MATS rule), as well as the Clean Air Act (CAA) required risk and technology review (RTR).
- After taking account of both the cost to coal- and oil-fired power plants of complying with the MATS rule (costs that range from \$7.4 to \$9.6 billion annually) and the benefits attributable to regulating hazardous air pollutant (HAP) emissions from these power plants (quantifiable benefits that range from \$4 to \$6 million annually), as EPA was directed to do by the United States Supreme Court (Michigan v. EPA), the Agency proposes to determine that it is not "appropriate and necessary" to regulate HAP emissions from power plants under Section 112 of the CAA.
- This revised finding would correct flaws in the Agency's 2016 Supplemental Finding on this issue.
- The emission standards and other requirements of the MATS rule, first promulgated in 2012, would remain in place, however, since EPA is not proposing to remove coal- and oil fired power plants from the list of sources that are regulated under Section 112 of the Act.
- EPA is also proposing or taking comment on other MATS-related issues in this action. o EPA is proposing the results of the risk and technology review required by section 112. The proposed RTR shows that no additional regulations are required.
- o EPA is also soliciting comment on establishing a subcategory for emissions of acid gas HAP from existing electric utility steam generating units (EGUs) firing eastern bituminous coal refuse.
- EPA will take comment on this proposal for 60 days after publication in the Federal Register and hold at least one public hearing. Details about the public hearing will be available in a future Federal Register notice.

## REVISED SUPPLEMENTAL FINDING

#### Action

- EPA is proposing that it is not "appropriate and necessary" to regulate HAP emissions from coal- and oil-fired power plants under section 112 of the CAA because the costs of such regulation grossly outweigh the quantified HAP benefits.
- EPA has reexamined the cost analyses presented in the 2016 Supplemental Finding and proposes to determine that neither of the Finding's approaches to considering cost satisfies the Agency's obligation under CAA section 112(n)(1)(A) as interpreted by the Supreme Court in Michigan.
- EPA proposes the 2016 Supplemental Finding erred in its consideration of cost. Specifically, we find that what was described in the 2016 Supplemental Finding as the preferred approach, or "cost reasonableness test," does not meet the statute's requirements to fully consider costs, and was an unreasonable interpretation of the CAA mandate.
- In this proposal, EPA uses a different consideration of cost for purposes of the appropriate and necessary finding, one that aligns with the purpose of CAA section 112(n)(1)(A) as set forth in Michigan.
- EPA proposes to find that equal reliance on the particulate matter (PM) air quality cobenefits projected to occur as a result of the reductions in HAPs was flawed as the focus of CAA section 112 is HAP emissions reductions.
- EPA proposes to directly compare the cost of compliance with MATS with the benefits specifically associated with reducing emissions of HAP in order to satisfy our duty to consider cost in the context of the CAA section 112(n)(1)(A) appropriate and necessary finding.
- A proper consideration of costs demonstrates that the total cost of compliance with MATS (\$7.4 to \$9.6 billion annually) dwarfs the monetized HAP benefits of the rule (\$4 to \$6 million annually).
- While there are unquantified HAP benefits and significant monetized PM co-benefits associated with MATS, the Administrator has concluded that the identification of these benefits is not sufficient, in light of the gross imbalance of monetized costs and HAP benefits, to support a finding that it is appropriate and necessary to regulate EGUs under CAA section 112.
- Further, EPA is proposing that making this determination that it is not "appropriate and necessary"

would not remove coal- and oil-fired EGUs from the list of affected source categories for regulation under section 112 nor would it affect the 2012 MATS, which would stay in place.

- EPA is taking comment on alternative interpretations of the effects of its proposed finding. Specifically, EPA is taking comment on whether it has the authority or obligation to remove coal- and oil-fired EGUs from the CAA list of affected source categories and rescind MATS. Background
- The CAA lays out a multi-step process for regulating HAP emissions from power plants. The process includes looking at whether it is "appropriate and necessary" to regulate coal- and oil-fired power plants for HAPs—referred to as an A&N Finding; taking an action to "list"

EGUs for HAP regulation under section 112 of the CAA; and setting HAP emission standards.

- In December 2000, pursuant to CAA section 112(n)(1)(A), EPA determined it was "appropriate and necessary" to regulate coal- and oil-fired EGUs under CAA section 112(d) and added such units to the CAA section 112(c) List of Categories of Major and Area Sources.
- In 2005, EPA issued a final rule that reversed the A&N Finding, removed coal- and oil-fired EGUs from the CAA section 112(c) list, and established standards for mercury emissions under CAA section 111 (Clean Air Mercury Rule or CAMR).
- In 2008, in New Jersey v. EPA, the D.C. Circuit Court vacated the delisting and CAMR, ruling that EPA's reversal of its A&N Finding did not remove coal- and oil-fired EGUs from the CAA section 112(c) source category list and that the Agency failed to comply with the CAA section 112(c)(9) requirements for delisting a source category.
- In 2012, EPA reaffirmed its initial 2000 A&N Finding and finalized MATS, which regulates HAP from coal- and oil-fired EGUs.
- In 2015, in Michigan v. EPA, the Supreme Court ruled that the Agency erred when it determined cost did not have to be considered when making the A&N Finding. The D.C. Circuit Court remanded MATS, requiring the Agency to consider the cost of MATS relative to the A&N Finding.
- EPA's response to the remand was the 2016 Supplemental Finding, in which the Agency concluded that the consideration of cost did not change its conclusion that it was appropriate and necessary to regulate HAP emissions from coal- and oil-fired EGUs.
- The 2016 Supplemental Finding drew additional legal challenges, including Murray Energy Corp. v. EPA, which challenged the conclusions reached in EPA's Supplemental Finding.
- In response to this challenge, in 2017, EPA moved the D.C. Circuit Court to hold the Murray Energy Corp. v. EPA case in abeyance so the new Administration could have time to review the 2016 Supplemental Finding.

# RESIDUAL RISK AND TECHNOLOGY REVIEW

- EPA is proposing the results of the RTR of MATS that the Agency is required to conduct in accordance with CAA section 112.
- Residual Risk Review: The CAA requires EPA to assess the risk remaining after the promulgation of final HAP standards. Based on the completed risk assessment, EPA has determined that the residual risks due to emissions of HAPs from the coal- and oil-fired EGUs source category are acceptable and that the current standards provide an ample margin of safety to protect public health.
- Technology Review: The CAA also requires EPA to assess, review and revise HAP standards, as necessary, taking into account developments in practices, processes and control technologies. Based on the technology review of MATS, no new developments in HAP emission controls to achieve additional cost-effective reductions were identified.
- EPA proposes that no revisions to MATS are warranted based on the results of these reviews. Background
- Section 112 of the CAA requires EPA to regulate HAPs, from categories of industrial facilities in two phases.
- The first phase is "technology-based," where EPA develops standards for controlling the emissions of HAPs from sources in an industry group or "source category" under section

112(d) of the CAA. These maximum achievable control technology (MACT) standards are  $^4$ 

based on emissions levels that are already being achieved by the best-controlled and lower emitting sources in an industry.

• Within 8 years of setting the MACT standards, section 112(f)(2) of the CAA directs EPA to assess the remaining health risks from each source category to determine whether the standards protect public health with an ample margin of safety and protect against adverse environmental effects. This second phase is a "risk-based" approach called residual risk.

Here, EPA must determine whether more health-protective standards are necessary.

• Also, every 8 years after setting MACT standards, section 112(d)(6) of the CAA requires EPA to review and revise the standards, if necessary, to account for improvements in air pollution controls and/or prevention.

#### SOLICITATION OF COMMENT ON EASTERN BITUMINOUS COAL REFUSE

SUBCATEGORY Issue • EPA is considering establishing a subcategory for emissions of acid gas HAP from existing EGUs firing eastern bituminous coal refuse.

- EPA is requesting comment on establishing a subcategory and on the acid gas HAP emission standards that would be established if such a subcategory were created.
- The subcategory and standards would affect an estimated 10 existing EGUs (small units in Pennsylvania and West Virginia) that use eastern bituminous coal refuse to generate electricity.
- Bituminous coal refuse-fired EGUs must install some sort of downstream acid gas control technology to meet the final acid gas MATS standards and EPA believes that such control technology would be expensive and potentially technically and practically infeasible to retrofit on the small units that are currently firing eastern bituminous coal refuse.

  Background
- In 2011, EPA proposed hydrochloric acid (HCl) and sulfur dioxide (SO2) standards for all coalfired EGUs.
- Public comments on the proposal claimed that the characteristics of coal refuse made it too costly to comply with the acid gas HAP standards and requested a subcategory for EGUs burning coal refuse
- EPA determined there was no basis for a subcategory and, in 2012, finalized HCl and SO2 standards that apply to all coal-fired EGUs.
- EPA's decision was challenged, and, in 2014, upheld by the D.C. Circuit Court in White Stallion v. EPA.
- EPA received a petition for reconsideration requesting a subcategory for the acid gas standards for EGUs burning all types of coal refuse, and EPA denied the petition.
- EPA's denial of the petition was challenged, the petitioner claiming that its petition only requested subcategorization for EGUs burning bituminous coal refuse, not for all coal refuse EGUs (ARIPPA v. EPA).
- In 2017, EPA asked the Court to hold the case in abeyance.

# Aldo Leopold's Ecological Conservatism

He shows us how to reject a politics that destroys, whether its target is our landscapes or our culture.

Right at the outset of his 1949 masterwork *A Sand County Almanac*, the conservationist and nature <image003.jpg>writer Aldo Leopold lays his cards on the table:

There are some who can live without wild things, and some who cannot.... For us of the minority, the opportunity to see geese is more important than television, and the chance to find a pasque-flower is a right as inalienable as free speech.... We of the minority see a law of diminishing returns in progress; our opponents do not.

When I am asked to explain what sort of conservative I am —a question often posed quizzically, given that I am a vocal environmentalist, vociferous critic of corporations, and owner of a humanities doctorate—I usually offer this quote. It is wearying to perpetually explain that "conservative" is not, in fact, synonymous with "Republican" (and these days may even be antonymous). But the point is always worth making, if only to convince one person out of a dozen that there is such a thing as a life conservatively lived.

Much ink has been spilled in discussions of what we might call the theory of conservatism: its intellectual legacies, epistemological boundaries, and ideological categories. No doubt this has some value—most of us like to know the basic frameworks of our beliefs, after all—but I submit that the value is comparatively low, in the same way that philosophy of mind is of limited value when one is struck by Cupid's well-placed arrow. When thoughts of one person dominate your every waking moment, fMRI scans of brain activity suddenly seem like laughably small potatoes.

So too with conservatism. If Russell Kirk was correct that true conservatism is not an ideology but a way of life, then what should fundamentally concern us is what *lived* conservatism looks like. What does it mean to *live* conservatively? How does a conservative treat others and the world around him? What are the hallmarks of the conservative life? For an answer, I believe one can find few examples better than the work of Leopold. It is from Leopold that we learn that the two characteristics of the conservative life are, first, attention to what is around you, and second, awareness of consequences.

Leopold was a pioneer in conservation ecology and game management, and A Sand County Almanac is a series of dispatches from his family's small country retreat in the Wisconsin marshland. Much of the work is simply a chronicle of Leopold watching, as he pays attention to the land and wildlife in his particular place ("A March morning is only as drab as he who walks in it without a glance skyward, ear cocked for geese"), and parts of it are quasi-Delphic aphorisms about nature and culture ("Hemisphere solidarity is new among statesmen, but not among the feathered navies of the sky"). The guiding theme throughout the work is that one cannot truly see and appreciate something without close attention to it: not just *looking* but truly *seeing*. With this stance, Leopold, following forebears like Thoreau, created a template for ecological heirs like Wendell Berry, Gary Snyder, and Paul Kingsnorth (who is our most forceful contemporary ecological voice).

Leopold's attention is not the CEO-friendly, quasi-Eastern "mindfulness" repackaged shamelessly by the forces of capital and sold to a million exploited workers. It is, rather, a way of living in which you learn signs and signals through repetition and immersion in a place: "The dog knows what is grouseward better than you do. You will do well to follow him closely, reading from the cock of his ears the story the breeze is telling." And: "I sit in happy meditation on my rock, pondering, while my line dries again, upon the ways of trout and men." And: "The disappointment I feel on

these mornings of silence perhaps shows that things hoped for have a higher value than things assured. The hope of hearing quail is worth half a dozen risings-in-the-dark."

This kind of attention is, I believe, the hallmark of the life conservatively lived—for one cannot know which good things to conserve without paying attention to them. When you pay attention to things, you see that webs of nature and culture alike are fragile things indeed. The conservative is always and everywhere the skeptic of progress, whose constant invocation and nebulous definition make it the most banal and confounding of secular gods. Progress is the realm of the disrupters and the revolutionaries and the burn-it-all-down mobs. all of which are anathema to the conservative life. The conservative who pays attention is not opposed to change on the merits, but plays the role of Orwell's Benjamin or Virgil's Laocoön: he warns of tampering with established goods and bewares of disrupters bearing what he is told are gifts. As Leopold wrote, "How like fish we are: ready, nay eager, to seize upon whatever new thing some wind of circumstance shakes down upon the river of time! And how we rue our haste, finding the gilded morsel to contain a hook."

Skepticism—not necessarily opposition, but healthy and hesitant skepticism—should be applied equally to claims of progress. Leopoldian conservatives should be as skeptical of sweeping social change as they are of sweeping economic change. Gender-neutral bathrooms and river damming and strip mall developments should raise their eyebrows to the same height. They need not finally end up in opposition, but the conservative should initially, at the very least, say: *hang on*. Let's make sure we're not destroying something worthwhile before we move forward with this. Let's make sure we've paid close attention so that we truly know what it is we're changing.

The second hallmark of Leopoldian conservatism is an awareness of consequences. An ecological view of nature and culture reveals that no one operates in a vacuum. Every action has a consequence. If you spray a weed killer on a

crop long enough, toxins will eventually end up in groundwater. If you insist there are no biological distinctions between men and women, you chip away at fragile social norms that undergird entire cultural frameworks. The conservative may not necessarily land in opposition to either of these things, but before accepting them he will have at least devoted a healthy amount of thought to their consequences.

Of cranes and the disappearing marshlands and meadows that housed them, Leopold wrote: "The cranes were hard put, their numbers shrinking with the remnants of unburned meadow. For them, the song of the power shovel came near being an elegy. The high priests of progress knew nothing of cranes, and cared less. What is a species more or less among engineers? What good is an undrained marsh anyhow?"

I have heard some variation of that final question a thousand times over the last 10 years, posed by social liberals and economic liberals alike. What good is a two-parent family anyhow? What good is an empty field? What good is a church? What good is a sewing circle? A scout troop? A salamander? A social norm? The power of all these things is often intangible; it is missing from the dry ledgers of our utilitarian bookkeeping. No, I can't put a price on the dead cottonwood next to the Kansas River that my neighbor recently felled, nor can I affix a value to the woodpecker nest it housed. But something is lost in its absence. "It is an object lesson," Leopold writes. "One need not doubt the unseen."

This is not live-and-let-live conservatism as much as it is love-and-let-love. At the risk of veering Chopra-ingly close to New Age platitudes, the Leopoldian conservative should always be focused on love: love for what is around him, love for the people he encounters, and love for the institutions that are difficult to build but easy to destroy. Why should liberalism claim a monopoly on love? The conservative should support the actions that demonstrate love, respect, and care for our natural and cultural worlds. Paying close

attention and being aware of consequences are acts of love. Seeing that the thing flying by you is not just a bird but a chickadee—"so small a bundle of large enthusiasms," writes Leopold—is an act of love. So is seeing the love created within a family, a neighborhood, a community.

Conservatives should be conservationists of what is good and valuable in culture. The best definition of a conservationist, writes Leopold, is "written not with a pen, but with an axe. It is a matter of what a man thinks about while chopping, or while deciding what to chop. A conservationist is one who is humbly aware that with each stroke he is writing his signature on the face of the land."

Some chopping is done to construct new things. This is to the good. Expanding our circles of sympathy, broadening our definition of who may share in love, requires good chopping. But too much chopping these days is done purely to destroy. It is the clearcutting of culture no less than the clearcutting of forests, and landscape and social life alike are left scarred. The Leopoldian conservative has at the forefront of his consciousness the fragility of systems and structures. Intrinsically good things—not just trout streams but also the families and communities around them—are easily destroyed.

How, then, does one live conservatively? How do we decide what to chop? Live simply. Live humbly. Where love and beauty flourish, let them flourish. Be skeptical about changes to long-treasured institutions. Notice things. Look down at the ground to see grass and up at the sky to see birds. Be kind to others and focus on what is closest to you. Pay attention to the results of your actions. Brighten the corner where you find yourself.

Where you direct your axe is up to you. Above all else, chop with care.

EPA acting Administrator Andrew Wheeler met on Wednesday with Republican donor and conservationist Andy Sabin, the latest sign the new EPA chief is making his office more accessible than Scott Pruitt had.

"I told him, 'You have an obligation to protect the public's health," Sabin, who runs Sabin Metals and has made almost \$1 million in hard money donations to Republicans over the last two election cycles, told POLITICO. "It should be smart deregulation. Anything that affects the public health should not be deregulated."

In his first days as head of EPA, Wheeler has met with a more diverse set of visitors than the conservatives and business interests that gathered with Pruitt. According to his calendar, Wheeler has met with environmental groups like the National Wildlife Federation and pro-biofuels groups like Fuels America.

Wheeler's meeting with Sabin was arranged by Sabin's lawyer, Brent Fewell, a founder at the Earth & Water Law Group and a former Bush Administration EPA official. Sabin traveled to Washington to meet with senators to advocate for conservation bills, including National Park Restoration Act, S. 2509 (115), and a measure to make permanent the Land and Water Conservation Fund, S. 896 (115).

Sabin said he did not bring up climate change, though he has been an advocate for climate action.

Sabin says Wheeler mostly listened during the meeting, though he told Sabin that streamlining permitting would be a priority. Sabin said a meeting schedule for 15 minutes ended up running 35 minutes.

"I found that extremely encouraging," Sabin said. "It made me feel very good about the guy."

Jobs and the economy emerged as the California electorate's top ranking issue, with three in four likely voters (74%) considering it among their most important issues in this year's presidential election. Concerns about the economy cross party lines, with greater than seven in ten likely voters in both the state's Democratic and Republican presidential primaries rating it among their top issues. There was also general consensus among Democratic and Republican primary election voters about the importance of health care, education/public schools, and Social Security, with likely voters in both parties ranking each among their top ten campaign issues.

However, there are big partisan differences in the relative importance of many of the other top issues in this year's presidential campaign. For example, likely voters in California's Democratic presidential primary are far more likely than their Republican counterparts to consider the following as salient campaign issues, and rank them among their top ten issues – climate change, income inequality, college affordability, equal pay for women, ensuring clean air/water, and keeping the U.S. out of war.

On the other hand, California's Republican primary voters are more likely than their Democratic primary voters to include reducing the deficit/size of government, the terrorist threat/protecting the homeland, reducing taxes, immigration, Supreme Court appointments, and trade policies among their top ten issues in the presidential campaign.

The USC Schwarzenegger Institute is focused on supporting and finding solutions to the challenging issues facing the people of California, the U.S and the globe. This survey provides valuable insights for policy makers and where they should focus their attention. Among the relevant data the survey revealed:

- 1. REGIONALLY: There are many differences in how voters rank the importance of issues depending on the region of California they live in. Broadly California is divided into five regions: Los Angeles County, San Francisco Bay Area, South Coast, the Central Valley, and the Inland Empire. Even in regions with large majorities of Democrats, like Los Angeles and San Francisco, voters expressed differences in their top issues.
- 2. CLIMATE CHANGE AND ENVIRONMENT: While clean air and water, climate change and energy policy rank high among all voters, these issues rank much higher among Democrats than Republicans. The Institute has long focused on these issues and were pleased to see a much greater percentage of Republicans listing a concern for clean air and clean water and wanting energy policies that move California away from fossil fuels and toward renewable energy alternatives than we expected and significantly higher than how they ranked climate change.

The Institute has hosted experts at USC on behavior and psychology exploring how we are not communicating effectively about climate change. During COP21 Governor Schwarzenegger wrote a Facebook post on this issue and said don't talk about climate change, but focus instead on clean air, clean water, human health, and whether we want to lead on the future of energy. This survey reinforces that the more effective way to reach voters, especially Republicans, is to frame the environmental issues in terms that relate to the health of communities and economic competitiveness of smart energy policies.

3. EDUCATION/PUBLIC SCHOOLS: With half the California Budget allocated to public schools it was not surprising that the issue ranks high among all voters. Presidential candidates have not spent much time talking about our public schools, and despite slogans like "making America great again" or "fighting for us" or "fix a rigged economic system" they have not made the connection

between strong public schools and achieving any of the lofty goals expressed in these slogans. Without high preforming public schools the United States will struggle to remain an economic or social leader throughout the world. While many public schools provide great education, far too many do not, especially in predominately Latino and African American communities. Even in many middle class neighborhoods parents do not have great public schools to send their children too

4. POST-PARTISANSHIP AND CONGRESSIONAL GRIDLOCK: California voters will also be voting this year to fill the U.S. Senate seat now held by retiring Senator Barbara Boxer. Likely voters were asked which quality they felt was a more important when choosing their U.S. Senate candidate - working with other lawmakers to get laws passed even if it means making compromises or holding true to one's beliefs even if it means not comprising with other lawmakers.

By a very large 69% to 27% margin the state's likely voters said they would prefer a candidate who is willing to make compromises to get legislation passed over one who holds true to their beliefs without compromise. There was general consensus about this across voters of all political stripes, with majorities of both Democrat and Republican likely voters, as well as voters across the state's five major geographic regions, favoring this quality in their U.S. Senate candidate.

This Institute, with its mission to "put policy over politics" was pleased to see these results. Governor Schwarzenegger has long championed government reform and worked with a broad bipartisan coalition of good government organizations to pass two ballot initiatives, one on redistricting and one on top-two open primaries. 

# Republicans create bicameral conservation group

A new bicameral Republican conservation caucus aims to promote smart environmental stewardship alongside innovative energy development.

Sens. Lindsey Graham (R-S.C.) and Cory Gardner (R-Colo.) will lead the Roosevelt Conservation Caucus in the upper chamber, while Republican Reps. Brian Mast of Florida and Elise Stefanik of New York are the group's co-chairs in the House.

"In Florida, we've felt the social and economic consequences of environmental disaster firsthand, and the public health crisis we're facing as a result of toxic algal blooms exemplifies why it's necessary that we work together to strengthen conservation efforts and protect our environment," Mast said in a statement to E&E News.

The caucus is named after conservation champion President Theodore Roosevelt. Many Republicans and Democrats revere the 26th U.S. president for his prescient and far-reaching protection of the country's natural resources.

The Roosevelt Conservation Caucus is the GOP's response to an issue traditionally dominated by Democrats. The recent overwhelming bipartisan backing in both chambers for the public lands package, which had many vocal Republican advocates including Gardner, has helped the party recognize the value — intrinsic and otherwise — of natural resources.

Andrew Sabin, chairman of Sabin Metal Corp. and a conservation-minded Republican billionaire, said the caucus provides conservatives an important platform for environmental leadership.

"I've spent the last two years discussing environmental issues with Republicans in Congress," Sabin said in a statement.

"The popular perception is Republicans don't care about the environment, and that couldn't be further from the truth. The caucus will provide the structure where members can discuss innovative solutions to problems free from partisan attacks," he added.

There's also a clear economic incentive for both parties to care about conservation. Outdoor recreation generated \$887 billion in consumer spending in 2017.

Yet, these student groups continue to flourish amidst the propaganda from Palestine and elsewhere.


Today's generations, never learned, or forgot or ignore world history.

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

# University of California Sued Over Stonewalling Of 'Climate Litigation' Documents

- The University of California Board of Regents was sued to compel the release of "climate litigation" documents.
- The suit was filed by D.C.-based think tank, the Competitive Enterprise Institute (CEI).
- CEI filed two records requests with UC Los Angeles, which it says the school has delayed fulfilling for months.


A free market think tank filed suit Thursday against the University of California's Board of Regents to compel the release of documents linking law school professors to the "climate litigation industry."

Competitive Enterprise Institute (CEI) senior fellow Chris Horner, the man behind the lawsuit, said University of California-Los Angeles's (UCLA) law school is just one of a growing number of law schools being used to aid global warming litigators.

"That one of them is a public university means the public has a right to learn much more about how it's resources and institutions are being used in this industry," Horner told The Daily Caller News Foundation.

"UCLA's response, however, shows a commitment to delaying or even denying the public right to obtain such knowledge," Horner said.

The complaint asks the court to force UCLA to release records regarding its "work with private outside parties including law enforcement to develop theories of litigation against" the energy companies and political opponents. UCLA's role in climate litigation "has included participating in 'secret' briefings by this campaign for 'prospective funders' in pursuit of 'potential state causes of action against major carbon producers,' which is the subject of great media and public interest," reads the complaint.

CEI filed records requests under the California Public Records Act (CPRA) in February and May. UCLA for months delayed responding to CEI's records requests, according to the complaint.

"The placement of privately employed 'special prosecutors for climate' in state AG offices added an astounding twist to the unfolding story of the climate litigation industry," Horner told TheDCNF. "UCLA's involvement offers yet another."

"Both involve donor-funded use of public institutions to pursue opponents of a political agenda, and to impose that agenda that has failed through the proper democratic process," Horner said.


The Board of Regents did not respond to TheDCNF's request for comment.

Horner recently released a report detailing the growing role law schools have in promoting litigation, including against coal, gas and oil companies, over global warming. Horner's report focused on the ties between private donors and Democratic state attorneys general.

The August report <u>detailed how attorneys general were using New York University law school fellows</u> to pursue litigation against energy companies and oppose the Trump administration's agenda.

In particular, legal fellows are being used to aid the efforts of about 20 attorneys general, initially brought together by former New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman, to go after fossil fuel producers and sue the Trump administration.

The scheme is funded by former New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg's foundation. At least one of those fellows' name is on New York state's lawsuit against ExxonMobil for allegedly misleading investors on climate science.

Horner came upon evidence that showed lawyers at UCLA's Emmett Institute on Climate Change and the Environment were allegedly involved in the web of activists, attorneys and politicians trying to enact global warming policies through the courts.

The Emmett Institute was founded in 2008 through donations from wealthy real estate investor Dan Emmett. The institute bills itself as the "premier source of environmental legal scholarship, nonpartisan expertise, policy analysis, and training."

For example, Horner obtained documents about a "secret meeting" in 2016 hosted by the Union of Concerned Scientists, an activist group, in Cambridge, Massachusetts, for "prospective funders." State attorneys general attended that meeting, Horner found.

Horner said documents show UCLA lawyers participated in that "secret meeting." Now, he wants documents regarding the meeting and other activities of UCLA professors to aid activists and Democratic politicians.

# California Climate Policies Facing Revolt from Civil-Rights Groups

Hugely expensive green mandates will hit poor Californians the hardest.

n April, civil-rights groups sued to stop some of California's policies designed to address climate change. Then on Monday, California governor Jerry Brown signed into law SB 100, which requires the state's utilities to obtain all their electricity from carbon-free sources by 2045. Before signing the bill, Brown said the legislation was "sending a message to California and to the world that we're going to meet the Paris agreement." In fact, it will only increase the hardships that California's climate policy imposes on the poor, as detailed in the lawsuit.

High electricity prices should be a concern for California policymakers, since electric rates in the state are already 60 percent higher than those in the rest of the country. According to a recent study by the Berkeley-based think tank Environmental Progress, between 2011 and 2017 California's electricity rates rose more than five times as fast as those in the rest of the U.S. SB 100 will mean even higher electricity prices for Californians.


SB 100 requires the state to get 60 percent of its electricity from renewables by 2045, and the other 40 percent from "zero-carbon" sources. Proponents of the measure say those sources could include nuclear, or perhaps power plants that have carbon capture and sequestration systems. Neither approach seems very promising, given that California closed the San Onofre nuclear plant in 2013 and will close the Diablo Canyon plant by 2025. Carbon capture and sequestration has been tried at a handful of locations but has yet to be proven affordable on a large scale.

Furthermore, it's clear that the more California relies on renewables, the more it will have to deploy large amounts of electricity storage. Those storage systems will have to be large enough to handle massive seasonal fluctuations in wind and solar output. (Wind-energy and solar-energy production in California is roughly three times as great during the summer months as it is in the winter.) The Clean Air Task Force, a Boston-based energy-policy think tank, was one of several environmental groups that supported the passage of SB 100 and the 60 percent—renewable mandate. If California attempts to push past the 60 percent threshold, the storage challenge becomes more daunting. For instance, Clean Air Task Force analysts have calculated that if California attempts to get 80 percent of its electricity from renewables, the state will require about 9.6 terawatt-hours of storage. This would require about 500 million Tesla Powerwalls, or roughly 15 Powerwalls for every resident. A full 100 percent—renewable electricity mandate would require some 36.3 terawatt-hours of storage, or about 60 Powerwalls for every resident of California.

Increasing reliance on renewable energy also means increasing land-use conflicts. Since 2015, more than 200 government entities from Maine to California have voted to reject or restrict the encroachment of wind-energy projects. In 2015 the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously in favor of an ordinance banning large wind turbines in the county's unincorporated areas. Three other California counties — San Diego, Solano, and Inyo — have also passed restrictions on Big Wind. Last year, the head of the California Wind Energy Association lamented that "we're facing restrictions like that all around the state," adding that "it's pretty bleak in terms of the potential for new development." The result of the anti-wind restrictions can be seen in the numbers. Last year, California had about 5,600 megawatts of installed wind capacity. That's roughly 150 megawatts less than what the state had back in 2013.

The land-use problem facing Big Wind in California is the same throughout the rest of the U.S. and Europe: People in cities like the idea of wind turbines. People in rural areas increasingly don't want anything to do with them. Those rural landowners don't want to see the red blinking lights atop those massive turbines, all night, every night, for the rest of their lives. Nor do they want to be subjected to the harmful noise — both audible and inaudible — that they produce.

Even before SB 100 passed, though, California's leaders were already facing a legal backlash from minority leaders over the high cost of the state's climate policies. On April 27, The Two Hundred, a coalition of civil-rights leaders, filed a lawsuit in state court against the California Air Resources Board, seeking an injunction against some of the state's carbon dioxide-reduction rules. The 102page lawsuit declares that California's "reputation as a global climate leader is built on the state's dual claims of substantially reducing greenhouse gas emissions while simultaneously enjoying a thriving economy. Neither claim is true."

The gist of the lawsuit is this: California's high housing, transportation, and energy costs are discriminatory because they are a regressive tax on the poor. The suit claims that the state's climate laws violate the Fair Employment and Housing Act because CARB's new greenhouse-gasemissions rules on housing units in the state "have a disparate negative impact on minority communities and are discriminatory against minority communities and their members." The suit also claims the state's climate laws are illegal under the Federal Housing Act, again because their effect is felt predominantly by minority communities. It also makes a constitutional claim that minorities are being denied equal protection under the law because California's climate regulations are making affordable housing unavailable to them.

The lawsuit, which Michael Shellenberger of Environmental Progress spotlighted in his recent Forbes column, points out that since 2007, "California has had the highest poverty rate in the country, over 8 million people living below the US Census Bureau poverty line when housing costs are taken into account." The lawsuit claims that CARB has "ignored" the state's "modest scale of

greenhouse gas reductions, as well as the highly regressive costs imposed on current state residents by CARB's climate programs."

On Thursday I spoke to John Gamboa, a member of The Two Hundred. He said SB 100 is merely the latest example of California politicians' ignoring the poor and the middle class when making energy policy. "Every time they pass new regulations, the burden falls on the people who can least afford it," he told me. "That's the history of the environmental movement: They care more about spotted owls than brown babies."

The lawsuit focuses largely on the state's housing and transportation policies, but it also says that California's climate change policies increase "the cost of transportation fuels" and "further increase electricity costs." Those high costs, it claims, "have caused and will cause unconstitutional and unlawful disparate impacts to California's minority populations, which now comprise a plurality of the state's population."

There's simply no doubt that SB 100 will mean even higher electricity prices for Californians. A parallel can be seen in Germany, which has pledged to cut its carbon-dioxide emissions by 80 percent by 2050 and, like California, is closing its nuclear plants and pushing hard for more renewable energy. According to Agora Energiewende, a think tank that focuses on Germany's transition toward renewables, between 2007 and 2018, residential electricity prices in Germany jumped by 50 percent. German residential customers now have some of the highest-priced electricity in Europe, about \$0.37 per kilowatt-hour.

Ontario, Canada has had a similar experience. Over the past decade, Ontario closed its coal plants and implemented lucrative subsidies for renewables. The result: Between 2008 and 2016, residential electricity rates in Ontario rose 71 percent, which was more than double the average increase in the rest of Canada during that time. And rates in Ontario could rise another 40 percent by 2035. A report released by the Fraser Institute in April concluded that "soaring electricity costs in Ontario have placed a significant financial burden on the manufacturing sector and hampered its competitiveness."

Or consider Australia, where consumers are paying some of the world's highest electricity prices after the government imposed renewable-energy mandates and emissions caps on the electric sector. Electricity costs became such a hot issue that they played a decisive role in last month's sacking of the country's prime minister, Malcolm Turnbull. Among the hardest-hit regions of Australia is South Australia, where electricity rates shot up after the closure of two large coal-fired power plants. The state now gets about 40 percent of its electricity from solar and wind and power costs are roughly three times that seen by the average American.

The high cost of renewable-energy mandates was noted by a handful of California's Democratic legislators during the debate over SB 100. "This is yet another in a laundry list of bills that are discriminatory to the people I represent," said Adam Gray of Merced. According to the Los Angeles Times, Gray went on to say that the supporters of SB 100 were more motivated "to impress national progressives rather than poor residents in rural communities who would face higher electric bills."

SB 100's sponsor, state senator Kevin de León, is running for U.S. Senate in this fall's election. When I asked Gamboa about de León, and more specifically why a Latino leader would be so supportive of a measure that could hurt low-income Latinos, he paused and let out a sigh. "I know Kevin. He has a good heart," Gamboa said. "He got excited about getting votes from the environmental community and this was a good way to do it."

Last month, after SB 100 passed the state assembly, de León claimed that California has "taken another great stride toward a 100 percent clean energy future." That may be true. But California's ratepayers, especially the poor and working class, will be the ones paying the cost of that stride.

How Trump's climate review could backfire Scott Waldman, E&E News reporter Published: Friday, March 8, 2019

A White House effort to challenge climate science could end up strengthening the case against the Trump administration's environmental rollbacks and potentially weaken future attempts to ignore research showing that humans are warming the planet.

The political exercise to question whether climate change threatens national security could backfire, according to experts. It would confront reams of scientific studies suggesting that rising temperatures stand to stress military missions like responding to humanitarian crises, achieving Arctic security and maintaining coastal bases.

Attempts to erode those findings could flounder, potentially weakening efforts by the administration to roll back rules limiting greenhouse gases at power plants and in cars, said George David Banks, a former climate and international energy adviser to President Trump.

In the early days of the administration, Banks participated in talks at the White House about reviewing climate science. Political officials decided it was a losing situation, he said. The newest effort to perform an "adversarial" review

of climate science and its application to national security appears to be in the early stages, Banks said.

"One of the reasons we dismissed this idea is because it was a no-win situation for the administration at that time, and I would argue at this time, as well," he said. "It has the potential to undermine either the regulatory reform agenda or put the president in a box and reduce his flexibility."

That assessment follows revelations that William Happer, an adviser on the White House National Security Council, proposed an executive order to create a group that would question the way that climate science is used in national security documents. Happer, an emeritus physics professor with Princeton University, promotes the benefits of rising carbon dioxide levels in the atmosphere. He has described advocates of climate action as a "cult."

There is a White House recruitment effort underway to form the group, whether or not Trump signs the executive order. Those leading it have reached out to the handful of researchers who question climate science.

Meanwhile, the evidence that climate change threatens national security continues to grow. This week, a military leader said Russia has moved into the thawing Arctic and is bringing in weaponry (Climatewire, March 6).

That's in addition to the damages already being experienced by Americans from more extreme precipitation events, drought, heat waves and wildfires.

The White House effort may be more precarious than Trump assumes, Banks said. There is little chance that Happer and others who reject the science will "win" a hostile review of mainstream research, he said. In the last two years, the administration has targeted many of the rules prioritized by the Obama administration to reduce emissions. Most of those rollbacks are being challenged in court.

"Either the mainstream science wins totally or in part, and if they win even in part, then that is a challenge for the administration," Banks said. "And if there is an acknowledgment that climate change is a national security risk, which any objective analysis would bring you to that conclusion, then the question is what is the response? How does this relate to the president's announcement that we're dropping the Paris Agreement, how does this relate to other domestic policies or the regulatory rollback agenda?"

Others see significant reason for public concern in the White House review because it has been set up to provide political cover for the president's energy agenda.

Such a review could have lasting effects on national security, said Andrew Holland, chief operating officer of the American Security Project. The president could stop public planning for climate change, he said. The review, even if it's

scientifically dubious, provides a series of talking points that the president could use to dismiss climate policy.

"It's all for an audience of one, and the president still retains real power and can do real things if he gets the justification to do so," Holland said. "It could be discredited in public and before everybody, but in a lot of things the president is the commander in chief, and when he gives an order, the chain of command has to follow that."

In theory, an adversarial review could strengthen the field of climate science, said Joseph Majkut, head of climate policy at the Niskanen Center, a conservative think tank that advocates for a carbon tax. Majkut said he supported the administration's earlier efforts to conduct a "red team" review of the science, as long as it was conducted properly. It had the potential to strengthen the public's perception of what is known about climate change and shift the opinions of some Republicans who are skeptical of scientists, he said.

But an adversarial review could be detrimental if it's designed to be a partisan exercise.

"It's plausible for adversarial reviews as a tool to help improve the scientific process, to help understand weak points in arguments," Majkut said. "But adversarial reviews are also by their nature quite sensitive and have to be done very well, and they have to be done with buy-in of the community that is being assessed. It has to be done with enough experts that it's meaningful, and they have to be willing to come to conclusions that are not predetermined."

The new effort doesn't reflect that, he said. Happer is not known for having an open mind about climate research.

"This is the last gasp of institutional climate skepticism," Majkut said. "Maybe there is a plan, maybe there is a legitimate critique, but I haven't seen any evidence of that."

To be successful, the White House effort should have a diverse composition of participants who aren't in agreement, said Micah Zenko, author of the book "Red Team: How to Succeed by Thinking Like the Enemy." The exercise should have the necessary resources, personnel and access to achieve its objective, he said. The administration must also be willing to "fully digest, accept and act upon the results," otherwise it's not a genuine effort to improve understanding, he said.

"Participants should not have a vested interest in that outcome, nor be unduly anchored in preconceived notions regarding the topic," Zenko wrote in response to questions. "If they do, then it's merely a check-the-box activity to validate or invalidate a generally accepted proposition or thesis."

There are areas of climate science where a closer look would be warranted, because the research is still so uncertain, said Robert Kopp, director of the Rutgers University Institute of Earth, Ocean and Atmospheric Sciences and co-

author of the National Climate Assessment. He said there are plenty of areas of rigorous debate in climate science that could use scrutiny. That could improve scientists' understanding of how the Earth is changing, including the extent of sea-level rise, detection and attribution of climate change in extreme weather events, and the economic effects of rising temperatures.

Instead, the White House review will examine science that has been tested and upheld for years, he said.

"These people just want to go around and re-examine things that have been examined for decades as opposed to examining new areas where there are lots of scientists willing to chip in and be critical, because that's where the interesting science is," Kopp said. "Nothing will be put to rest. There have been lots of opportunities and lots of critiques through the decades, but none of them matter to these people."

Beyond representing public agencies and organizations in active lawsuits, Vic consults on effective litigation strategies with government agencies, national and local non-profit organizations, and attorneys around the country.

From 1998 through 2011, Vic's practice focused solely on representing public water suppliers and other public agencies in lawsuits against the manufacturers of toxic chemicals polluting drinking water sources. He was a partner with Miller & Sher in Sacramento from 1998 through 2002, then founder and principal litigator with Sher Leff LLP in San Francisco from 2003 through 2011. In 2009, Vic served as New York City's lead trial counsel in City of New York v. ExxonMobil, a federal jury trial over MTBE contamination in Queens that resulted in a verdict for the City of \$104.7 million. His team was recognized as a Public Justice Trial Lawyer of the Year finalist.

Vic practiced with the public interest law firm Earthjustice (then known as the Sierra Club Legal Defense Fund) from October 1986 until June 1997, including as its President from 1994 to 1997. As President, he acted as the CEO for the world's largest public interest environmental law firm, with 50 lawyers in ten offices. The American Lawyer called some of his work during this period among the "most important public lands management litigation in this country's history." The ABA Journal noted that Vic's lawsuits caused a "dramatic new direction in forest policy" for tens of millions of acres of federal forests, "forcing an end to business as usual". He also litigated many cases to protect communities from toxic chemicals, preserve endangered ecosystems and species, conserve public lands, and improve air and water quality.
